Vignettes of local history: First case ever tried in 42nd District Court gave an early-day Callahan Countain divorce from his wife, who allegedly spent the night in a covered wagon with her clandestine lover ... Seven years before the Cross Plains Review sprang up in 1909, this town had a newspaper — The Herald — which published several months ... Two men who fought unto death are buried in a single grave at Cottonwood ... During his long tenure as a lawman Jim McMillan arrested at various times: a local justice of the peace, mayor, county attorney and county judge ... A man once convicted in justice court here was halfway to the state penitentiary, when the accompanying officer learned that such a low court could not impose such a severe sentence ... In April 1922 there were 10 oil field supply concerns operating in Cross Plains ... Deep-sea oil test ever drilled in this area was eight miles west of Brown, just north of West Raddo Peak, it went to a depth of 5,118 feet ... First automobile ever in Cross Plains was driven here by Hugh Cromer of Fort Worth. He so scared a team of mules being worked by "Uncle" Punch Freeman that they ran away with a plow, throwing him off and causing him to lose his pipe, a thing he never forgave ... If Ross County had been created back at the turn of the century as citizens of Rising Star sought, in an effort to make their town a county seat, the name of the place would now be Sul City, not Rising Star ... Present Mayor Ed Souder is the second bachelor ever to serve in the city post here, the late Taylor Bond was first ... When abandoned a few years ago, Cross Plains Picnic was the state's oldest community celebration of that type with an unbroken record of continuity ... Probably the most

Tom Bryant, 76, Laid To Last Rest Here Monday Morning

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Funeral was held Monday morning at 10:30 from the First United Presbyterian Church of Cross Plains, of which he was a long-time member and ruling elder. Rev. Harold G. Wise, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery with members of the local Masonic lodge conducting graveside rites.

Mr. Bryant was a member of a prominent Central Texas family, having been born on a farm between Moody and Waco in McLennan County July 1, 1886.

"I was raised in a pasture down near Moody by the Widow Bryant," he used to say. His father died while he was a small boy.

His first love for the oil game, probably was caused by a trip he made into the Indian country of Oklahoma when he was 16.

He returned home, however, and finished school, then spent some time in the mining country around Cripple Creek, Colo. Ever since, he had had more than passing interest in minerals of all kinds.

It was February, 1920 that Bryant came to Cross Plains from Desdemona (Hogtown), where he had taken a few oil deals following the Ranger boom.

Besides his work at Desdemona and Cross Plains, Mr. Bryant was instrumental in the discovery of oil fields at Pioneer, Burkett and numerous pools in Callahan County.

The Amerada pool, between here and Burkett, which he developed together with Crabb & McNeel, was once called the "greatest shallow oil field on earth." Production discovered during the 1920's is presently under secondary recovery. It is said to have yielded more than two million barrels from the 350 foot sand strata. He also owned at various times natural gas distributing systems in Cross Plains, Pioneer, Rising Star, Brady, Throckmorton and Burkett. For a number of years he owned the Cross Plains Review and the town's largest insurance agency.

He was for a number of years identified with banking interests here and served as a director and president of a state bank in this city. Primarily, though, he was an oil man. A five-minute conversation he had with the late T. B. Slick, often called the world's greatest wildcatter, is said to have resulted in the discovery of oil at Pioneer. As was characteristic of the oil business in the early 1920's, Slick's fortune was at a low ebb at that time. He later attributed the Pioneer discovery with making it possible for him to rebuild one of the nation's greatest individual estates.

Mr. Bryant later managed his interests in Texas. The Cross Plains oil man was also associated with Frank Russell in the spectacular townsite play in Oklahoma City which

\$107,000 Low Bid On 2 Dams

The O. L. Rainey Construction Company of Paris was the apparent low bidder for sites 6 and 7 flood prevention structures on Turkey Creek, at a bid opening at the State Soil Conservation Service Office in Temple, Oct. 12. Ten other bidders submitted proposals for the job with the Rainey Construction Company's low bid of \$107,000 receiving the award. This company has had previous experience building floodwater retarding structures on Brady Creek and in the Trinity Watershed.

Estimated quantities of the major items of work include excavation and placing of earth-fill material — 254,000 yards; reinforced concrete in the amount of 111 cubic yards; and

374 linear feet of reinforced concrete pipe will be used in the principal spillways. Salvaging and placing of topsoil in the emergency spillways will amount to approximately 43,000 square yards and wire fence for the protection of grass on the dams and emergency spillways will require approximately 14,500 linear feet.

Work will begin on the contract to build the two floodwater retarding structures about Nov. 15. Ralph W. White, project construction engineer with the Soil Conservation Service at Brownwood, will supervise construction, according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist. The project is scheduled for completion within 241 calendar days, according to Hughes.

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
JUSTICE COURT TRIES 99 DURING SEPTEMBER

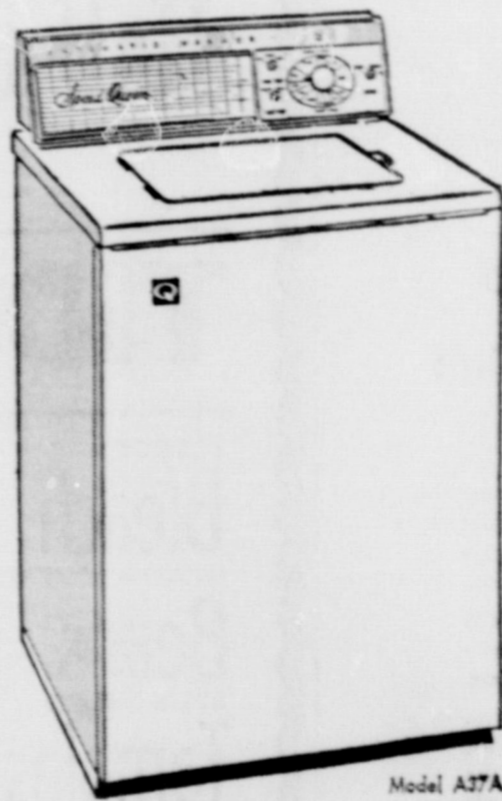
