Ronnie Edington, 15-year-old Cross Plains youth, was named Gold Star 4-H Club boy of Callahan County at an achievement day banquet held in the school cafeteria at Baird Monday night. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Deel Edington, who live five miles southwest of town.

Gold Star Girl is Vicki Finley, 17-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gene Finley of Baird. Presentation of both awards was made by Travis Allen, who is rounding out his first year as County Agent of Callahan County.

Thirty-five other 4-H members and two adult leaders received awards.

The awards were made following a talk by Curly Hays of Abilene of the special service department of West Texas Utilities Co.

### Commends Parents

Hays commended the parents and other adult leaders for their interest in the work of the boys and girls. Without the assistance and interest of the parents, neither the county agent nor the

boys and girls can carry on an active and successful program, he said.

Hays, who will contact thousands of youngsters in 4-H and FFA work during a year, said he has never encountered a delinquent among boys and girls who are enrolled either in 4-H, FFA or FHA.

The 4-H program offers an opportunity for boys and girls to express themselves in worthwhile projects. There is something to interest all of them and 4-H is the starting point for "their trip to the stars."

He commended them to attend the church of their choice regularly and to show love and respect for their parents.

Young Edington is a sophomore at Cross Plains High School where he is regarded as a top exhibitor and student leader in the Future Farmers of America program. He is following much in the footsteps of his father, who garnered numerous laurels at livestock exhibitions as an FFA youth here during the 1930's.

Ronnie's main projects have been feeding beef calves and lambs. He had the grand champion lamb at the Callahan County Livestock Exposition in January.

Miss Finley has been in 4-H work eight years and has also earned an impressive reputation as a livestock exhibitor. She now has four calves on feed, being groomed for livestock shows early next year.

## Old Paper Reveals W. R. Ely Was Detective As Well As Stern Judge

District Court judges seldom pinch-hit as detectives, or undercover agents in police work. Such was not always the case.

A yellowed, old copy of the Cross Plains Review, dated July 28, 1922, chronicles how District Judge W. R. Ely of Abilene doubled in brass to bring a culprit to justice. The old newspaper account follows:

"District Judge W. R. Ely visited the Cross Plains oil field Wednesday, and as a result of that visit the repu-

ration of Sherlock Holmes in detectivedom will be cast to shades along with the downfall of a dealer in brush beverage.

"The judge, having previously located the place (the paper doesn't say how), went alone to the abode of the bootlegger, which was hidden in a brushy thicket near the Pioneer highway, and was promptly sold a drink of the fiery fluid.

"Accompanied by Sheriff Hoot Corn, the Judge returned to the place a short while

later and astonished his sage brush benefactor by introducing himself as judge of the District Court. As if that had not sufficiently terrorized the culprit, Judge Ely then introduced his companion as the sheriff of Callahan County.

"The man, who gave his name as Jack Cauley, was placed under arrest and brought to jail in Cross Plains. When asked by local authorities what he had been doing, the bootlegger replied: 'Nothing, only sold the District Judge a drink.'"

## Putnam Grabs Grid Crown; Bi-District Tilt Thanksgiving

The Putnam Panthers, winners of District 12 Six-Man football, will meet Abbott at Cisco this afternoon, Thanksgiving, in a bi-district game at 2 p.m.

Putnam won the right to advance into the playoffs with a 46-40 victory over Carbon last Thursday night at Carbon. The Callahan County crew scored 34 points in the last half, 20 in the final period, to overtake the fighting Carbon sextet.

Putnam trailed 14-0 at the end of the first quarter, and was 16 points behind at intermission. But the Panthers stormed back in the second half and limited the hosts to 12 points, the same amount the visitors tallied in first half play.

Putnam has won eight games straight, and finished conference competition with a 4-0 mark.

Rickie Isenhower and Jerry Hock tallied one TD each and kicked two extra points.

## Albany Roars Past Herd 36-8 In Grid Finale Here

Fleet and shifty Albany backs ran the Lions to an undisputed district 10-A championship here Friday night in an easy 36-8 contest of the Buffaloes.

Albany will meet Burnet, District 9-A champs, at Brady Friday night at 7:30 for the bi-district championship.

The Shackelford County boys will be entering their third consecutive state playoff Friday in defense of their State Class A title.

The Lions, on top of the 10-A heap with a 5-0 record, were followed by Clyde's 4-1, Baird's 3-2, and Cross Plains, Eastland and Ranger's 1-4 marks.

In season standings Cross Plains was in last place with a 1-9 mark, and Clyde and Baird posted 8-2 records for top honors. Albany had a 7-3 showing.

The visiting Lions rolled up 30 points in the first half of the season finale for the Herd Friday, then played reserves the last 24 minutes who fought on almost even terms with the Buffaloes.

After an exchange of fumbles immediately following the opening kickoff Albany's all-state candidate, left halfback Jim Wood, raced 23 yards over the left side for the first tally. The 33-yard scoring drive came with just two and a half minutes gone in the initial quarter. Wood angled left tackle for the two point conversion.

Lion fullback Jack Lynch set up and scored the touchdown and conversion that moved Albany in front 16-0 in the first stanza. His 23-yard broken field masterpiece around right end put him into paydirt. Lynch reversed ends on the conversion. Lynch tallied again on an eight yard slant off left tackle with just under 10 minutes remaining in the second stanza. Right halfback Gary Hise knifed through the same slot for the two points.

With a minute and a half left in the first half the visitors tallied on one of their two completed passes. Quarterback Johnny Woodward heaved the spkin to left end Wayne Ballew who completed the 36-yard score. A two point conversion failed.

On the last play of the first half Cross Plains broke out of their own end of the field for the first time on an eight yard gain to the Lion 45.

**Second Half**  
An intercepted pass, one of three the Lions stole, set up Albany's final counter. Left halfback Gary Bartee circled right end for a 15-yard TD midway through the third quarter. Again the Buffs stopped a two point conversion try.

**Herd Moves**  
Buffalo Darrel Wyatt picked off a Lion aerial late in the third quarter, but a clipping penalty shoved the ball back to the Albany 39 which wiped out most of Wyatt's fine return run. In seven plays Cross Plains had scored for the last time in 1962. A seven yard jump pass from

quarterback Wyatt to left end Sam Odom got the tally, and the same senior combination worked for the two point conversion. Approximately half-way through the fourth chucker the Thundering Herd cranked up the longest march of the contest. The Bison sustained a 65 yard march for 12 plays to the Albany 15 before the Lions manned the barricades and turned back the penetration.

The five graduating seniors on the Buffalo squad served as captains in the 10-A game. They are quarterback Darrel Wyatt, fullback Jim Hartgrove, right guard Jerry Payne, left end Sam Odom and defensive tackle Terry Dewbre.

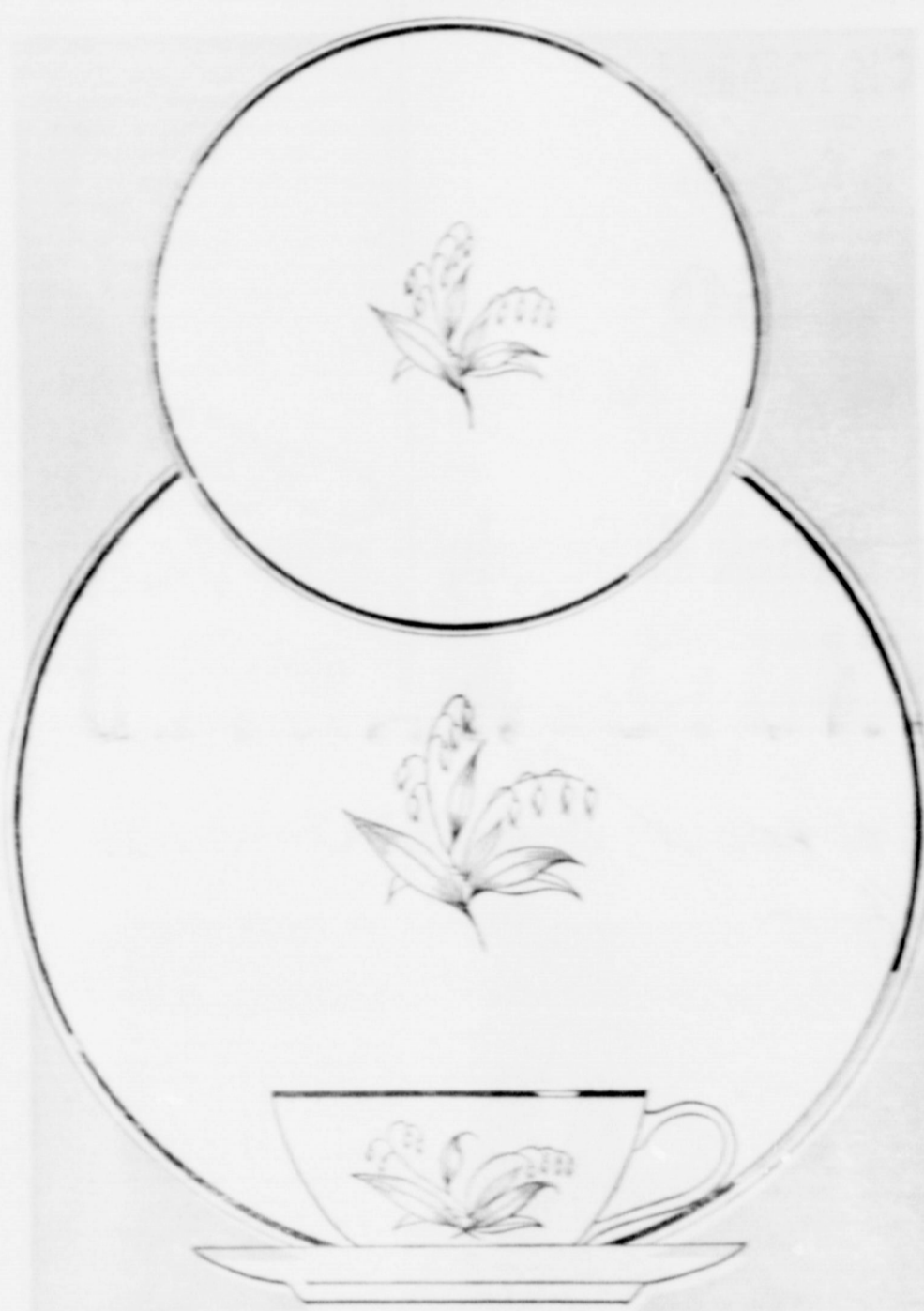

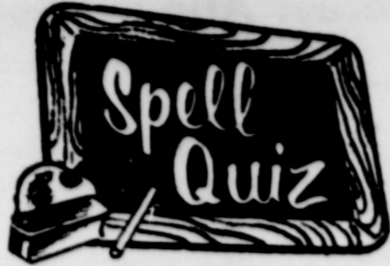
