92 Student Musicians Play Concert Tuesday

Ninety-two student musicians will be heard next Tuesday night as Cross Plains school bands are presented in annual spring concert. Beginning time is 7:30.

The grade school band, composed of 32 fifth and sixth graders will play first, followed by the high school band of 60 pieces.

Director Wayne McDonald said yesterday that the high school band will feature a trumpet trio, played by Karen Calhoun, Larry Boyle and Rick Latson, and a trombone trio of Freddy Johnston, Terry Harris and Gene Thomas. They will also play selections of George Gershwin and other numbers.

Something new will be tried at this year's concert. The band will attempt a sight-reading demonstration for the first time before an audience. McDonald will pass out music for a number never before played by the band. Students will attempt its playing with no prior preparation. Such challenges are offered bandsmen at contests, but then only before judges, not the critical eyes and ears of an audience.

"We hope this proves interesting to the public and is not embarrassing to us," McDonald said.

Closing portion of the concert will be a program by the 16-piece stage band. Soloists to be featured will include: Karen Calhoun, Larry Boyle, Freddy Johnston, Jack Baum, Patty Pennell and Mickey Freeman, as well as the entire trombone section on one number.

Tickets for the Tuesday night concert are 25 and 50 cents and may be purchased at the door or from any member of the school bands.

WATER USE IS RISING AS WEATHER WARMS

Water consumption is jumping.

From an average of 75,000 gallons used daily here during winter months, demands have already risen over 100,000. Arrival of Summer and 100 degree temperature will send demands to 150,000 gallons for each 24-hour period, A. B. Foster, water superintendent, predicts.

Elevation here is 1,717 feet.

Coach Takes Job; Assistant Elected

James R. Farmer of Waxahachie has accepted the head coaching job at Cross Plains High School and an assistant has been elected.

Farmer's signed contract was received by Superintendent of Schools Paul Whitton Tuesday morning.

Chosen as Farmer's assistant

by the board of trustees was Lee King, quarterback and star performer of last season's McMurry Indians. He will complete college work in July and graduate in August.

Farmer and King will have charge of all athletics except basketball, which will be coached by Bill Gunn, who relinquished tutelage of other teams.

King, a graduate of Ranger High School, was starting quarterback for McMurry and played safety on defense. His passing established a new record of completions for the Abilene college and was a major scoring threat of the versatile Indian offense. He lettered three years each in football and golf at McMurry.

King is married and he and his wife expect a new member of the family in September. They are members of the Methodist Church.

Acceptance of his contract by Farmer brought delight to trustees, who had screened more than 20 applicants for the head coaching job here and remained in session until after midnight in their last meeting, at which time he was chosen.

Farmer, in addition to an illustrious record in athletics will bring to the local faculty qualifications to teach high school mathematics.

King, a major in physical education with a minor in history, will probably be assigned to social subjects in junior high school.

Callahan Tax Adjustments Will Increase Some Levies

Faced with declining renditions from oil, Callahan County Commissioners Court will sit as a board of equalization May 14, and raise tax levies to compensate for the loss.

The court was recently told by a representative of Latham, King and Rash of Dallas, the firm which fixes tax levies on petroleum and utility properties in this county, that indications pointed to a possible million and one-half dollars decline in ren-

ditions from those sources.

Assessed valuation of the county last year was barely above \$12,000,000. A rendition of more than \$11,000,000 is said to be the bare minimum for the present budget.

Commissioners will sit as tax equalizers three or four days, going over the entire tax roll, then mail out notices to property owners whose renditions are to be raised and permit each to appear before the court.

Call 5 Meetings To Air Wheat Election

Five meetings will be held throughout Callahan County to explain questions involved in a nationwide wheat referendum to be held May 21.

First meeting will be in the Putnam school building the night of April 22, the next at the Eula school building the following night, then at Oplin school house the next night, in the county courtroom in the courthouse at Baird the next night, and the final gathering

in the school auditorium at Cross Plains the next night, April 26. All sessions are to begin at eight o'clock.

Tommie J. Harris, Arno C. Roggenstein and Harold Holden, members of the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, have issued a joint statement in which they say that no attempt will be made to influence wheat farmers but that purpose of the meetings is to explain the issues involved and answer questions.

Old Ranch Home Given Medallion

On recommendation of Callahan County Historical Survey Committee, a State Historical Building Medallion was recently placed on the former residence of John D. Merchant, who with his twin brother, Clabe Merchant, migrated to Callahan County prior to its organization. The building is presently owned by Mrs. A. R. Kelton of Baird.

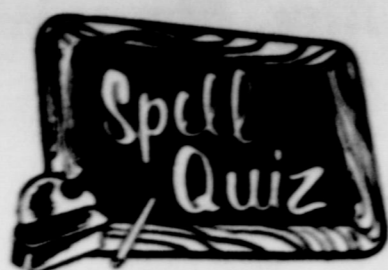
This building is located a short distance northeast of the site of old Belle Plain and is in good state of preservation. Merchant was an early cattleman and member of the first Commissioners Court after the organization of the county in 1877.

After the removal of the county seat from Belle Plain to Baird in 1883, he moved to the new town of Abilene and constructed on North Grape Street a replica of his former Belle Plain residence. This was his home for many years. The building was recently torn down to make room for the Merchant Park business square.

Callahan County Historical Survey Committee has undertaken to place markers on all unmarked graves of both Confederate and Union veterans of the Civil War, and solicits help of descendants of these veterans in locating their place of burial.

Buildings which have received the Historical Marker to date are: the old County Jail that was moved from Belle Plain to Baird, the Dr. John Collier residence at Baird and the Merchant residence at Belle Plain.
