2 Towns Told How To Begin Lake Planning

Possible ways for Cross Plains and Clyde to secure municipal water supplies on the Upper Pecan Bayou and its tributaries were outlined at a meeting in the City Hall here Tuesday morning, attended by officials and civic leaders of the two towns.

Clyde Graham of Temple, State Soil Conservation Service staff member in charge of water development, explained methods for the two cities to enter into joint lake building projects with the SCS, whereby federal monies are available for most of the cost.

"I'm not here to sell you on a program of lake building," he said, "but if such is your need and intention, to assure that SCS is ready to help in every possible way."

Explanations revealed that the SCS has set up a preliminary work plan calling for 33 to 35 flood prevention dams to be built from the mouth of Turkey Creek to Clyde. It was pointed out that if Clyde and Cross Plains wish to enter into joint projects with the SCS, two desirable sites are available. The one near here is nine miles west of town on Burnt Branch Creek. That near Clyde is seven miles southeast of the town on the Upper Bayou.

The lake near Cross Plains drains an estimated 10,000 acres. The site near Clyde drains approximately 20,000.

If one or both cities decide to enter into a lake building project with SCS the number of retention dams above the site would be lessened to assure ample flow into the municipal reservoirs.

Fire Destroys House At Pioneer Monday

Fire, believed to have originated from a faulty hot-water heater, completely destroyed the five room home and contents of Mr. and Mrs. Bart Brown, just west of Pioneer on FM Road 374, Monday afternoon.

The family was away at the time.

When Cross Plains firemen arrived on the scene the house was enveloped in flames. Nothing could be salvaged. Firemen did, extinguish a grass fire which originated from sparks

The plan as outlined Tuesday morning was briefly this: Should SCS elect to build a 3,000 acre feet lake at the site near Cross Plains, the city could add an additional 2,000 acre feet by paying 40 per cent of the cost. Land procurement would be an obligation of the municipality, however, if the lake were enlarged to include an additional 1,000 acre feet to be designated as recreational water, SCS would pay one-half of land costs as well as one-half of minimum recreational facilities such as: sanitation, beach area, ramp, picnic tables, public water supply, access roads and parking lot.

Mayors of both Cross Plains and Clyde were told that the first step to be taken was to retain a consulting engineer to provide the necessary advice both city councils would require. Too, the engineer would secure necessary permits from the state water board and work with SCS during the period of construction.

Representing Cross Plains at the meeting were: Mayor Ted Souder, Alderman Ira Hall, Vice President of the Chamber of Commerce George Hutchins, Fred Tunnell and Jack Scott. Clyde was represented at the meeting by Weldon Edwards, director in Central Colorado Soil Conservation District; Mayor Buck Lunsford, Alderman Bill Shelton and Banker Lee Loper. Others present at the meeting included E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area soil conservationist; D. C. Cox of Baird, local soil conservationist, and Paul Kenner, field survey engineer with SCS at Brownwood.

COACH HIRED

Cross Plains school board met Monday night and disposed of a heavy business docket.

Action taken included: hiring a head coach, reelecting all school employees and bus drivers, extending the contracts of three administrators for another year, accepting resignations of three elementary school teachers and reorganizing the board of trustees.

After interviewing seven applicants, screened from a list of more than 20, trustees delegated Supt. Paul Whitton to go to Waxahachie Tuesday and investigate James R. Farmer, line coach of the 3-A high school team there, and if his findings coincided with data studied by the board Monday night, to offer him a contract.

Accordingly, Whitton made the trip and found the man highly recommended. The contract was offered and Farmer has agreed to notify the board within a few days whether or not he will accept.

Farmer is a man of about 25 years of age, a graduate of East Texas State with a double major in math and physical education. He has three years coaching experience. His family consists of his wife and two children. Both he and Mrs. Farmer are teachers in the Presbyterian Sunday School at Waxahachie.

His football career began as an All-City guard for Crozier Tech High School in Dallas. He lettered on the freshman team at Texas A&M. under Bear Bryant his first year in college and then transferred to East Texas State. He lettered three years there, being a starting guard on offense and a middle guard on defense. He was an all-conference lineman two years and all-Texas one season. It was during his playing days that East Texas went to the Tangerine Bowl in Florida.

New Gas Proposal Given City Council

The third of three recent proposals to supply the City of Cross Plains with natural gas for its municipally-owned distributing system is now being studied by members of the City Council.

The latest offer came from

W. B. Evans of Lubbock, partner in the firm now wholesaling gas to the municipality. A 10-year contract will expire May 1, 1964.

6-Year Offer

Evans proposed to re-contract with the city for a six-year

period, agreeing to lay a line from a well on the C. L. Smith place, one mile northeast of town, to feed the distributing system from the north. This source would be in addition to gas now being supplied city lines in the south section of town, near the intersection of Highway 36 and Main Street.

Councilmen have expressed themselves as favoring an additional source entering the distributing system from the north, explaining that pressure would thereby be better equalized.

In addition, the Evans offer would include installation of baffle-type separators to trap foreign matter from main lines and prevent it entering the distributing system. Too, the city would be given jurisdiction over employees controlling the flow from supply wells.

Price Increase

The Evans offer calls for a 20 per cent increase in price, making gas delivered to the city gate 22 cents per thousand cubic feet as compared with the present 20 cent price. It is lower, however, than either of the other propositions offered by competing sources of supply.

Mayor Ted Souder opined Monday that the council would probably enter into no contract for another several months. "We want to explore every possibility and make the very best deal we can for our people."

It is pointed out, though, that a new contract will need to be negotiated well ahead of May 1, 1964, to assure the future supplier ample time to lay necessary lines and install additional equipment.

Cross Plains average about \$1,320 per month.

Another meeting between Evans and the City Council was to have been held Wednesday night.

F.F.A. Land Judgers Snare Area Diadem

Cross Plains High School's land judging team took first place in Area IV contests at Tarleton State College in Stephenville Saturday.

Competing with 66 other schools, the local squad composed of Arthur Roody, Guye Archer, Mike Montgomery and Bobby Morgan, scored 513 points as compared with 499 for second place Stephenville and 498 for third place Hico.

Roody topped the Cross Plains team with most outstanding performance and was fifth high individual among 108 youths competing in the land judging event.

Three other local judging teams also participated in area contests. They were in poultry, livestock and dairy events.

The poultry team composed

of Jack Webb Baum, Tommy Cowan and Donny Miller finished 10th.

The livestock squad composed of Scott Odom, Eddie Elliott and Jimmy Hargrove was 12th.

The dairy team made up of Morris Belew, Eddy Don Edmondson and Charles Barr finished 25th.

By virtue of the victory in area competition, the land judging team will go to Texas A&M College to participate in statewide contests later this Spring.

Judging teams were accompanied to Stephenville by Agriculture Instructor O. B. Edmondson and two Texas A&M seniors, John Holland and Joe Oden, who are doing practice teaching in the local school system.

Crops Revitalized By Week End Rain

Slow, gentle rains which fell over much of Texas Thursday and Friday, measured .73 of an inch in Cross Plains.

Only three other precipitations have been recorded here this year. Each measured .25 of an inch, making the total received during 1963 now 1.48 inches. Average for this date is about four inches.

Although the week end rains were not as heavy as desired, they added vitality to small grain crops and rejuvenated pastures. The fall was never hard here and all moisture soaked into the earth. No local streams ran.

Garrett Warehouse Made City's Interim Fire Station

The Garrett warehouse building on West 8th Street became a temporary fire station Monday night.

Trucks and equipment were moved there to permit removal of the old fire house and construction of another building on the site.

Contract to remove the sheetiron building five blocks east, adjacent to the city water settling basin, was awarded to Charley Teague.

Plans are to begin construction of a new masonry fire station soon. Contract is expected to be let by the City

Council within the next two weeks. More than \$1,200 to be used in payment of the new fire station was raised by volunteer firemen in a recent financial campaign. Remainder of the cost will be borne by the city.

Fire Chief Travis Foster has asked that no vehicles be parked in front of the temporary station.

The temporary quarters are being provided by C. M. Garrett without cost and volunteer firemen passed a unanimous vote of appreciation to him in regular meeting Monday night.

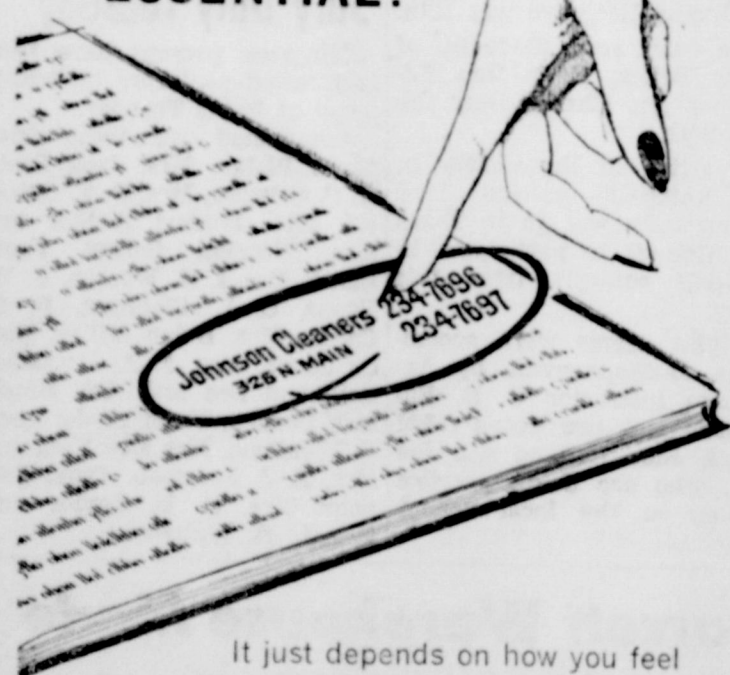

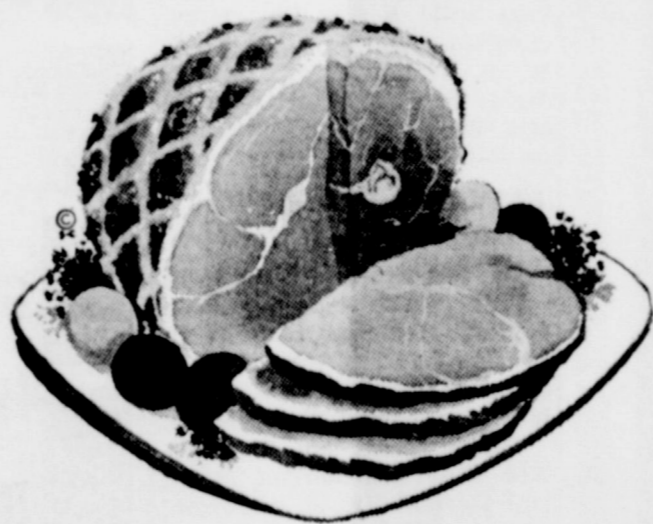

Local Teacher With 33 Years In Classroom Nearing End Of Trail

After 33 years of teaching more than 1,000 children their A, B, C's and mopping countless thousands of runny noses, Mrs. Charles Ballew is nearing the end of a long, long trail.

She will retire as first grade teacher in the local school system at the end of the current term.

"It's been a lot of fun, a rewarding experience," she says, "and I'll probably feel faint when school bells toll next Fall, but right now I'm looking forward to my long-neglected chore of homemaking."

The genial Ruby, as she is affectionately known to fellow teachers, first became a "school marm" at the tender age of 16, instructing the primary grades at Coyote Peak, a two-teacher institution, midway between Pioneer and Rising Star. Since then she has taught at Pioneer, Rising Star, George Hill and the past 15

years in Cross Plains. The local system has two first grades and teacher of the other section is Mrs. C. C. Westerman, who was once a pupil of Mrs. Ballew.

Actually, Mrs. Westerman is only one of many present day teachers who began their education in Mrs. Ballew's first grade. There are superintendents, principals and more than a dozen instructors of note in her memories of former students.

"I've had some dandies," she says, "and loved them every one."

Looking back across an eventful career, Mrs. Ballew feels her most exciting and difficult years were at Pioneer, during the rip-roaring oil boom days of the early 1920's. The community's migratory population, sometimes estimated as high as 10,000, dumped many of its problems at the school house door and "Miss Ruby" became not only their teacher but social worker, truant officer and sometimes foster parent.

"I feel that quitting time has come," Mrs. Ballew says with a tinge of remorse, "and there's no finer place to bow out than in Cross Plains where my happiest days have been spent. I've been privileged to teach exceptional children and had the cooperation and affection of so many wonderful parents and fellow-workers."

"If I had a parting statement to make," she says, "I think this would be it: I'd

like to thank every parent of the children whose lives I have shared and endeavored to enrich."

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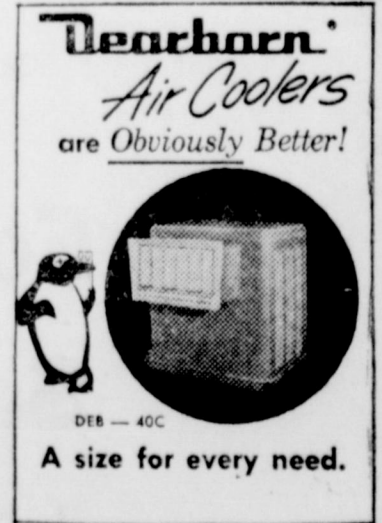
