



# 25 Students See Youth Of Their Age Tried In Court

Twenty-five senior students taking government in Cross Plains High School got an insight of justice at work last week as they watched a youth of their own age stand trial in 42nd District Court at Baird, on a charge of cattle theft.

Joe Connell, 19-year-old Eula High School student, was given a two-year sentence in the state penitentiary with specifications by the jury that the term not be suspended.

His young wife, herself a high school student at Clyde, broke into tears after the jury's decision was read.

The jury deliberated about 45 minutes before deciding on Connell's punishment.

Connell's attorney, Gaston Swafford of Clyde, declined to say whether the verdict would be appealed.

Witnesses called during the morning by the prosecutor, Dist. Atty. Nelson Quinn, included Mrs. R. L. Griggs, owner of the ranch three miles south of Baird, where the cattle were stolen.

Quinn read the statement in which the theft was admitted, by Connell implicating six other Callahan County residents who also have been charged in the offense.

Quinn also introduced a check for \$879.77 paid by the Farmers and Ranchers Livestock Auction of Abilene for the four cows and four calves taken from the ranch.

Connell's father, Eb Connell of Rt. 2, Clyde, accompanied his son in the courtroom.

Witnesses called by Swafford

included Eula School Supt. James Lancaster and Joe Youngblood, Eula High School principal and coach, both of whom said Connell's reputation was good as a student.

Quinn asked Youngblood if he had heard if Connell had previously been charged with several criminal offenses. Youngblood answered he had not.

Dr. Robert Evans, Clyde physician, was called by Swafford and testified that Connell has a chronic asthmatic condition which limits the type of work he can perform.

Three Callahan County officials testified when called by Quinn that Connell's reputation in the community was bad. They were: Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton, Sheriff Homer Price, and County Judge Byron Richardson, a former deputy sheriff.

High School Principal Billy Mac Copping, instructor of the government class polled his students as to how they would have voted, had they been members of the jury. Eighteen of the group favored a term of from two to five years not suspended and seven balloted for suspension of a two-year term.

Following the court trial the students were given a conducted tour of the courthouse by Judge Richardson, County Attorney James Paul Shanks and Sheriff Homer Price. Functions of various offices were explained.

After the courthouse tour, students were taken through the recently-renovated Callahan County jail.

"The experience was worth more than six weeks in the classroom," Copping said of the students' visit to Baird.

## Ex - Postmaster At Putnam Dies At 69

Ernest C. Waddell, 69, retired Putnam postmaster, died Sunday afternoon at 2:20 in a Veterans Hospital at Big Spring, following a lengthy illness.

He was postmaster at Putnam 29 years and retired last Aug. 31.

Born in Whitewright, Tex., Aug. 25, 1894, he moved to Abilene in about 1908. He went overseas in World War I, serving in the U. S. Army. He moved to Putnam in 1926 and married Aura Clinton April 4, 1925 in Eastland.

He worked for the Humble Co. prior to going to work for the post office.

He was a member of the Baptist Church and affiliated with the Masonic Lodge.

Survivors beside his wife are a daughter, Aura Francis Waddell of Dallas; one son, Clinton of Putnam; one grandson; two brothers, Vernon P. of Houston and John F. of Winters; one sister, Mrs. Vona Scarborough of Houston.

## Johnston Unseats Mobil As Leader

Johnston Truck & Supply jumped from third into the top spot in Cross Plains Bowling Club standings last week replacing George Hutchins Mobil which had occupied the number one position for seven consecutive weeks.

Mobil has dominated first place throughout this season. The quintet has either been sole possessor or shared the lead 12 of the 15 weeks.

Johnston Truck backed into first place last Thursday night, although the squad blanked Mayes Flower Shop 4-0, Higginbothams, last week's number four team, and Sisters Cafe, fifth place, enabled the truckers to vault past Mobil and D. Higginbothams' shutout marked the first time this season Mobil had been blanked, and pushed the merchants into a second place tie with the defeated unit. Gulf tumbled from second to fourth place. Mayes Flowers' resurgence was halted and the florists remained in the league cellar.

Although a major shake-up in standing resulted, the race for the title is a very close affair. Only two games separate the first place team and the number four quintet. Sisters, in fifth, is nine games off the pace with 10 weeks, 40 games, remaining.

Dan Johnston, JT&S, paced his team to victory with the best series of 504, an average of 168, and he shared high-game honors with Mobil's Raymond Franke, each rolling a 190 game.

Gulf's Benny Glover posted a 503 aggregate for a 167 average, and Wayne Graves, Higginbothams, was third with a total of 494, averaging 164. Jean Bonner, Mayes, rolled a 181 for third high game laurels.

# County Library Becoming Place Of Interest

In observance of Texas Week, the Callahan County Library at Baird has ordered a number of new books.

For the Texas Shelf, a biography "Mary Austin Holley" by Rebecca Smith Lee, which won the \$1,000 non-fiction award of 1963 given by the Texas Institute of Letters recently, is outstanding. This book was given by the Corinne Blackburn Club in memory of Mrs. L. L. Blackburn who was a pioneer resident of Callahan County. "Ship of Fools" by Katherine Anne Porter won a \$1,000 award for the best novel of 1963. "Life in the Saddle" by Mrs. Joe A. Clarke of Fort Worth is the biography of an early-day Texas ranchman, Frank Collinson. "The Regional Vocabulary of Texas" is an outstanding and unusual book by Dr. E. Bagby Atwood, a member of the University of Texas faculty, who once taught English in Baird High School. "Good Land" and a new prize winning book, "Room to Grow," both by Loula Grace Erdman should be popular.

A new book for devotees of China painting is "China Painting for Pleasure and Profit" by Ruth Little, well-known artist of Lubbock. This book was given by several ladies of Baird who dedicated it to their teacher, Mrs. Myrtle George of Ranger.

For general information about Texas these titles will be useful: "Courthouses of Texas" by

Clark Coursey of Brownwood, "Guide to Texas", "1963 World Almanac", "Information Please Almanac" and "Book of Facts."

In addition to these books a number of other titles by popular authors such as Margaret C. Banning, Frances P. Keyes, Frank Slaughter and James Wycoff will be available. There are three reference books on "History of the Great Hymns;" there are eight new biographies for teenagers, and several titles of Westerns, romances and mysteries have been purchased.

Mrs. Rosa Ryan, library clerk, stated that during the year 1962 a total of 6,933 books was circulated to readers from every part of the county, and during January 1963, readers checked out 675 books.

The Pioneer Museum which occupies part of the Library room is also very popular. Recently Postmaster Roy Gilbreath of the Baird office gave a number of documents connected with early day post office history. One especially interesting relic is a canceler used to stamp letters from the Belle Plain office in 1909.

Barton, granting him the contract to carry mail from Tecumseh to Eagle Cove by way of Dudley. Mrs. Wilkerson also gave a memorial card honoring an early-day Callahan County physician, Dr. Charles Shapard.

Lloyd Huff of Clyde, one of the old-time clocks in the museum has been repaired and is now being used by readers and visitors.

The Library-Museum is located in the basement of the courthouse, and is open from one to five p.m. Monday through Friday.

## Trustees Endorse Building 2 Lakes

Local school trustees have joined city officials, the Lions Club and Chamber of Commerce in urging directors of Central Colorado Soil Conservation District to favor construction of retention lakes on streams in this county to be used as municipal water supplies for the cities of Cross Plains and Clyde.

A letter from the board was mailed Tuesday to Weston Edworthy of Clyde, a member of the board of supervisors for the soil conservation district.

The letter read: "The Board of Trustees of the Cross Plains Independent School District, Cross Plains, Texas, in their regular meeting on February 23, 1938, unanimously went on record in favor of inclusion of municipal and other waters in one or more structures of the Upper Pecan Bayou Watershed Work Plan. The City of Cross Plains does, in the opinion of the Board of Trustees, need a more adequate municipal water supply than the present source and, based upon our understanding, we urge that you give due consideration to inclusion of municipal and other water storage in one or more of the flood prevention structures.

"If we can be of assistance to you in further pursuit of this or other problems of mutual interest, please let us know."

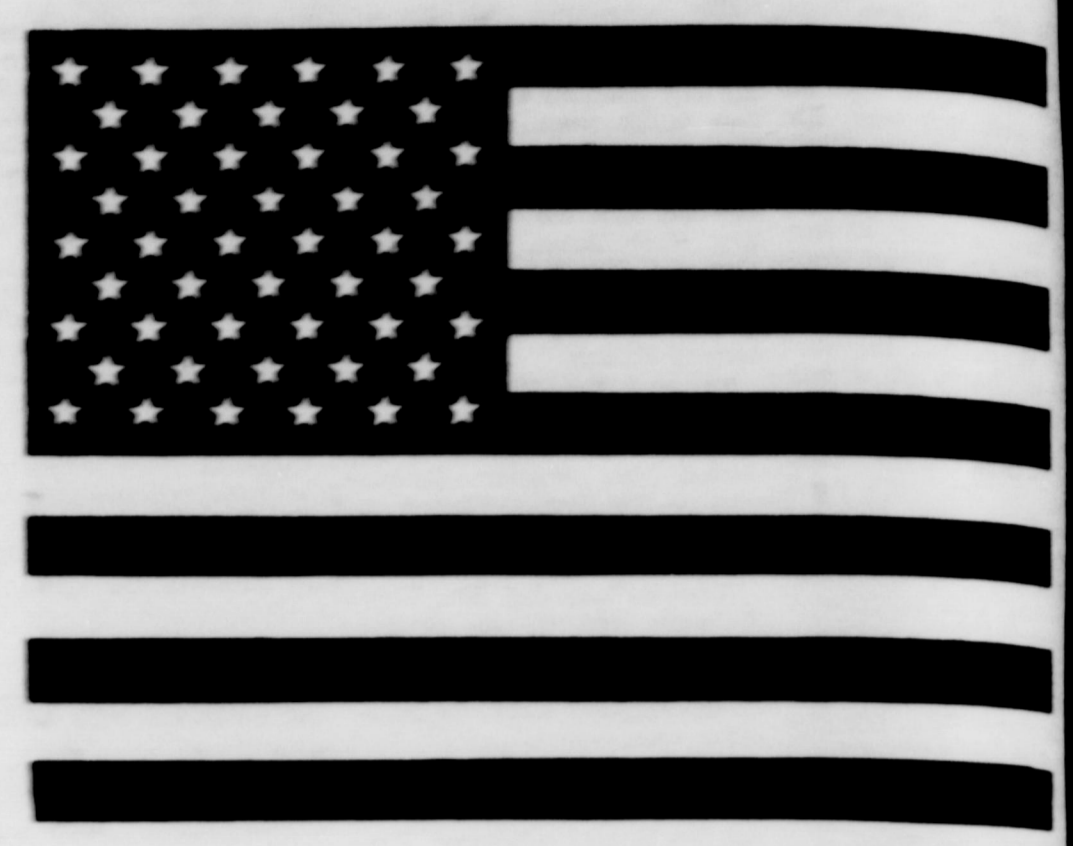
