## 8 New Dams Avert Vast Flood Ravage

While an estimated \$100,000 flood damage was averted last week because of retention dams which slowed water runoff, public officials and Soil Conservation Service personnel have begun a "crash" schedule to alleviate minor problems

which eight newly-filled lakes created as they overflowed around spillways.

West of Cottonwood, near the flood water retention dam on the Coats and Odell places water inundated a county road and rendered it impassible.

County Commissioner Duke Mitchell ordered \$2,500 worth of new culverts to utilize at this and other locations to prevent recurrence of the traffic stoppage. The culverts will range from two to six feet in diameter, alleviating congestion. Additional caliche was to be applied as water receded enough to make work possible.

Another county road near the Frann Woody place was under water. This section too, was getting immediate attention over the week end.

Still another trouble spot, from damsite number 5 on the Billy Richards' place, developed and was getting remedial work Monday.

### Run-Off Slower

Without the retention dams, it is pointed out, water would have washed out many sections of lateral roads, however, due to the fact that run-off was slowed the problem existed longer than would have otherwise been the case.

"Some inconvenience to mail carriers and rural resident has resulted because of the overflowing," said Mark Adair, chairman of the board of directors for Turkey Creek Water Control District, "but these situations will be corrected shortly."

### 21 Calves Saved

A. L. Breeding credited the retention dams in his locality with saving a wheat crop. The lake on the Damon Jones place prevented possible drowning of 21 young calves owned by Bill Ingram. The calves were carried out of a lowland pasture after water had risen to their bellies. Loss to fences and water gaps was also reported minimized.

Whereas Turkey Creek overflowed its banks and got into several houses in the west edge of Cross Plains in 1956, the run-off was controlled last week and no damage at all was reported within the town. Soil Conservation men aver the stream will carry more water from last week's deluges than it did seven years ago.

"The difference is, this time it is controlled and slowed," said D. C. Cox, head of the Baird SCS office.

The need for additional retention dams was reported southwest of Adair, where two sections of county road suffered damage. Rural mail on Baird Star Route 2 became difficult to deliver.

"County Commissioners are to be congratulated for the rapidity in which they tackled road problems following the recent hard rains," said County Judge Byron Richardson Friday, "it will take a little time to correct all difficulties but solutions are being worked out swiftly."

### 2 More Dams Set

Work is expected to begin soon on two more retention dams in the Cross Plains area. Contracts were awarded in Temple yesterday calling for lakes to be built on the Mrs. A. A. (Dutch) Holley and Mrs. Charley Coats places, both west of Cottonwood. Construction on these projects must begin within 20 days following signing of agreements. Completion is due in no more than 305 days from beginning date.

## W. B. Baldwin Laid To Rest In Cemetery Here

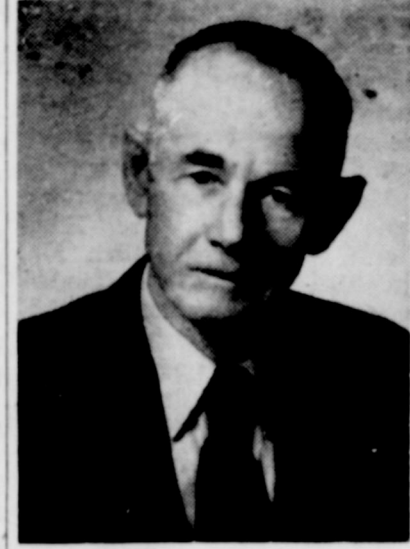
W. B. Baldwin, widely-known retired lumberman, died at his home in the west part of Cross Plains Saturday at 7:30 p.m., following an illness of several years. He was 83.

Funeral services were conducted from the First United Presbyterian Church here Monday afternoon at three o'clock with the pastor, the Rev. Harold G. Wise, and Rev. Roy Zuefeldt of Fort Worth officiating. Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of this city.

Mr. Baldwin had lived here 42 years and before coming to Cross Plains had resided at Pioneer and in Erath County. He was born at Bluffdale Feb. 23, 1880, and was married to Miss Cora M. Moreland June 3, 1908, at Comanche. Monday was the 55th anniversary of their marriage.

He operated Baldwin Lumber Company until August 1956, time of his retirement.

During his 42 year residence here Mr. Baldwin was prominent in civic affairs and played an active role in community development. He served more than 10 years as a member of the board of trustees for the local school district, during its period of greatest growth and expansion. He was formerly a member of the board of directors at the Citizens State Bank

and was an organizer and former president of the local country club. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and the Masonic Order.

Survivors are his wife: one daughter, Mrs. Roland G. Howell of Dayton, Ohio, one son, Dr. Moreland Baldwin of Plainview, and three grandchildren.

## \$2,128 Needed For Stock Barn

Like a marathon runner on the final leg of a gruelling race, the drive to raise \$15,000 to build a junior livestock exhibition building in Cross Plains moved a step nearer the finish line this week.

Jack Scott, secretary-treasurer for the undertaking, reported 212 contributions had been received for a total of \$12,872, still \$2,128 short of the required \$15,000.

Definite size of the building to be constructed has not been decided, however, members of the committee in charge of this phase of the project — Tommie Harris, Deel Edington, Morris Odum and O. B. Edmondson — were reported yesterday to be favoring a structure 60 by 120 feet. It will be situated on a level, seven-acre tract, one mile north of town on State Highway 206, donated by members of the family of Mrs. E. I. Vestal. Col-

ored sheet metal will be utilized, making the exhibition building similar to those on the West Texas Fair Grounds in Abilene.

Funds being raised will be used to build the structure, drill a water well on the grounds, install pumping equipment, sewer and electrical facilities. Plans call for the grounds to be attractively fenced, a chain-link type if funds prove adequate.

Of the 212 gifts received to date, 52 have been for \$100 or more and \$5,128 has come from outside the Cross Plains trade territory.

"A number of people have indicated they intend to help on this civic undertaking but have delayed for one reason or another," said Edwin Baum, campaign chairman, yesterday, "we now urge that they come forward. A lot of smaller gifts are expected."

There are also 11 calves on feed.

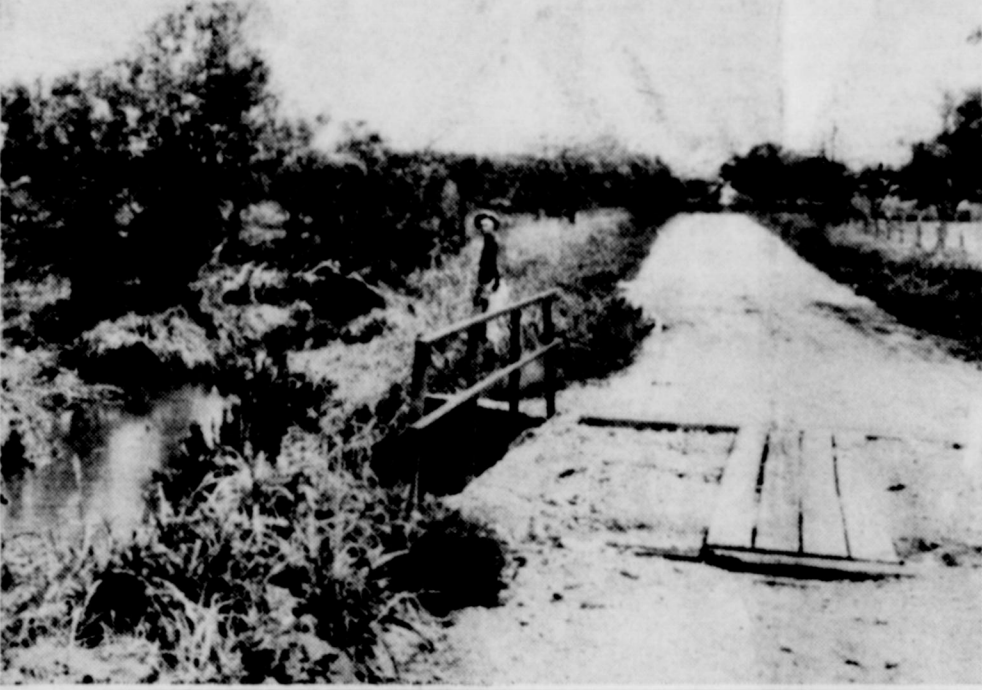
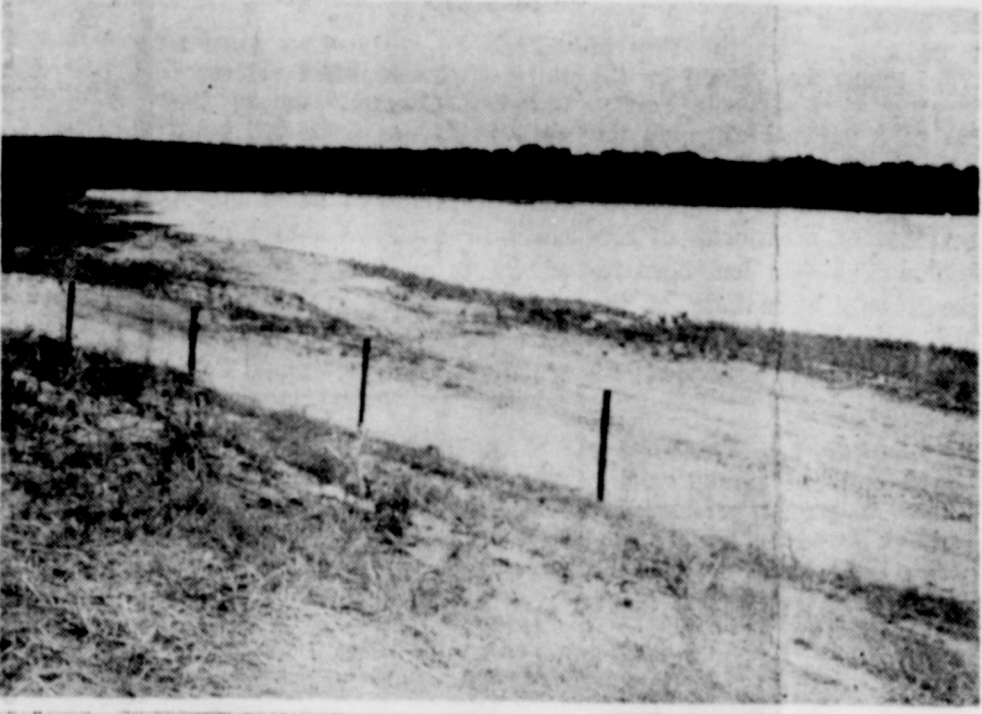
Two local boys purchased lambs Saturday at the Chot Gilbert club lamb sale held in

## \$1.90 Bushel Paid For Wheat Monday

Number one wheat was bringing in \$1.90 a bushel in Cross Plains Monday, having dropped 10 cents from the opening quotation. The five per cent drop, however, was less than many observers predicted after American wheat farmers rejected stronger controls in a recent nationwide election.

To Monday at noon, 8,000 bushels of wheat had been marketed in Cross Plains, believed to be approximately one-third of that to be sold here this season.

## Obey Or Pay, Judge Tells Law Breakers

A total of \$2,250 was paid in fines after convictions in Callahan County court during May. Five other cases are pending and bonds will be forfeited in five more unless defendants are able to show cause why that action should not be taken.

Defendants unable to pay fines in other cases were assessed 54 days in jail by County Judge Byron Richardson. Part of the time is being laid out at the rate of \$3 daily,

while other prisoners are working on public roads receiving credits of \$6 daily.

A total of 31 cases were heard in county court during May.

"The docket was heavier than normally," said County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

Money collected for fines in county court is apportioned between the four commissioners' precincts for road and bridge work and for county administration.

# Interesting News Highlights Of Yesteryear

June 17, 1932: Walter Farrow, Cross Plains restaurant owner, has been indicted for murder in connection with the fatal shooting of Archie Davidson, 29, on Main Street here Saturday night.

June 16, 1933: Webbville baseball team defeated Cottonwood Sunday afternoon 10 to 9, winning a three-game series 2 to 1. Five Gray brothers played on the Webbville team. Farmers, ranchmen and businessmen have joined hands to encourage the building of State Highway 36 through Cross Plains. Oakie Lewis has resigned as pharmacist at the City Drug Store and has gone to Brownwood to work. A singing school has been in progress at Burkett the past 10 nights.

June 1, 1934: Bonnie Parker and Clyde Barrow, one of the most colorful bandit pair ever to ravage the Southwest are dead. They died in a gun battle with Texas Ranger Frank Hamer recently on a lonely road near the Louisiana line. A debt of \$67,000 against the City of Cross Plains was voided by the Court of Civil Appeals Friday. The high tribunal canceled the obligation on grounds that the municipality had not approved the bond by a majority of reelected. The debt had been incurred only by a vote of the City Council. The court ruled that this body exceeded its authority.

June 14, 1935: Two local girls, Opal Freeman and Susan McDermott graduated as Registered Nurses at the Sealy School of Nursing in Santa Anna Tuesday. Miss Elizabeth Tyson has been elected to the school faculty here. J. T. Hammett defeated "Shanty" Hogan Sunday afternoon to win the championship of the invitational golf tournament at the local County Club.

June 12, 1936: Robert E. Howard, widely-known author, fatally shot himself at the family home in the west part of town Thursday morning. He had just

been told that his mother, who had been seriously ill for days, could live only a few hours more. Veterans of World War I will begin receiving bonus checks in the mails Tuesday; \$188,936 will come to Callahan County, \$389,373 to Brown, \$349,780 to Coleman and \$504,757 to Eastland County. Haynie Spencer and Miss Jewel Grimes of Baird will be married. Finishing touches are being added to two new concrete tennis courts on the school campus.

June 18, 1937: Farmers of this area have launched all-out war on grasshoppers, which are reported ravaging young cotton crops. A countywide election recently held in Eastland County to invalidate the sale of liquor has been declared illegal in district court. Another vote on the question is expected to be called. Mr. and Mrs. Jud Barnett will be honored at a miscellaneous shower at the First Baptist Church June 22.

June 14, 1938: Less than a third of the qualified voters of Callahan County went to the polls Friday as a \$15,000 bond issue was approved to build a county hospital at Baird. A check for \$160.79 has been mailed by Cross Plains people to storm sufferers at Clyde. Mrs. Jack DeBusk will represent Burkett at the annual Col-

man Rodeo, riding in parades and cowgirls events. The Harlow farm south of town was recently bought by P. A. Burnett of Colorado.

June 30, 1939: Baird and Clyde schools are in dispute after an election was held in which Midway voted to consolidate with each of the two schools. Dena Lou Cox was honored with a party Tuesday afternoon, the occasion being her 16th birthday. W. D. Smith's Piggly Wiggly advertises rump roast at 20 cents a

pound. Mrs. Frank Farrow entertained members of the Dressy Home Demonstration Club Tuesday.

June 21, 1940: Calvin L. and J. P. Henderson passed preliminary examinations, preparatory to entering the army forces. Citizens of Cross Plains and Cross Plains voted Saturday in the consolidation of school districts to new produce house, to be created by Henry McCoy, open here Friday. Ladies are being asked to and knit for the Red Cross.

Eastland County Commissioners Court entered into an agreement Friday aimed at controlling predatory animals which have preyed on livestock including many in the Pioneer, Sabanno and North Rising Star localities.

Agreement was made by the court to pay as much as \$135 monthly to combat the varmints. Cooperation was committed by A&M College, U. S. Wildlife Service and the Predatory Animals Control Association.

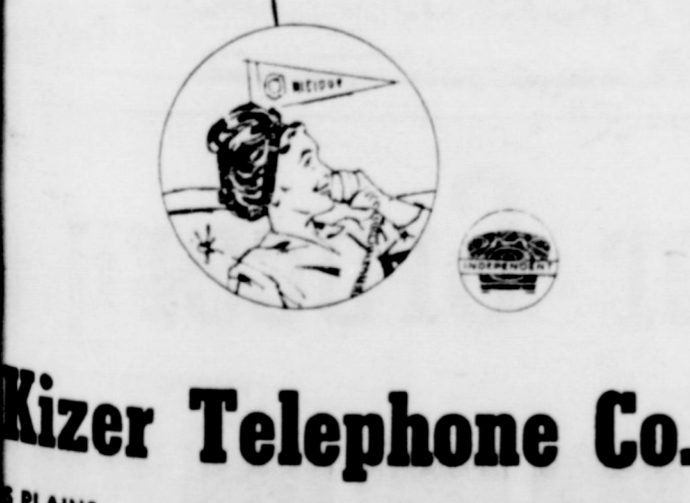
