May Rains Break Lengthy Drought

Hard showers, accompanied by light hail, fell over the Cross Plains area early Tuesday morning. In Cross Plains it was measured at 2.40 inches, however, in the Cottonwood sector some gauges registered as much as five inches. May has proved to be the wettest month here since last September, breaking a drought which was becoming severe and many farmers and ranchmen faced shortages of stock water.

8 New Lakes Catch Enough Water To Run City 17 Years

Eight flood prevention dams, recently completed in the Cross Plains area, caught 496,888,920 gallons of water this week as rains fell over the watershed. The amount of water impounded was enough — without evaporation — to supply the city of Cross Plains 17 years.

D. C. Cox, Baird soil conservationist, estimated yesterday that the retarding structures prevented Turkey Creek from overflowing its banks and doing extensive damage.

Of 11 dams proposed for the Cross Plains area eight are now complete two are under construction and one is tied-up in litigation.

A survey Monday morning of water impounded revealed the following:

Damsite 2 on the Coats and Odell places west of Cottonwood, lake full.

Damsite 3, on the L. G. Dean farm, four miles west of Cottonwood, lake full.

Damsite 4, on the W. B. Varner estate land, two miles north of Cottonwood, presently under construction.

Damsite 5, on the Billy Richards place, three and one-half miles northeast of Cottonwood, lake full.

Damsite 6, on the Frank Woody place, south of Cottonwood, lake full.

Damsite 7, on the Ted Souder farm, four miles northwest of Cross Plains, water in three feet of the principal spillway.

Damsite 8, on the Damon D. Jones place, southwest of Cottonwood, lake full and plans being made to install irrigation equipment as soon as clearance is obtained from governmental officials.

Damsite 9, on the Oliver D. Worthy — old Charley Barr farm — two miles north of Cross Plains, lake full.

Damsite 10, on Mrs. Porter J. Davis land, three miles southwest of Cross Plains, lake full.

Damsite 11, on Mrs. Augusta Koenig and C. B. Edington lands, lake almost full.

Texas Top Shooters Elect Local Man Secretary Of State Body

J. L. (Pokey) Bonner and daughter, Mrs. Jean Whitton, competed Saturday and Sunday in state championship matches of Texas Bench-Rest Shooters Association, held at the Gun Club's rifle range in San Angelo. Bonner, who was named secretary-treasurer of the statewide organization, placed fourth in 200 yard aggregate competition and was a top scorer in four individual matches. His daughter, who was scoring well in the 100-yard unrestricted gun class until her weapon became inoperative, was forced to withdraw.

Water Use Here At Half Expected Peak

Water consumption was less than half a million gallons in Cross Plains last week. Total pumpings for Monday and the six days preceding amounted to 450,000 gallons. Water use will jump near a million gallons weekly with the arrival of 100-plus temperature.

Stock Barn Drive Stalls At \$12,403

A campaign to raise \$15,000 to build a Callahan County junior livestock exposition building in Cross Plains appeared stalled yesterday with a total of \$12,402 in the till.

"We've done well to this point," said Edwin Baum, chairman of the undertaking, "however, a fast 90-yard run will not win a 100-yard dash; we must redouble our efforts and enthusiasm."

Baum reminded to raise the remaining \$2,598, it would take 104 more contributions of \$25 each.

"Some of our team solicitors have not reported from many prospects on their lists and it is necessary that these contacts be made at once," Baum said.

While most of the money pledged was paid in at the time of the commitment, some donors have not yet sent in their checks. They are being asked to do so by June 1.

It had been hoped that the necessary money would be subscribed and paid in by the first of next month and that contract for the structure could be let shortly thereafter.

Wheat Price Slips 5c After Election

Wheat was down in Cross Plains Monday only five cents per bushel, following a rejection last week by the nation's farmers of a Department of Agriculture proposal for stricter control of the crop.

Dale Gary of Gary Mill & Elevator Company was paying \$1.95 Monday for number one wheat, as compared with \$2 prior to the referendum.

"June contracts will be lower," Gary predicted. A dry winter and late freezes curtailed wheat production throughout the Cross Plains area this year. Oats, however, suffered even more severe damage from the weather. Less than half the crops planted are expected to be harvested.

Estimates are that 21,000 bushels of wheat will be marketed in Cross Plains from the current crop, bringing in possibly \$37,000 to \$39,000.

First loads of wheat sold here after last week's rains were sent in by Horace L. Jones of May and Roy Arrowood of Cross Plains.

County Agent Offers Free Pig To 4-H'ers

Callahan County 4-H Club members interested in securing a Sears gilt are advised to contact County Agent Pat C. Garner immediately.

Five registered Duroc gilts will be returned to this county by the Sears Foundation by youths who received the pigs last year.

Requirements for receiving one of the gilts are these: (1) provide adequate facilities for the animal. (2) Feed the gilt according to instructions given by the County Agent. (3) Show the gilt in a county show to be held next Fall; the first gilt will be shown at a district exposition in Abilene. (4) Provide adequate farrowing facilities for the gilt. (5) Return a gilt pig or \$15 to the program after the gilt farrows next Spring.

Former Local Man Felled By Stroke

Friends will regret to learn that Elbert G. Pierce of Cisco, former local resident, is in an Eastland hospital, reportedly critically ill. He suffered a stroke at his home in Cisco Tuesday of last week.

Mr. and Mrs. Pierce, who lived many years in the Deer Plains community, six miles north of here, moved to Cisco about 16 years ago. Mr. Pierce, 84, is a brother of the late Ben Pierce of Cross Plains, and also a brother of Joe Pierce of Abilene, former Callahan County sheriff.

Cottonwood Dinner To Aid Stock Barn

A benefit dinner, the proceeds of which will be donated to the fund being raised to build a junior livestock exhibit building in Cross Plains, will be staged by ladies of the Cottonwood community the third Friday night in June.

Plans for the menu are yet incomplete, however, a meeting was to be held late Wednesday and begin preparations.

"This will be a meal to remember, one that no person will want to miss," said Mrs. V. I. Spivey yesterday.

While some damage was done to small grain crops and all harvesting interrupted, the recent moisture was regarded as a boon to pastures, forage crops and peanuts which have already been planted. Many peanut crops, however, are yet to be seeded.

No extensive damage was reported from the hail early Tuesday morning, however, that which ripped across this area a week ago left many costly scars. That which fell early Tuesday damaged mainly fruit trees and berry vines.

W. D. Phelan of Cross Plains has staked two nearby locations in Eastland County. They are eight and one-half miles northeast of Cross Plains. Both are slated for 3,200 feet with rotary to test the Marble Falls.

One venture will be on the A. M. Larkin place. Drillsite is 330 feet from the south and 2,310 feet from the west lines of J. J. Shields survey.

The other project is on the Charles Black land. It is 330 feet from the north and 650 feet from the west lines of the J. F. Wheat survey.

Damage estimated at \$980 was done in a two-car collision five miles west of Cross Plains, on State Highway 36, Monday afternoon. The accident occurred at 1:45. No one was injured.

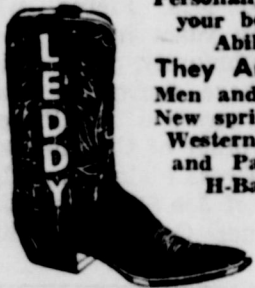
JIMMIELEE PAYNES NOW IN NEW HOME

If You Are A Notary Public

Your commission as a Notary Public under the laws of the State of Texas will expire as of June 1, 1963.

In order to re-new your commission as a Notary Public in The State of Texas, you must furnish a new Notary Bond, and take the Oath of Office, on or before the first day of June, 1963. Such new bond must be approved by the County Clerk of your county, who will then file your bond and send proper notice thereof to the Secretary of State.

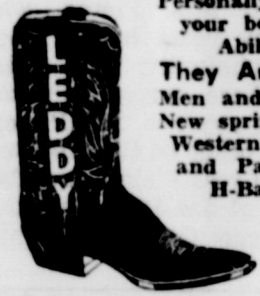

Answers Given To Mailed Questions

Incoming mail at the Cross Plains Review office often brings questions which readers of the newspaper want answered. Many require research and are shunted aside until satisfactory answers can be obtained. Hereunder are answers secured from various sources for some of the questions on hand.

Why are more marriages performed in June than any other month? The answer to this one took some doing, but here is the best reply publishers of the Review were able to come up with.

June is named for the Roman goddess Juno. The Greeks had a different name, Hera. Anyway, the point is that Juno, or Hera, was the goddess of womanhood, of marriage and maternity. She usually represented the matronly type, but nonetheless beautiful. The peacock, the cuckoo and the pomegranate were sacred to her. Homer spoke of her as the "white-armed goddess" and the "ox-eyed queen." The myth of love which surrounded the well-known goddess resulted in the scheduling of marriages in the month of her namesake, a custom which appears to have survived the ages.

Is Caddo Peak near Cross Plains named for the Caddo Indians, when actually this area was hunting grounds of the Comanches?

This is an overlapping area and the Caddo Indians as well as the Comanches sent frequent hunting parties here. The Caddos were considered a more intelligent band than the Comanches and naming the peaks in their honor was probably just a case of honoring a more popular group. The Caddo Peaks were among the best known terrain features for many miles around and are used as reference points in many early land grants.

When were the high school and elementary school buildings finished here?

They were completed 36 years ago this summer and first class held there on Monday morning, Sept. 5, 1927.

Some 50 years ago there was a lively little village about six and one-half miles northeast of Cross Plains that was dearly loved by those in that community. They all had common rights and interests. They shared each others ills and woes, joys and gladness. No place on earth was so delightful, so admirable and regarded with stronger devotion than that little town.

The name of this place was Liberty, meaning freedom; special privileges; ungranted or undue freedom. This name rightfully belonged to this community.

All there is left of Liberty is the silent City of the Dead. There are 65 graves in the little cemetery. The first one was there about 57 years ago.

Recently a young man asked about this cemetery and how it happened to be there. He became quite interested

when told the story of young mother's request time before her death, if she died when her baby born she wished to be buried at Liberty. She died when baby was a few hours old. She was the first one buried at Liberty. She was the wife of R. L. Holder. Her infant lived 19 days and was placed by the side of his mother. The third grave was that of her mother, Mrs. F. Wood.

The land was given Liberty Cemetery by the S. B. Webb. It is humane and religious in nature that fosters love and care of the burying place of loved ones. It is now asked that annual donations for maintenance of this plot be mailed to Cross Plains State Bank, Cross Plains, Tex. Checks should be payable to Liberty Cemetery.

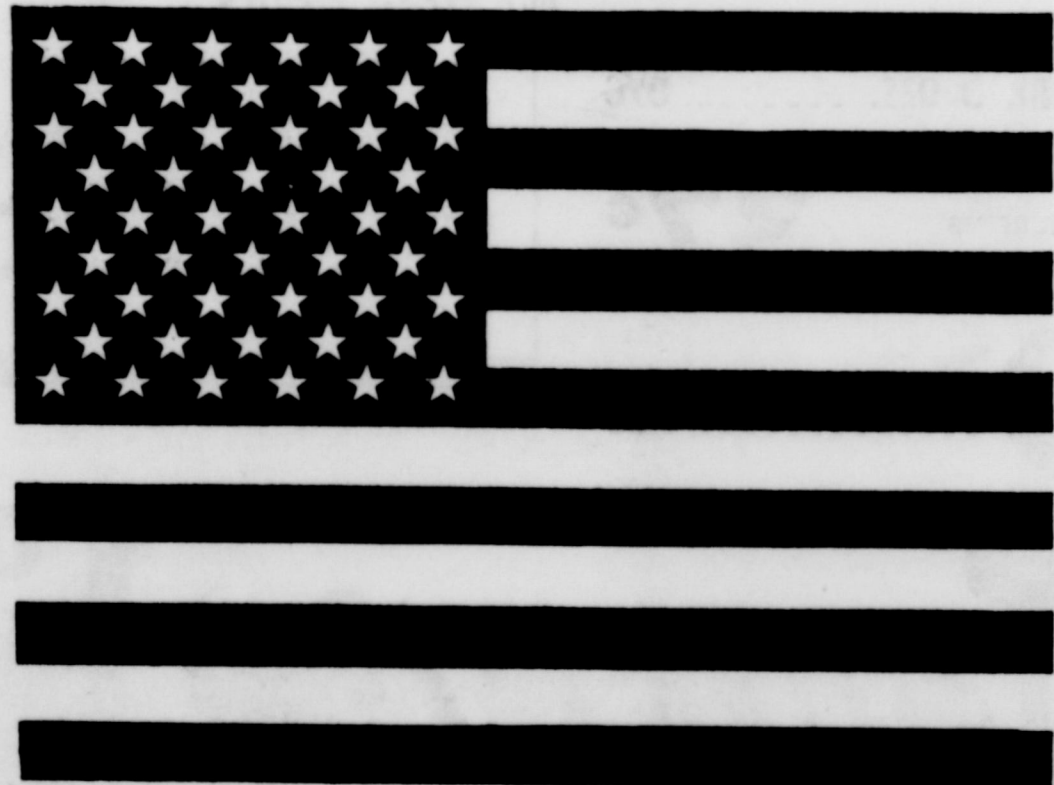

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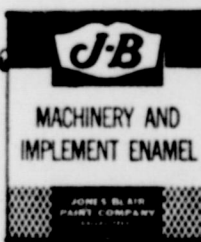

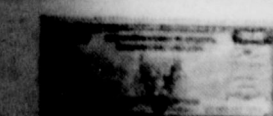
