FIFTY-FIFTH YEAR

Report Reveals City Has 5 Water Supply Choices

What do engineers say of Cross Plains' municipal water situation and this city's prospects for the future?

Last March 14 the City Council entered into an agreement with National Engineering Company of Austin to make a study of the problem and report its findings. A 30-page survey was compiled and has been handed Mayor Ted Souder and aldermen.

The Cross Plains Review has made a study of the report and attempts to abstract its most pertinent points. Hereunder all statements are those of the reporting engineer, T. F. Collins of Austin, to the City Council.

On April 18, 1963, you submitted application to an agency of the federal government for \$3,000 to pay cost of engineering services for advance planning regarding the Cross Plains water situation.

On June 20, 1963, you received approval of this application and accepted loan offer authorizing this report.

The City of Cross Plains ob-

tains its water supply from 16 shallow wells. These 45 to 65 foot wells each have a potential of from five to 10 gallons per minute. The wells produce peak demands during average days, but cannot meet peak demands during maximum demand days. Cross Plains has reached a time when it is necessary to go to a new water supply source to provide for its expanding water requirements and peak demands.

5 Possible Sources

Five possible sources of new supply were studied: (a) proposed Soil Conservation Service dam approximately seven miles southwest of Cross Plains; (b) Lake Brownwood, approximately 17 miles southeast of Cross Plains; (c) a lake between Cross Plains and Rising Star; (d) existing SCS dams in the Turkey Creek watershed; (e) wells about six miles northeast of Cross Plains. Each of these possibilities is discussed in detail hereunder.

(A) (Proposed SCS Dam): About 5,000 acre feet of water

would be impounded. The proposed dam site has a drainage area of about 19 square miles, which should yield sufficient runoff. Quality of water from this watershed would probably be similar to that in Brownwood Lake and Pioneer Lake. The water would probably meet standards of the State Department of Health and not require any special treatment other than sedimentation, filtration and chlorination. Estimated cost to the City of Cross Plains for obtaining water from this source is \$250,000 and time required would be from two to three years.

Half Million Dollars

(B) (Brownwood Lake): A possible source of supply from Brownwood Lake was studied based on a cooperating project between the City of Rising Star and the City of Cross Plains through information of a Water Supply District Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1 will sell raw water from Brownwood Lake for six to seven cents per 1,000 gallons.

A treatment plant could be located on the northside of the lake so that treated water might be sold along the way. Since Brownwood Lake is some 300 feet lower than either of the towns, pumping costs would be high. The water, though, is of good quality and would require only minimum treatment. Total estimated cost of obtaining water from Lake Brownwood to serve the area to and including Cross Plains and Rising Star is in excess of \$500,000 and time required after formation of the water district and bond approval would be from 18 months to two years.

\$400,000 Deal

(C) (Lake Between Cross Plains and Rising Star): Consideration was given to locating a source of supply approximately equidistant from the two towns. Such a supply should be developed by reconstructing and raising the old Humble dam, located on a branch of Pecan Bayou about three and one-half miles south of State Highway 36 and about half way between Cross Plains and Rising Star. Or, a new dam could be constructed upstream from this location. A single treatment plant would suffice. The lake would be over 100 feet lower than the two cities but the pumping costs would not be excessive. Quality of the water would be similar to that of Pioneer Lake, which is about four miles upstream. Sedimentation, however, would be a problem. Estimated cost of obtaining water from this source would be about \$400,000 and the minimum time required would be from 18 months to two years.

SCS Dams Not Feasible

(D) (Existing SCS Dams on Turkey Creek): The Turkey Creek watershed above Cross Plains is a wide flood plain and does not lend itself well to economical construction of large reservoirs. Only storage in existing structures which is not released flood water is 1,323 acre feet total sedimentation in 13 structures. Obtaining adequate water from this source is not believed economically feasible.

Recommended Project

(E) (Wells About Six Miles Northeast of Cross Plains): It is believed that the presently used shallow well field just northeast of Cross Plains has been developed to the maximum as can be justified economically. However, there are several existing wells each producing from 50 to 100 gallons per minute, located about six miles northeast of Cross Plains, near the Sabanno community. One such well on the J. R. Richter, Jr., farm was checked July 26, 1963, and yielded from 60 to 75 gallons per minute. Chemical analysis of water from the Richter well is within recommended limits for drinking and the taste is good. Water from the Richter well has a total hardness of 290, which is usually considered hard. However, the water now being supplied Cross Plains' 585 customers has a hardness of 432 and is much harder than the Richter well. Water from the Richter well contains less minerals than does Cross Plains water and is well within recommended limits for drinking. Two or three wells from the Richter area should be adequate for the City of Cross Plains. A six-inch cast iron or asbestos cement water supply line, designed to carry a minimum of 156 gallons per minute, should be constructed from the new field to the existing ground storage at Cross Plains. Ground elevation of the Richter well is 1,830 feet, more than 100 feet higher than Cross Plains. Total estimated cost for obtaining water from this source is \$139,500 and the time required after funds are available would be approximately six months.

Horne, Mountaineers Blank Buffaloes 14-0

Left halfback Bill Horne and his crew of Santa Anna Mountaineers completely outplayed the Cross Plains Buffaloes Friday night and sent the Buffs home with a 14-0 loss.

The Mountaineers' almost impregnable defense limited the Buffs to only three first downs and 53 net yards rushing while the hosts ground out 208 net yards from scrimmage, picking up 13 firsts on the way. Both teams' passing game was off with the Buffs getting 17 yards in two completions, and Santa Anna totaling 12 yards on the same number of successes.

Horne Outstanding

Horne, rampaging 175-pounder, scored both touchdowns, a two point conversion and personally accounted for 155 yards of the Mountaineers' rushing average.

The pile-driving halfback was never thrown for a loss Friday night, and just once did the Bison defense stop him for no gain. Although he was used primarily to blast away at the interior of the line, his biggest gain of the night was a 22-yard burst on a circle of right end.

He carried slightly better than 5.9 yards per try.

The locals' offense could not move against the tight Mountaineers defense, and did not even mildly threaten during the 48 minutes. Buffs penetrated Mountaineer territory only twice the entire evening. In the first quarter the Buffs moved to Santa Anna's 47 and in the third to the 45. They were never across mid-field at any other time.

Cross Plains defense, though leaky at times, looked somewhat better, and the secondary, headed by Charles Barr, picked off two misguided Mountaineer aeriels. Barr swiped both while assisting in good pass defense coverage.

Mountaineers Score

Although Cross Plains dominated play in the early minutes, Santa Anna pushed across a tally in the initial period. They added their second counter late in the third period.

The only stolen Buff aerial of the night set-up the hosts' first tally. Left end Bobby Morgan plucked the errant pass off at the Cross Plains 37, and Horne and fullback Frank Valdez worked the ball to the Buff five, spiced with an eight-yard pass from quarterback Terry Melver to Morgan, in five plays. Horne then scored through a gaping hole over right tackle. Buff left corner back Jim Brown knocked down a pass on the two-point conversion try.

Horne then capped a 64 yard drive with a three-yard circle of left end with 15 seconds left in the third period. The hard running halfback was credited with 58 of the yards in 10 carries, six in succession. He also got the two point conversion through a big hole over the left side.

Santa Anna did not seriously threaten except on the two scoring marches.

Baird Cubs Thump Mighty Mites 24-8

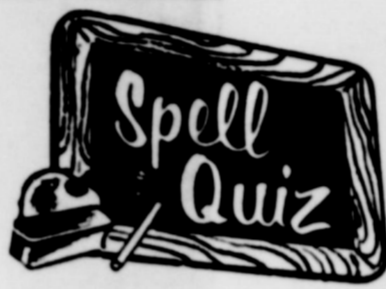
Baird Junior High School defeated Cross Plains Junior High School 24-8 Tuesday of last week in the grid opener for both elevens.
