Car-Train Crash Claims Life Of Ex-Local Woman

Mrs. Bon Huntington, 55, of Snyder, a former long-time resident of Cross Plains and Sabanno, was killed Friday morning when her pick-up collided with a railroad train just outside the

Snyder city limits. Mrs. Huntington was alone in the vehicle, apparently enroute to a hospital where she was employed as a member of the housekeeping staff.

The truck was spun by the impact, knocking down a railroad signal light at the side of the highway. Workmen labored with the wreckage 10 minutes before Mrs. Huntington's body could be removed.

Funeral was held from the First Presbyterian Church in Snyder Monday morning at 10 with graveside rites and burial in Elmwood Memorial Park in Abilene at 2 p.m.

Mrs. Huntington was born at Sabanno Aug. 14, 1908, and spent most of her life in Cross Plains, moving from here two years ago to Scurry County.

Survivors are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Loren Barron of route 4 Cisco; three daughters, Mrs. Rankin Blackburn of Brownfield, Mrs. Clifton McCullum and Mrs. Grover Gilbert, both of Snyder; two sons, Vernon of Jal, N. M., and James of Snyder; one sister, Mrs. Harold Freeman of Mathis; one brother, Clifton Barron of Snyder; and 10 grandchildren.

Ask Bids On Dams Near Cottonwood

Invitations for bids to build two more flood retention dams in the Cottonwood area are now being sought by the Soil Conservation Service.

Contracts are to be let June 5 for projects on the places of

Mrs. Dutch Holley and Mrs. Charley Coats. Bids will be opened at 2 p.m. that day in SCS headquarters in Temple.

Estimated contents of the major items of construction are: 260,750 cubic yards of compact-

ed earthfill material, 133 cubic yards of reinforced concrete and 410 feet of spun concrete pipe for installation of principal spillways, 193 feet of corrugated metal pipe for toe drains, 81,460 square yards of topsoil to be placed in emergency spillway and embankments for establishing grass, and 16,700 feet of fencing to protect dams and spillways for minimum maintenance costs.

Construction is scheduled to begin within 20 days following awarding of a contract and shall be completed within 305 calendar days from beginning. Construction of the two floodwater retarding structures will be under the supervision of Ralph W. White, Project Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service in Brownwood according to E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationist, Brownwood. Sites 1A and 1B Turkey Creek represents the eleventh and twelfth of the planned thirteen floodwater retarding structures to be constructed. Site 11 located approximately three miles below Cross Plains is the only structure remaining for construction.

Land rights and easements for construction are provided by the Turkey Creek Conservation District with operation and maintenance performed by the Central Colorado and Brown-Mills Soil Conservation Districts and Commissioners Courts from Callahan and Brown Counties. Conservation Programs on the land above flood water retarding structures are a vital part of the Upstream Flood Prevention Program and assistance is provided for planning and applying conservation measures by Work Unit offices of the Soil Conservation Service at Baird and Rising Star, according to Hughes.

Stock Barn Fund Soars To \$9,005

When 66 gifts had been totaled Wednesday morning, Edwin Baum chairman of the financial campaign to raise funds for a livestock exhibition building in Cross Plains, announced 60 per cent of the goal had been reached.

Contributions to date aggregate \$9,005. Total cost of the project is expected to be \$15,000 exclusive of a valuable 7-acre tract of land, one mile north of town, which was donated by Mrs. E. I. Vestal and members of her family.

Plans are to construct an 8,000 square foot building — 80 by 100 feet — of colored sheet-metal. The property is to be equipped with its own water well, sewer facilities and attractively fenced.

Although the building is primarily to house Callahan County Junior Livestock Shows, which will henceforth be held in Cross Plains, it will be available for other similar events. The supervision committee to determine use of the structure will be composed of Deel Edgington, O. B. Edmondson, Tommie Harris and Morris Odom.

Persons who have not yet made contributions to the project are reminded by Baum that donations should be sent in as soon as conveniently possible.

"This is the first time our community has ever had the opportunity to gain an installation of countywide significance and we must demonstrate our gratitude by measuring up in every way," Baum said.
