Accidents Fewer At Thanksgiving

While Texas piled up the worst traffic record in the nation during the recent Thanksgiving holidays, the Cross Plains area experienced exactly the opposite.

Highway Patrolman Jerry Matthews reports only seven minor mishaps near here during the Thanksgiving week end and the issuance of only nine tickets for driving violations.

"I gave more traffic tickets on a single day during last year's Thanksgiving period," Matthews said.

The accident in which most damage was done occurred on a gravel road, two miles East of Cross Plains, where a 1956 Ford, driven by Kenneth Lowry hit a slick spot and overturned. None of the four occupants of the car was hurt, however, damage to

the vehicle was estimated at \$450.

Another minor mishap occurred in front of the First Baptist Church as services were being dismissed Sunday at noon. A vehicle driven by Freddy Johnston was involved in an accident with a car driven by Linda Bodine. Damage to the Johnston car was slight. The Bodine automobile sustained damages estimated at about \$400.

Five other minor accidents were investigated and reported by Matthews.

Peace officers of this area expressed themselves as pleased with the improved performance of motorists here during the holidays. Accidents were fewer despite unfavorable driving conditions as a result of rain and heavy fog.

James Apple Hit In Hand And Eye By Rifle Misfire

James Apple, 21-year-old Cross Plains man, barely escaped death in a hunting accident near Ranger Friday.

He was hunting on the John T. Robertson Ranch, about three miles northwest of Ranger, when a deer was spotted. Apple jumped out of a pick-up and dropped his loaded rifle. In effort to catch it, he grasped the barrel as the butt struck ground. The weapon fired, sending a charge through his hand and piercing his cheek bone under the right eye.

He was rushed to Ranger General Hospital and later transferred to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, where 25 shell fragments were removed from his face and eye. Reports yesterday were that sight of the eye had not been lost. The first and index fingers of his hand had to be amputated.

Reports from the bedside yesterday were that Apple is in a serious condition but recovering as normally as could be expected.

On the hunt with him were his wife, the former Joan McNutt, and two brothers-in-law, Gene Bush and Glen McNutt, all of Cross Plains.

200 Signatures For Baird Liquor Vote

Dec. 10 — second Monday in next month — is deadline for presentation of a petition to Callahan County Commissioners Court, asking that an election be called to legalize the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premises consumption in the city of Baird.

Nothing official was known in the county seat town Tuesday night as to how many signatures have been secured for the petition, however, usually well-informed sources said the number was near 200. A minimum of 150 signatures of qualified voters has been announced as the requirement.

If the petition, with sufficient legal signatures, is presented to Commissioners at their regular meeting Dec. 10, Texas statutes require that an election be ordered for not less than 20 and no more than 30 days. That would make election day some time near Jan. 1.

With 33 Days In Year Remaining 1962 Is Already Abnormally Wet

Intermittent showers of the past week dumped a total of .88 inch of moisture in Cross Plains. In many nearby localities the precipitations were heavier. The rainfall was sufficient in some rural areas to make roads difficult to travel. This has been particularly true along the route of Highway 206, North of town,

the local Farm Home Administration and the Agricultural Conservation and Stabilization Service.

In an organizational meeting Tuesday night Jack Scott of Cross Plains was named chairman of the countywide structure, Jerry Loper of Baird was elected vice-chairman and Mrs. Blain Odom of the Rowden area was chosen secretary. The trio, with Allen, Neal Eaves of the Farm Home Administration, D. C. Cox of the Soil Conservation Service and J. C. Earp of the ASCS office will meet again Thursday afternoon and select an executive committee to implement the program.

At the outset it was suggested that projects be set up which would be of interest to the people of the county as a whole, undertakings which would benefit the economic health of all areas.

Explaining the purpose of a county program building organization to the group Tuesday night was Garland Marshall, specialist with the Extension Service of Texas A&M College. He pointed out that other counties such as Callahan, where population is declining and sufficient job opportunities do not exist to keep a fair portion of young people in their home areas, this idea had been utilized to good advantage.

In calling the meeting to order Tuesday night Allen said that such organizations should be able to slow — and possibly reverse — the exodus of people from rural areas to metropolitan centers.

"There are many things we can do if we're willing to work at the job," he said. Cox, Eaves and Earp pledged facilities and resources of their respective agencies to an aggressive, beneficial set of projects.

In commenting on the new organization Allen said, "This group does not intend to supersede existing organization but hopes to work with all local units so that a framework can be constructed to coordinate all efforts in the same general direction."

Dr. Carl Sohns To Build New Clinic On N. Main

Cross Plains will soon get a new medical clinic.

Dr. Carl J. Sohns told the review late Monday that a business transaction is now underway in which he is purchasing a site at the North end of Main Street for the construction of a clinic and residence. The property is being purchased from Mrs. Tom Bryant.

Agreement has been reached with the City Council whereby approximately seven acres of the Bryant nursery property will be incorporated in the city limits. Plans call for the county road, running along the south side of the Bryant property to become a city street. Twenty feet will

be donated off the Bryant land to widen the street.

Mayor Ted Souder said Monday afternoon that the council had agreed to extend utility services to the Sohns clinic and subsequent development in the newly-incorporated tract. Land will also be given the city by Mrs. Bryant to open a street North of the Sohns Clinic, which will run East from Highway 206 to the end of the annexed acreage.

Legal details are now being worked out, preparatory to culminating the conveyances. Actual construction on the Sohns clinic will likely begin early next year.

Cotton, Peanut Allotments Being Fixed By Committee

Acreage allotments for the 1963 upland cotton and peanut crops are now being established for all eligible farms in Callahan County, according to Tommie Harris, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. Notices of the allotments will be mailed to farm operators before the Dec. 11 referendum on marketing quotas. A separate referendum will be held the same day at the same polling place on marketing quotas for the 1963 crop of cotton and peanuts.

If at least two-thirds of the growers approve, quotas will go into effect for the 1963 crop on cotton and for the next three crops on peanuts; marketing penalties will apply to any "excess" cotton or peanuts produced on the farm in instances where a farmer does not comply with his acreage allotment, and price support on the crop will be available at the full announced level.

On the other hand, if more than one-third of the growers voting oppose quotas, the quotas and marketing penalties will not be in effect for the 1963 crop, but allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for price support — which will then be available at 50 per cent of parity. In this event, another referendum would be held next year for the following three peanut crops.

Abbott Beats Putnam For Bi-District Crown

Putnam High School's Panthers dropped from the list of unbeaten and bowed out of post-season grid playoffs last Thursday afternoon at Cisco.

Abbott High School of Hill County inflicted both setbacks upon the Callahan County crew with a 58-38 beating in six-man bi-district play.

Putnam's famed last-ditch comeback, which led the Panthers to the District 12 Six-Man championship and an 8-0 regular season mark, failed to materialize Thursday, and Abbott swept to victory.

Putnam was not without its championship form however. The only football champ of this county rallied twice, to gain the lead in the initial quarter and knot the score in the third period.

Halfbacks Marvin Henry and Conrad Buchanan led Putnam in the losing effort. Henry gathered in two scoring passes and tossed three other touchdown aeriels. Buchanan heaved one T. D. pass and caught three. End Rickey Isenhower also flipped a touchdown strike.

Putnam led 14-13 late in the first stanza but fell behind 32-20 at halftime. The scrappy Panthers struck for two quick TDs early in the third quarter to tie the score 32-32, but Abbott's 26-point onslaught in the last half buried the Callahan bunch.

Abbott, winner of District 11, will meet Mullin High School of Mills County for the regional championship.
