Col. Lackland pointed out that the first parcel of land up for sale was that at the northwest corner of Main and 8th Streets, site of the Citizens State Bank here today.

Bidding was fast and enthusiastic and the first building site went to T. E. Powell and associates for \$750. The purchasers announced immediately that a bank would rise at that location. Other lots in the same block were hawked off rapidly, bringing comparable sums. First figures tallied revealed that \$55,000.00 worth of town lots had been sold in the initial go-round. Selling continued, however, and later counting showed \$75,000 spent for building sites that day.

Members of Cross Plains Townsite Company which promoted the sale and removal of the settlement to its present site were: C. H. Sharman, W. R. Wagner, J. A. Barr, S. F. Bond, B. B. Bond, H. J. Cureton, Sam Barr and W. E. Spencer. S. F. Bond is the only surviving member of the initial city fathers.

While Cross Plains has not equaled the spectacular stage of advancement Col. Lackland predicted, the town has become a focal point and trading center for an estimated 7,500 people and may even yet prove the old colonel a wise prophet. Who can say?




