### 2 Die Of Injuries Sustained In Collision At Intersection Near Rowden Saturday

Two are dead following a head-on collision at the intersection of Highways 36 and 283, four miles west of Rowden, Saturday afternoon at 1:20.

Thomas J. Ashley, 28, of Hawley died enroute to an Abilene hospital. Hospitalized with injuries are his wife, 24, and daughter, Marylou Lynn, 5.

Jess Moore, 68, of Abilene, a native of Cottonwood and Cross Plains, died Monday morning at 5:45 of injuries sustained in the mishap. His previous wife was killed in a traffic accident, 12 miles east of the intersection, April 19, 1955.

Highway Patrolmen Bob Favor of Baird and Jerry Mathews of Cross Plains said the Ashley car was traveling south on U. S. 283 and Moore was driving northwest on State Highway 36 to Abilene from Cross Plains.

Cross Plains will send exactly 100 entries to Callahan County Junior Livestock Show in Baird this week end. The event will be held at the rodeo grounds on Highway 80, one mile east of the courthouse.

James Snyder, general superintendent of this year's exhibition, said yesterday that interest, competition and prize money all pointed toward the best show ever held in the county.

Final tabulations had not been made yesterday but Snyder predicted that prize money would surpass the \$1,116.50 paid out last year.

Mr. Moore was born in Bosque County July 28, 1894, and had been in the construction business most of his life. He had been employed by Vaughn and Taylor Construction Co. of Odessa. He moved to Cross Plains at the age of five and lived here until six years ago

when he moved to Abilene. He was a member of the Elmwood West Lions Club and the Church of the Heavenly Rest.

The accident in which Mrs. Moore died less than eight years ago, happened just west of Cross Plains, where the pavement widens to accommodate the weighing of trucks and heavy vehicles. She and her husband had made their home on a farm five miles west of here, near the base of Caddo Peak.

As a result of lessons learned in the pilot undertaking, Westernman plans to increase his hot-house capacity before next year and produce tomatoes and other vegetables in commercial quantities. He expects to have a crop of fresh squash ready for the market late in February.
