equipment in the Baltimore of- fice of the Social Security Ad- ministration. Over one-third million persons past the age of 65 had enough social security credits to be due retirement benefits, but had overlooked checking up on their rights fol-

lowing the 1961 Amendments to the Social Security Act.

The District Office for this area located at Abilene wrote Mr. James a letter explaining his possible eligibility.

Mr. James, now 83, had con- tacted a Social Security repre- sentative in 1956 but he had lost his social security number and there was some misunder- standing about his name and he decided "it just wasn't worth the effort." When he received the recent letter, he contacted Mrs. Fay Ford, Field Representa- tive, at the Cross Plains City Hall on one of her regularly scheduled visits.

Mrs. Ford assisted Mr. and Mrs. James in filing for bene- fits. Their first check in the amount of \$780 was received early this month. This check represents benefits for the month of filing and the preced- ing twelve months (that's as far back as the law permits).

"The unfortunate part," ex- pressed Mrs. Ford, "is that Mr. and Mrs. James lost \$5,224.00 by failing to apply sooner." Ac- cording to Mrs. Ford, the couple could have been receiving bene- fits since January, 1953.

Mr. James, born at Hondo, Tex., was reared on a ranch and spent most of his working life as a farmer and rancher at near- by Pioneer. Mrs. James, the for- mer Hulda Josephine Hartung, of German descent, was born at Live Oak, Tex.

He is a veteran of World War I, and he and Mrs. James, mar- ried 59 years, have two children, eight grandchildren, and 16 great-grandchildren.

Mr. James received his social security credit working as a guard when the Pyote Air Base was being constructed. He re- tired in 1952 and since then has engaged in his hobby of garden- ing.

Mr. James says, "Mrs. James has always been the boss, but perhaps I can be boss now. I'll have to endorse the check before it can be cashed."

Mrs. Ford pointed out that the new equipment is helping to discover eligible persons, but she urges everyone to contact the Social Security office at 62-

Although pitcher Rickey Jones had a one-hitter going, Cross Plains trailed 1-0, after the hosts had tallied in the top of the first.

A sparkling performance by Baird hurler Wilson held Cross Plains bats almost silent until the fourth inning. The locals loaded the bases but failed to

score, and again in the fifth runners were stranded on sec- ond and third.

Hopes were raised in the final frame when Larry Bishop got a lead-off single. He stole second and went to third on a ground-out. The next batter fanned and two were away.

Robert Merrill's infield hit and a throwing error at the plate knotted the score. Jones then stepped to the plate and cracked a home run over the fence in extreme left field.

Decision Cisco

Cross Plains grabbed the lead in the initial half-inning. Richard Pope and Donnie Wilson drew walks, Mike Rhodes singled to fill the bags. Merrill then singled home two runs.

Cisco cut the lead in half in the second inning. In both the third and fourth frames Cross Plains left two runners on base, but in the fifth the locals tallied another pair of runs for a 4-1 advantage.

Wilson and Bishop singled and both crossed the plate on Cisco All-Star errors.

Brilliant Pitching

Jones and Bishop turned in

well-done jobs on the mound, both going the distance.

Jones allowed Baird just one safety, a bingle in the first in- ning. He let only one other runner reach base, a walk in the top of the sixth. His summary shows one run on one hit, seven strikeouts and one base-on-balls.

Bishop allowed two runs on five hits. He whiffed 13 batters, and issued just one free pass.

Cross Plains garnered six hits and two walks in the first game, and 10 hits and a like number of passes in the second tilt.

Trophy Awarded

At the tourney's end, Cross Plains received winner's trophy and individual awards. Profits from gifts at the game were given to the team to defray ex- penses incurred in this week end's meet.

Manager D. C. Jones and Coach Bill Strickland said that the money handed them Friday night to feed the team was not used because of other arrange- ments but it would be utilized after Thursday's game.

Eyes Of Texas Watch

(AN EDITORIAL)

A realistic approach is being taken to the possible solution of juvenile delinquency problems in Texas.

Youths themselves will sit down for a two-day conference in the state capitol next month and analyze the situation and make recommendations for correction. Three boys from Callahan County — one each from Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains — will participate in the conference.

The assemblage at Austin is being sponsored by Attorney General Waggoner Carr, who was asked by 100 Texas high schoolers to head their seminar.

Attendance will be limited to outstanding youths, either juniors or seniors in Texas schools. Each delegate will be given an opportunity to offer sugges- tions for curbing delinquency and fostering better citizenship.

Many ideas have been tried in recent years, however, none seems to offer as promising possibilities as does the forthcoming event in Austin. No group knows the situation better than the youngsters them- selves and with an honest desire to do something about it, a great deal could be accomplished.

The three Callahan County youths are yet to be selected. They must be carefully chosen, for the problem to which they are to be assigned is one which has thus far remained an enigma to their elders. The eyes of Texas will be upon them, and the happi- ness of tomorrow's homes may depend upon their dedication.

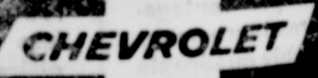

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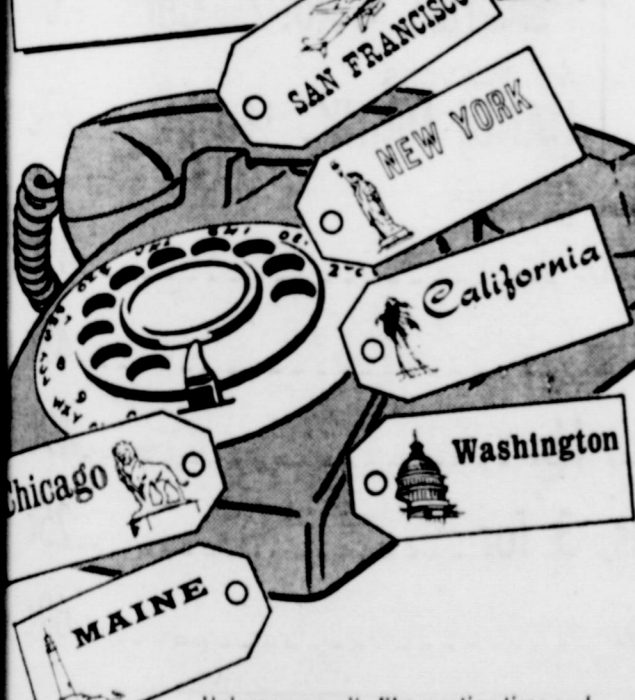

W. L. Cutbirth, Coleman, sold 50 cows to B. R. Hargrove, Cross Plains at \$40.

Berry & Estes, Baird, sold 21 calves to E. D. Haden, Moran, at \$41. They are splendid high-bred calves.



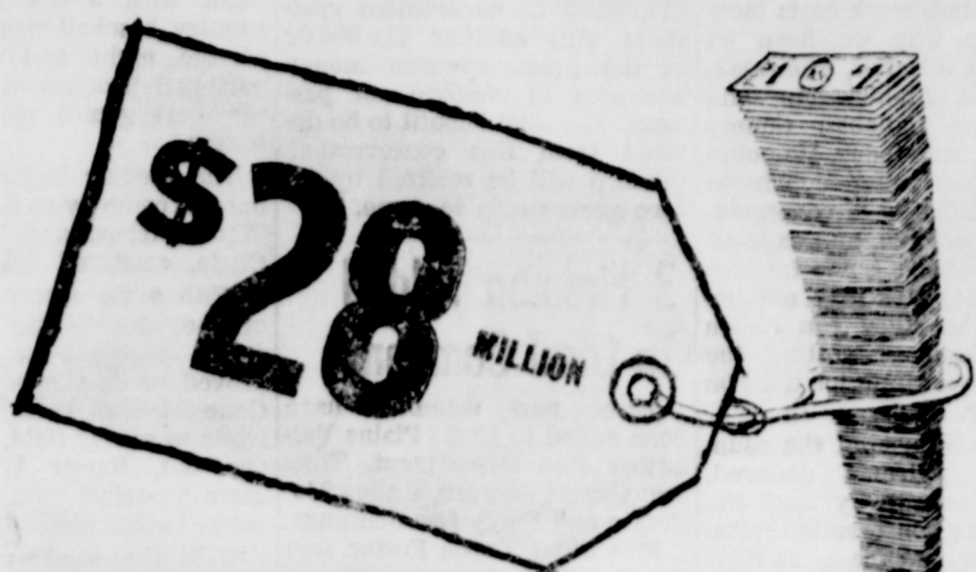

\$30,000 Spent In County To Rid 10,000 Acres Of Trees

Conservation work costs money. That's why we have an ACP, Tommie Harris, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Callahan County Committee, said today. He pointed out that being convinced about the benefits of conservation is not enough, and expressed the belief that some farmers and ranchers still may not understand that they can obtain program help in getting the needed conservation job done on their farms.

"Just drive around the country," the chairman declared, "and you can easily spot the farms where conservation farming is being practiced. In most cases, you would also find that the Agricultural Conservation Program is cooperating with the farmer or rancher in carrying out the conservation practice on the land."

For farmers who may not fully understand just how ACP works, Harris explained that the program's purpose is to encourage establishment of soil, water, woodland and wildlife conservation practices needed in the public interest. The program, therefore, has an incentive type of approach to the problem—it "shares the cost" of conservation measures which the farmer would not carry out without such assistance.

Funds for this purpose are authorized by Congress in recognition of the fact that the nation's natural resources are vital not only to the farmers and ranchers who operate the land but also to the health and well-being of citizens, both now and in the future.

Mr. Harris states that a good example of cooperation between livestock producers of this county and the ASC office is the amount of rangeland that was aerially-sprayed the past month. By forming a partnership in regard to the cost of this practice a total of 38 livestock producers had over 10,000 acres of mesquite sprayed from airplanes. This means that over

\$15,000.00 in government cost-share plus another \$15,000.00 of the producers own money was used to improve our pastures. The final benefit to be derived from this conservation practice will be realized by future generations to come.

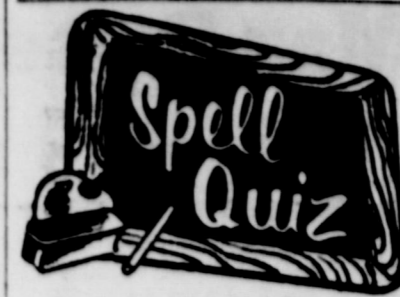
