Mitchell Holding Up On Road Jobs

County Commissioner Duke Mitchell told the Review Monday night that reports that he is now repairing road damages below the recently-completed flood retention dams near here are erroneous.

"There has apparently been some misunderstanding," he said.

Mitchell explained that he did not know whether the responsibility of installing metal culverts and bridges to accommodate the prolonged flow of water is his or that of Turkey Creek Water Control District.

"I did buy a few tin culverts," Mitchell said, "however, these are for places in the precinct which need repairs and are in no way a part of the flood prevention program."

The report that he had bought \$2,500 worth of metal culverts to handle retarded flood waters across roads in his precinct were labeled completely erroneous by Mitchell.

As yet no repairs have been done to roads which were recently inundated and caused

traffic stoppages, other than dragging.

One of the principal "trouble spots" is west of Cottonwood on Cross Plains rural mail route number one, where the mail carrier was recently unable to serve all boxes on his route. The road is also a school bus route during school term.

Mitchell said Monday night that he had read an agreement between Turkey Creek Water Control District and the Commissioners Court and that he is unable to understand whether the responsibility of corrective measures are his or those of the water district.

"I am not saying I won't fix the roads," Mitchell continued, "but it is not my present intention to do so until I am shown that this is entirely a precinct responsibility."

Mitchell estimated Monday night that a minimum of \$12,000 would be required to handle water drainage at the three principal places of trouble and keep traffic moving in all kinds of weather.

H. M. Clark is in Brownwood Memorial Hospital where he is undergoing treatment after returning from Dallas.

Fifteen new donations and the increase of an earlier gift pushed funds being raised to build a livestock exhibition building in Cross Plains this week to a total of \$13,372.

Estimated cost of the entire project is \$15,000, leaving a current deficit of \$1,628.

Bids for construction of the building are now being received. Two sizes are being considered. Specifications call for a width of 60 feet and either 120 or 140 feet long. Colored sheet metal is to be utilized in construction. The building will be situated on an attractive seven-acre site, one mile north of town, donated by Mrs. E. I. Vestal, her two daughters and son.

Members of the committee in charge of fund raising said yesterday that no contract would be let until sufficient funds were in sight.

"The time has come to redouble our efforts," said Edwin Baum, chairman of the undertaking, "our goal is visible only if solicitation is vigorous."

After contract is awarded, a minimum of 30 days are expected to be required for the assembling of materials. Actual construction will probably be finished in one week, once work begins, say those delegated to handle this phase of the project.

\$118,946 Bid For 2 New Dams Here

Howard Shaw Construction Company of Levelland was apparent low bidder for Sites 1A and 1B Turkey Creek flood prevention structures at a bid opening in Temple Wednesday, June 5, according to D. C. Cox, Work Unit Conservationist at Baird.

The bid was in the amount of \$118,946. Five bids were submitted. Previous jobs done by the Howard Shaw Construction Company were on Jim Ned Creek Watershed and flood prevention structures at Rio Grande

City and Fabens. Construction is due to begin on the two flood-water retarding structures here within 20 calendar days from the official award which should be issued soon.

Estimated contents of the major items of construction are: 260,750 cubic yards of compacted earthfill material, 133 cubic yards of reinforced concrete and 410 feet of spun concrete metal pipe for installation of principal spillways; 193 feet of corrugated metal pipe for toe trains; 81,460 square yards of topsoil

to be placed in emergency spillway and embankments for establishing grass; and 16,700 feet of fencing to protect dams and spillways for minimum maintenance costs.

Land rights for construction are provided by the Turkey Creek Conservation District with operation and maintenance to be performed by the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District and the Callahan County Commissioners Court. Cox points out. Conservation programs on the land above the floodwater retarding structures will be applied by farmers and ranchers with assistance in planning and application made available through the Soil Conservation District.

Ralph W. White, Project Construction Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service in Brownwood, will supervise construction, E. J. Hughes, Area Conservationists, reports. Construction is due to be completed within 305 calendar days after which time vegetation will be established on the dams and emergency spillways preparatory to turning over to sponsoring local organizations for full operation and maintenance.

Panther Seen Near Pioneer This Week

A large, predatory cat — said to be a Mexican cougar — was seen last Friday morning near the W. O. Rachels place, one-fourth mile southwest of the church buildings in Pioneer.

The animal was seen at a distance of about 50 yards by Bob Turner, who lives in the new home just west of Pioneer on FM Road 374. He was enroute to the Rachels place about 10 a.m. when the big cat appeared.

Turner described the animal as being a greyish-red color and about the size of a large dog. He measured the distance between tracks made by the animal in leaping out of view and found it to be a jump of approximately 10 feet.

The cougar is described by

Webster as being: "A large quadruped of the cat family, tawny brown in color without spots, found from British America to Patagonia but now practically extinct in Eastern North America. It becomes from four to five feet long, exclusive of the tail but is longer limbed and less bulky than the jaguar. It is also called puma, panther, catamount, mountain lion and American Lion."

Predatory animals have been reported preying on livestock in several sections of Eastland County and the Commissioners Court is instituting a program aimed at exterminating them.

R. C. (Dick) Ames of Cross Plains, who has land holdings north of Pioneer, has experienced some loss of livestock for the past several years.

Ex-Local Man Nominated Brownwood's Postmaster

J. H. Childs, Brown County judge and a native of Cross Plains, has been nominated postmaster at Brownwood. Confirmation by the United States senate is pending.

Childs, a 1938 graduate of

Cross Plains High School and said by many to be the greatest all-round athlete ever produced here, has been Brown County Judge since January. Previously, however, he served 12 years as county clerk in Brown County.

Childs was nominated commander of Texas branch of Disabled American Veterans Assn. in Harlingen Sunday. He was wounded Feb. 24, 1945, on the Philippine Islands and holds the Silver Star presented in 1947.

He has been active in DAV affairs for a number of years, having served as second junior vice commander of the state group and commander of the Central Texas chapter No. 45. Childs was chosen as chaplain of the state association in 1951.

In the night-cap the local Tigers, managed by Edwin Baum and Bob Latson, came from behind to over-power the visiting Clyde nine 7-2. Jim Freeman went the route on the mound for the Tigers backed by near flawless fielding from his mates. Smith and Ramos shared hurling duties for Clyde.

The Panthers and Tigers were to have swapped blows here Monday night, and Friday, June 14, the Lions will host a Cisco Pony League team at 7:30 p. m. Monday, June 17, the Panthers play host to a Clyde nine at the local park at 7:30, and the next day, June 18, the Tigers travel to Cisco and the Lion journey to Albany.

IN DAYS OF YORE

June 13, 1941: James Collins, recently commissioned an army lieutenant, completed Texas A&M last week and received his degree in petroleum engineering. Pvt. Junior Ford and Miss Valera Tankersley of Burkett were married June 4. Miss Helen Jane Ferguson and Socrates Walker, both members of the local high school faculty, were married Friday in Merkel. Of the 6,070 prisoners in Texas penitentiaries, 4,620 were once church members; only eight are Jews.

June 12, 1942: Deer Plains and Cross Plains schools will be consolidated as a result of a vote in the two communities Saturday. Deer Plains balloted 17 to 15 in favor of the proposition and in Cross Plains the tally was 30-0. Mr. and Mrs. Leo Baum are parents of a baby boy, born June 1 in a Coleman hospital. Pat Robinson, was correspondent in the Southwest Pacific, writes of interviewing a small group of American fliers, who have been overcoming numerical superiority of Japanese aviators in a contest for control of the skies around Australia. Among the American fliers, sent on several combat missions each day, is Norman G. (Beans) Morris, former Cross Plains football coach.

June 18, 1943: The Citizens State Bank here announces the realization of a long-sought goal, that of raising certified surplus to equal the institution's capital. A Cottonwood mother has been notified by the war department that her son, Samuel Norris Ramey, is now a prisoner of the Japanese. Hearing on an application to abandon the M. K. & T. railroad into Cross Plains has been delayed and is not expected to come up again for at least 60 days. The Rev. Charlie Myrick of Nimrod preached at the Atwell Missionary Baptist Church Sunday night.

June 16, 1944: Doyle McMillan is at home on leave from the Merchant Marines, having been serving aboard a ship hauling war material to hot spots of the world. Pvt. Phae Saunders has just completed basic training in North Carolina. A party for Roger Williams on his 13th birthday was held Wednesday at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. B. Williams. Chester Glover is home on furlough from Camp Berkeley. He is with the medical corps of the army.

June 15, 1945: Lt. J. H. McGowen of San Diego, Calif., is on leave and visited here last

week. Before entering military service he practiced dentistry in Cross Plains. The road from Cross Plains to Brownwood has been designated as a state highway and will be paved. News has been received here that Ray Plumlee was recently wounded while serving with American military forces in combat against the Japanese on Oginawa.

June 14, 1946: With 512 paid poll tax holders, Cross Plains' voting strength is not estimated at 700. Donnel Clark, who is attending John Tarleton on the G. I. bill, is announced as one of the school's honor students. V. C. Adams has bought the Burkett telephone exchange which was owned and operated for 27 years by Arthur Wesley. Bill White has announced that he is withdrawing from the race as a candidate for County Superintendent.

June 13, 1947: Three Cross Plains youths — Robert Callahan, Riley Falkner and Dale Rice — were erroneously mistaken for Weatherford bank robbers by officers Wednesday and fired upon. None was hit. Four vacancies exist on the local school faculty to be filled before opening of the new term in September. There will be a community singing in Burkett June 15 to honor all dads on Fathers Day. W. T. Cox advertises all popular brand cigarettes at \$1.59 per carton.

June 11, 1948: Callahan County Vocational School is opening classes for both full and part-time study in Baird and Cross Plains. Temperature of 106 was recorded in Cross Plains Saturday. J. A. Burton has begun work for the city. An election for the proposed consolidation of Denton, Bayou and Oplin schools was opposed by voters at the polls May 22. I. B. Loving, Jr., has been elected to the faculty of Burkett schools and will teach commercial subjects. Miss Margaret Ann Clark and Pat McNeel, Jr., were united in marriage here last Thursday evening.

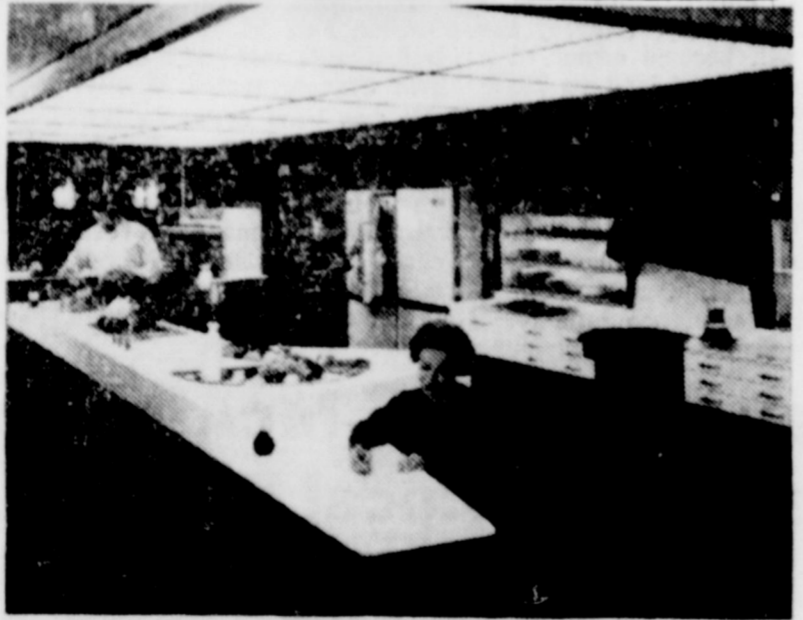

Homes Abound with Potential Poisons, AMA Official Warns

Children, supposedly "safe at home," are poisoning themselves at the rate of nearly 1,500 a day. "When you consider that more than a quarter million home-used products on the market contain toxins, it is not difficult to understand why more than 500 children die each year from self-administered poisons," said F. J. L. Blasingame, M.D., executive vice-president of the American Medical Association.



Children are naturally curious, especially the very young ones. They are prone to stick into their mouths anything they can get in their hands. It doesn't even have to taste good or look pretty.

Medicines account for nearly half of all accidental poisoning in United States each year. Discard unused medicine and keep rest out of children's reach.

Most accidental poisonings occur in children under five. Two-year-olds are the most poison prone, with one-year-olds close behind. At this stage in life their curiosity is at its height and their sense of fear not yet developed, Dr. Blasingame explained.

A primary cause of such accidents, says Dr. Blasingame, is storing poisonous substances in food containers or soft drink bottles. A toddler just naturally assumes that a soft drink bottle contains a treat. He'll drink whatever he finds in it. "The facts are clear," he warned. "Between 65 and 70 per cent of all poisonings take place because an item was accessible to a child."

"If we're going to live in modern homes with modern conveniences and modern medicines, we have to develop some up-to-date standards that will make home safe for our children."

Among suggestions for lessening the poisoning hazards in the home, Dr. Blasingame suggested:

- Keep potential poisons out of reach and tightly sealed.
- Never transfer toxic materials into household utensils.
- Don't leave your child alone in a room in which you're working with poisons.
- Give medicines only in a lighted room.

If your child might have taken a poisonous substance, call your doctor for instructions at once. Don't wait to see what happens.

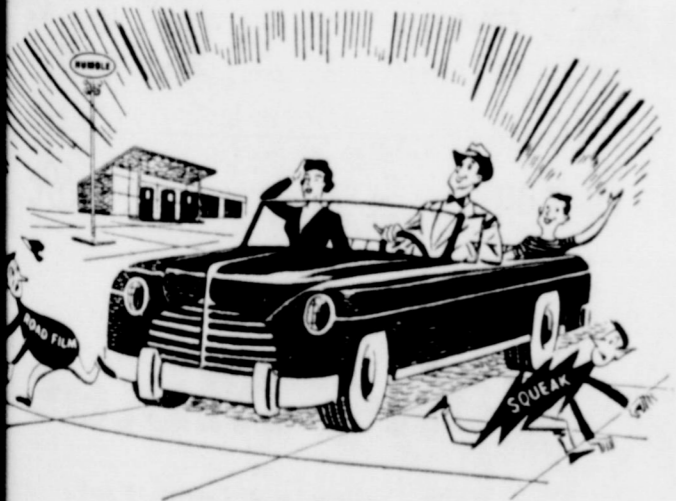

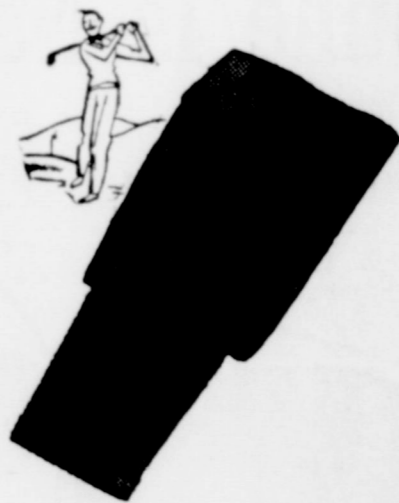

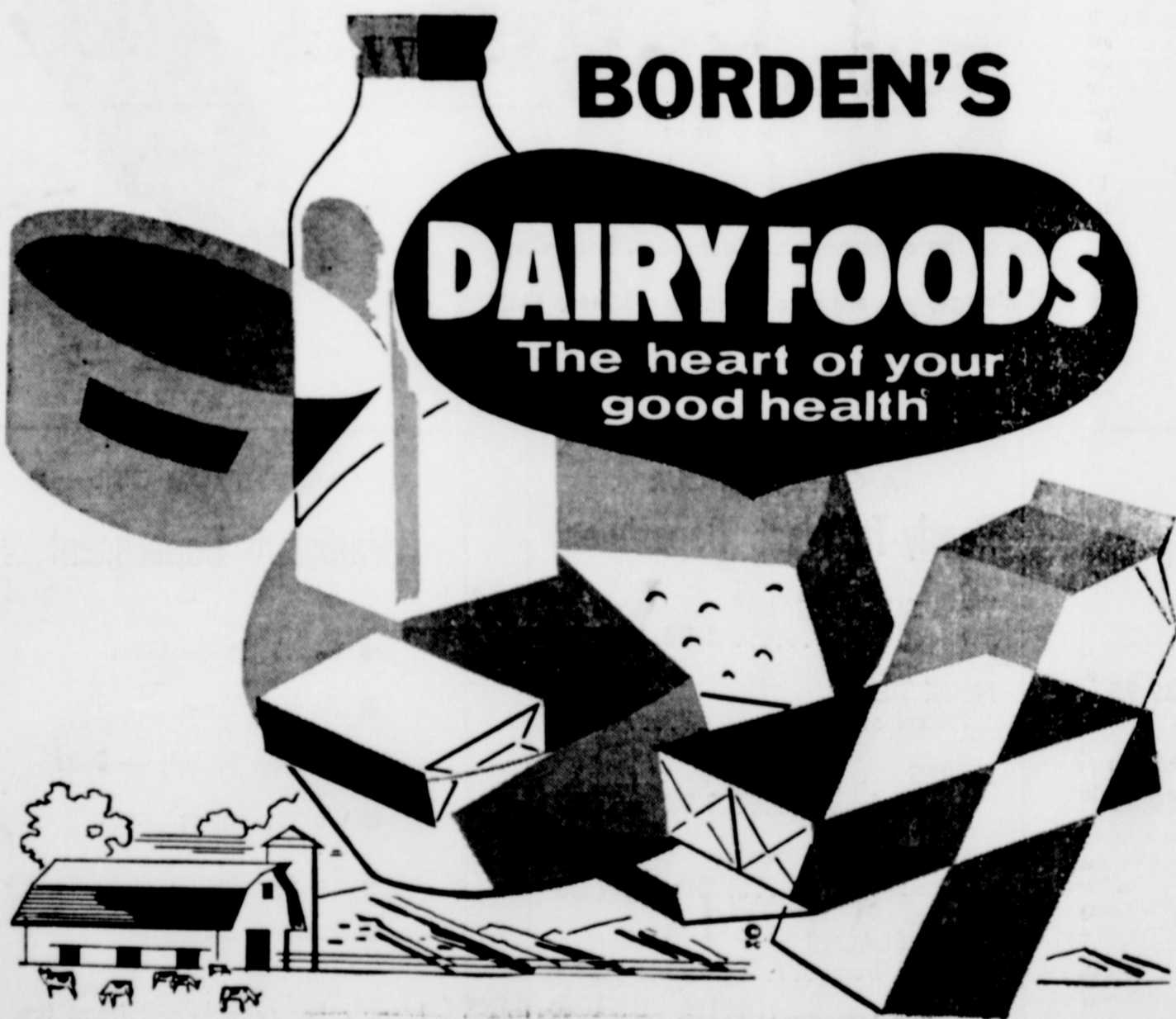

Explanation Made About Future Wheat Prospects

wheat farmers support quotas. This means that should the program voted in on May 21, 1963, not succeed that a referendum will be held for the 1965 crop prior to June 13, 1964.

"In the world market, the United States will continue to fulfill obligations under the International Wheat Agreement despite the current price and production uncertainty. Sales for export will be handled in normal channels of trade to the maximum extent possible consistent with the fulfillment of international obligations. There will be no dumping of U. S. wheat in world markets.

"If U. S. farmers should produce a crop far in excess of normal domestic and export needs in 1964, wheat prices in the U. S. are expected to fall below the levels equivalent to the minimum prices specified for sales under the International Wheat Agreement. Exports by the United States at such prices would result in collapse of the Agreement. This will not be permitted.

"Sales by the United States to member countries at prices at or near 1962-63 levels remain the goal for 1964. All available authority will be utilized to insure the achievement of this goal."

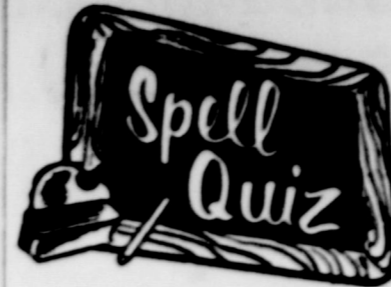
