President Kennedy's historic announcement of the naval blockade being imposed against Cuba apparently met with near-unanimous approval in Cross Plains. Patriotism above partisan politics, outspoken local critics of the New Frontier rallied behind America's chief executive as enthusiastically as did members of his own party.

Some felt that such action should have been taken earlier, however, nowhere were heard opinions favoring continued Russian appeasement.

## Mother, Son See Each Other After 40 Years

A Chicago accountant and his mother met for the first time in 40 years at the Abilene airport Friday morning and returned to her home in Cross Plains to catch up on four decades of visiting.

United were Mrs. Robert Grissom of Cross Plains and John Charles Neeley of Chicago, Ill. This was their first meeting since Neeley was three years old.

Mrs. Grissom had tried unsuccessfully for years to locate her son, but the appointment of a new county clerk at El Reno, Okla., led to the reunion. The public official is Mrs. Dorothy Lorenz.

Mrs. Lorenz, a friend of Neeley's foster sister, received a letter from Mrs. Grissom inquiring about him. Neeley's foster sister gave Mrs. Lorenz his address and she forwarded it to Mrs. Grissom, who contacted her son by telephone.

Neeley was born in Lamar, Okla., April 20, 1919. His mother was taken ill before his birth and his father had died before he was born.

In the belief that because of her illness, Mrs. Grissom, then only 16, would be unable to give the child proper care, her foster

parents put the child up for adoption.

Neeley was adopted by Mr. and Mrs. Elmer Neeley of El Reno, Okla. They moved to Arkansas when he was about 12 and remained there about eight years.

Neeley left Arkansas in 1939 and traveled in the West. In 1941, he entered the Air Force. While serving as an instructor, he was sent as an instructor to a radio school the Air Force had acquired in Chicago. In Chicago, he met and married Florence Clark. Today, they have two sons and a daughter.

Neeley was shot down over Stetten, Germany, in World War II, but escaped through Denmark and crossed the Baltic Sea into Sweden.

After the war, he returned to Chicago for three years then reentered the Air Force in 1948. He returned to civilian life in 1953.

Mrs. Grissom last saw her son before the Friday meeting in Abilene in El Reno, Okla., when he was three years old. From El Reno, she moved to Oklahoma City where she married Grissom. In 1942 they moved to Cross Plains from Montana, where they had lived since 1948.

## Luck Bad For Twin But Brother's Good

If Donnie Rhodes takes a poor opinion of football, his viewpoint would be understood.

The 14-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Rhodes sustained a compound fracture of the leg in a B string football game at Eastland Saturday night. Earlier this season he received a broken nose and had just recently returned to play.

Whereas his luck has been bad, Donnie's twin-brother Ronnie is out for football every day and has been uninjured in a hard season of play.

"I sure keep my fingers crossed," said the boy's mother, Monday.

Donnie endured a painful day and night Sunday, however, the injured member has been set and he is now believed recovering normally.

He is Ralyeigh Audrey Archer, 50, who has many aliases and is known to have lived and worked in this area. He has said that he has relatives in this county.

Archer is being sought for violation of the Stolen Property Statute, says the FBI office in Dallas.

The FBI said Archer allegedly cashed a \$21,000 no account check in Florida and allegedly is a confidence man who has been married numerous times, leaving his brides after a few months when their funds are depleted.

Archer also has used aliases of Alden, Duteil, Duteil and Nabors. He has been a banker, appliance and furniture salesman, plumber, pipefitter, oil field worker, construction worker and compressor operator. He is about 5' 6", 170 to 190 pounds, with blond thin hair, blue eyes, scars on backs of right and left hands.

Any person having information which could assist in locating the fugitive is asked to contact the FBI.

## Winless Buffaloes Meet Unbeaten Bears Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes, winless in six starts this season, will meet possibly the strongest team they have faced in the current campaign Friday night, the Baird Bears who have not been defeated in a like number of outings.

The Bears, Friday night's hosts, who are eyeing the District 10-A title in their first year as a class A school for a number of seasons, boast the best offensive machine in the six-team circuit. They have scored 188 points in six games, an average of better than 31 points per game, while the defensive unit has allowed only a bit over seven points per tussle. On the other hand, the punchless Bison have managed only 12 points offensively, and have had 151 points scored against them.

Experience is Baird's trump, and the 24 returning lettermen is the basis on which many 10-A followers stake their prediction of a Baird dethronement of reigning Albany Lions. Ten seniors strengthen the squad with maturity and confidence, and two talented backs, of "the best backfield in the district," stated Coach Bill Gunn, quarterback Calvin Barnes, who has personally scored 94 points, and full-back Tommy Higgins, give the Bears power and speed in excess. Both Barnes and Higgins are four-year starters.

If indeed the county seat crew has a weakness it is a lack of size in the forward wall. But Baird's depth has very well taken care of that situation.

Two local gridirers are out for the season. Jack Baum, who sustained an arm injury week before last, and Freshman Donnie Rhodes who broke his leg in a "B" team game at Eastland last Saturday night will be out for the season.

Coach Bill Gunn said Monday that the two remaining reserve games had been canceled because of manpower shortage.

Play At Baird  
Gunn said that about 22 Buffs would make Friday's trip to the county seat. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

Series Record  
A check of records shows the two Callahan schools have met 31 times with Cross Plains having won 16 times and Baird 13. Two ties have been played.

Both elevens have put four straight victories in the records, although Cross Plains has produced the feat twice, in the seasons of '48-'51 and '54-'57. Baird accomplished the task in '34 and '35 and when the rivalry was renewed in '40 and '41.

Cross Plains holds the single game scoring mark with 41 points in 1950. The Herd has averaged 11.9 points per contest and Baird 10.5 on totals of 369 and 325 respectively.

Examinations were given to 17 Callahan County persons Saturday for a new job to be created at Cross Plains post office, that of carrier on a new rural route. The new route will begin Nov. 1, going from Dressy, thence to Burkett, thence to Cross Cut and return here. M. C. Baum, present carrier on Route 1 will take over Route 2. Eastland County school teachers have endorsed the candidacy of Woodrow Wilson for the presidency of the U. S.

Oct. 17, 1917: O. D. Strahan, who is serving with a regiment of engineers in military training at Camp Bowie, writes home to say that the 20,000 "Kaiser fighters" at his cantonment are getting restless for overseas duty. A lecture at Cottonwood Baptist Church Sunday night, given by a Japanese, was well attended. Bill Cross has returned from Stamford and is now working at Smedley's Barber Shop.

Oct. 20, 1922: Miss Gladys McDermott complimented friends, including a number from Cross Plains, with a chicken dinner at her home Sunday. Three local couples were married Sunday. They were: Lester Mannering and Wilda Beeler, Hillard Hill and Pauline Roach and Neal Nicholson and Pauline Wesley. Miss Leo Tyson, a teacher at DeLeon, spent the week end with home folk here. The bank at Pioneer has suspended business. Higginbothams advertises new men's suits at \$16.50. 2,625 bales of cotton have been sold here to date from the new crop.

**Ranger Defeats Buffaloes In District 10 Game Friday**

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes suffered their eighth straight set-back — six this season — in bowing to the Ranger Bulldogs 26 to 0, in the first district clash for each squad here Friday night.

Although outcome of the game was never in doubt after the visitors scored in the first two minutes of play, the contest was not without its thrills for Buffalo partisans. Three spectacular blocks by Jerry Payne, booming punts by Darrel Wyatt and Reggie Stover's demonstration of speed in overhauling from behind two Bulldog ball-carriers, both of whom were in open fields and apparently headed for paydirt, were a few of the feats which delighted home town fans.

Cross Plains kicked off to Ranger with L. H. Pounds, a 135-pound carton of celerity, taking the ball on his 20 and sprinting to the Buffalo 25, where Stover hauled him down from behind. A line play and penalty moved the ball 15 yards nearer for the Bulldogs. Three more thrusts at the forward wall were necessary for the score, with Pounds lugging the final three paces. Quarterback John McGhee's attempt to add a two-point conversion over center was smothered.

The second touchdown came early in the second chukker. After being held on their own 10, the visitors punted to mid-field. The ball took an erratic bounce and hit a Buffalo defender. Three Bulldogs covered it and the visitors were again in business. A 35-yard pass and run from McGhee to Jesse Renteria moved the scene of action to the herd's 15-yard marker. McGhee lofted a soft aerial to halfback Ray Newnham for the second TD. Jimmy Drennan added a two-point conversion over the

right side. Drennan scored again five and one-half minutes later with a 35-yard scamper around end. Lee Ausburne's attempt to drop kick the extra point was no good and the half ended 20 to 0.

The third period was scoreless with the Buffalo forward wall containing all offensive efforts well-short of pay property.

Final counter came with five minutes left in the last quarter with McGhee crossing the double stripe from the four, to which point the ball had been moved by a sustained drive with Pounds supplying most of the thrust. An attempted kick for the one-point conversion was smothered by a bevy of Buffalo linemen.

While Ranger took the win and moved 3-2-1 for the season, Cross Plains gained a standoff in the statistics. First downs were even at 12 each. Ranger gained 196 net yards rushing to the local's 120. In passing, Cross Plains connected on 11 of 22 heaves for a total of 83 yards. Ranger threw 10 times, completing only three for an aggregate of 49.
