## \$350 City Marshal Post Is Open Here

Following the recent resignation of Bart Thomas as City Marshal, E. B. Hindman is filling the post until a permanent replacement is made.

The City Council is slated to consider applications for the place at its next regular meeting, the night of Oct. 1.

The marshal's job pays a monthly salary of \$275 and free city utilities — gas, sewer and water — together with a fee of \$1 on fines in corporation court. Earnings average around \$350 monthly, said a member of the council, however, no car or gasoline expenses are provided.

Thomas resigned the job last week after the council voted three to one, with one alderman abstaining, to request the action.

## City Council Makes Study Of Possible Bond Election

## Bufs Seek Drouth's End Friday With Rising Star

### BUFF - WILDCAT SERIES

Since beginning of league rivalry in 1929, 30 games have been decided by the two schools. Cross Plains emerged victorious 20 times, lost nine and there has been one tie.

The thirty-first renewal of a grid rivalry which dates back to 1929 will be seen here Friday night as the Cross Plains Buffaloes host arch-rival Rising Star Wildcats.

The Thundering Herd will be seeking its first 1963 victory, and the Wildcats will be striving to gain a 2-2 record.

Both elevens have lost to Bangs of District 9-A, Cross Plains 18-6, and Rising Star 13-6.

Coach Weldon Hill's Wildcats are reported to be strongest up front with such trench warfaremen returning as tackles Roger Goodwin, Frasier Clark, James Cox and Rex Long, and guards Garry and Larry Dugan, Russell Botts and Jimmy Rutledge.

But backfield chores are capably handled by quarterback Terry Geye, 165, junior, and senior fullback Bill Clarke, and junior halfback Danny Woolley.

Although the Buffaloes will be at something less than full power, the starting 11 will weigh approximately the same as the visitors.

Buf's senior tackle Kenneth Sowell is out for possibly the rest of the season with a fractured collar bone, and starting fullback Charles Barr suffered a head injury last Friday, and it is doubtful that he will see action.

The Wildcats have beaten the locals the past two seasons, and are favored by almost everyone but staunch Buff supporters to make it three straight.

Game time is 8 p.m. at Buffalo Stadium.

## Extension Asked In Water Service

Eleven property owners along East Highway 36, just outside Cross Plains city limits, have requested water mains be extended to their places and have agreed to pay one-half the cost of supply lines.

The project is estimated to cost about \$2,000. No definite action has yet been taken.

Cross Plains is 32 degrees and seven minutes latitude and 99 degrees and 10 minutes longitude.

An Abilene concern is preparing information for a possible bond election in Cross Plains for improvement of the local water system. Data will be submitted to the City Council for study within the near future.

If such an election should be ordered, a general tax bond would be balloted upon, opined Mayor Ted Souder.

Councilmen decided to investigate the possibilities of a bond election after a recent report by engineers revealed that a sufficient source of water is available within six miles of the town. It is in the Sabanno area, from wells deeper than those presently utilized by the city.

"Our water field is already sorely pressed to meet demands and with the probability that land owners nearby will start private irrigation projects, we cannot long count on our present source," Souder declared.

Consensus of the Council is said to be that something will ultimately have to be done to improve the local water situation and that the time to begin planning is before he present supply becomes completely inadequate.

"We plan no hasty action," Souder said, "a bond election will not be called until all possibilities have been explored and people of the town apprized of the outlook for the future."

## Ruling Made On Salt Water Pits

Effective March 1, 1964, the use of unlined earthen surface salt water disposal pits located on the Hubbard Creek Watershed in Shackelford, Stephens, Eastland and Callahan Counties will be discontinued.

Railroad Commission of Texas at a formal conference last week made the ruling after hearing a request by the West Central Texas Municipal Water District.

The commission also ruled that all existing unlined pits used for salt water disposal will be filled after all water in them is removed.

Construction will be resumed in 14 days or less, the Review was told by the new owners.

Both Gregg and Lee were in Austin recently and received authorization as rest home operators, meeting requirements

of Texas statutes. Ground was broken for the local rest home in January by Aged Homes, Inc. of Fort Worth, however, construction was halted and little has been done in recent months. Gregg and Lee bought the property from the Fort Worth corporation and plan to construct and equip the building to modern standards.

Cross Plains civic organizations have encouraged the building of a rest home here, feeling that an institution of

that type will serve a local need. Property on which the present project is located was bought for \$1,000 by business and professional men and donated as an inducement for the enterprise.

## Flem Johnson Succumbs In Hospital At Baird Tuesday

Flem Johnson, 65, prominent Cross Plains area farmer and livestockman, died shortly after 1 p.m. Tuesday in Callahan County Hospital at Baird, where he had been a patient since Saturday. His condition had been critical since Sunday.

Funeral services will be held from the First Methodist Church here Thursday afternoon at four o'clock with the Rev. V. D. Walters, pastor of North Park Baptist Church in Abilene, officiating and assisted by the Rev. Charles J. McAfee, local Methodist pastor.

Burial will be in the family plot of Dressy Cemetery.

Born at Dressy Oct. 6, 1897, he was the only son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Noah Johnson, prominent couple which came to this area in 1888. The deceased was married to the former Miss Hester Thorn Jan. 29, 1918, also a member of one of this county's early-settling families. The couple made their home near Dressy through the

intervening years, where Mr. Johnson was a long-time member of the school board and staunch supporter of community and civic undertakings.

He recently entered an Abilene hospital and underwent exploratory surgery. He was brought home Aug. 27. He was taken to Baird in a local ambulance Saturday and his condition was reported to have steadily worsened.

## Merkel Clubs Buffaloes 28-0 Here Friday Night

A stout Buffalo defense weakened late in the second quarter and crumbled in the third to pave the way for Merkel to hand the locals their third consecutive season loss 28-0 here Friday night.

In the third non-conference tilt for both elevens, each threatened early in the first half on opposition errors.

Late in the first quarter a bad pass from center over the punter's head, gave Merkel the pigskin on the Buff 15, but a penalty and four plays later the Bison held on the 20.

Jim Brown, defensive line-backer, handed the locals their only serious threat of the game with a recovered fumble on the Badger's 18. Only two yards were netted in four plays, and Merkel began its first scoring march.

### 82-Yard March

Halfback Jacky Reynolds and fullback Weldon Tittle fueled the drive with big chunks of yardage in the 10-play march against the clock. Tittle blasted into paydirt from one yard out with a mere 16 seconds remaining in the half. Reynolds was stopped on the conversion try.

### Big Third Quarter

The second period tally was just a starter, and after intermission the Badgers counted twice within three minutes.

Following a Buff punt, Merkel cranked up a 40-yard drive, spiced with 10 yards in penalties, for the second TD. Reynolds capped the four-play blitz with an 11-yard circle of right end with 5:32 left in the third. He followed a similar route for two more points.

On the ensuing kickoff Merkel pounced on a Buff fumble and proceeded to move 35 yards in nine plays for the tally. Reynolds again skirted right end for the touchdown. Right halfback C. B. Brown reversed around starboard side for the two points with 2:34 remaining.

### Tittle Romps

Early in the final chucker, 190-pound Tittle found a big hole in the middle of the line and outran three Buffaloes 70 yards for the last counter. Brown was halted on the two-point conversion try.

Cross Plains then dominated the final seven minutes, but could not mount a threat.

### Nil Passing Effort

An oddity, in any grid contest, was that no pass found its target. A total of 15 aeriels were launched, and Cross Plains made the only interception.

Merkel's defense was spear-headed by Tittle, Richard Owen and Robert Shouse. Buffaloes outstanding defensively were Eddie Don Edmondson, Leelan Nunn and Charles Barr before he was injured. He did not return in the second half.

Plans were made at the meeting to attend the State Fair Oct. 5.

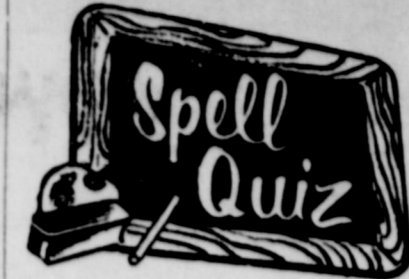
