City Options New Water Field Lease

An agreement was reached Monday night between W. T. McClure and Cross Plains City Council, whereby the municipality will be allowed to drill

test wells for water on the McClure Ranch, six miles north of town.

If sufficient water is discovered to supply this city, a 400 acre

lease will be negotiated and additional holes drilled.

"We're searching for a new source of supply," said Mayor Ted Souder.

It was pointed out that the city spent \$10,249.38 the past year for water leases, maintenance and electricity at the present water field, just east of town. Twenty-two pumps are being utilized to produce what councilmen say is an inadequate supply.

Contract to drill test wells for the city on McClure land has been awarded to Elic Thate. He will begin the last of this week and is expected to reach the 280 foot water strata in three days.

Buffaloes Host Bears In Circuit Squabble Friday

Archrival Baird Bears will invade Buffalo Stadium Friday night for the second District 10-A game for both Callahan County schools.

In previous years 32 games have been played between the two systems with Cross Plains having won 16 times and Baird emerging victorious on 14 occasions. Two were ties.

The first game was in 1924, and beginning with 1940 the two county elevens have met each year. Two games were played in 1945. The Buffaloes won the first 18-7, but the Bears took the second 7-0.

Last year Baird notched a 32-14 victory over the locals in an aerial battle. Five touchdown passes spiced the action.

Although both teams are capable of advantageously using the air lanes this season more of a ground game is expected.

The Bears, who lost 11 lettermen off last year's 8-2 team, are not as potent this campaign, al-

though they have played exceptionally good defensive football.

Merkel, the only mutual foe, defeated both Callahan County crews, Cross Plains 28-0, and Baird 6-0.

Eight returning lettermen dot Baird's regulars. While size of the Bears is not exceptional, speed and alertness suffice.

Friday's visitors will be striving to stay in the race for the conference crown having beaten Eastland, 6-0, in an upset last week. The Buffs on the other hand are still seeking their first victory of the season. Ranger routed the Herd, 36-6, last week.

Injuries to key personnel have hampered the Buffs almost all season. Last Friday fullback Leelan Nunn was sidelined with a broken left arm. The fracture, below the elbow, occurred early in the Ranger game. Charles Barr, former starting fullback, has resigned from the squad because of a head injury.

On the brighter side, tackle Kenneth Sowell is back in pads. He has been out with a broken collar bone, but according to Head Coach Jim Farmer, "Sowell in all probability will be ready this week." Larry Goble, Jay Hutchins and Jack Baum, all shaken up Friday night, are all right and will be ready for the Baird game.

Kickoff will be at 7:30 p.m. Friday at Buffalo Stadium.

Livestockmen Ponder Asking Drouth Aid

Shall Callahan County be declared a drought disaster area?

That question will be decided at a meeting in the courthouse at Baird Tuesday night, beginning at 7:30, to which all livestock producers are being ad-

vised to attend.

Designation of the county as a disaster area would qualify herd owners to buy feed grains at reduced rates from the Commodity Credit Corporation and to graze soil bank pastures and fields at minimum penalties. Grain prices under such con-

ditions are said to make maize available at \$1.53 per 100 pounds whereas the usual price is near \$2.

"Such a designation is not easy to gain," said County Agent Pat Garner late yesterday, "at least 100 livestock owners are needed at the Tuesday

night gathering if anything is to be accomplished."

The meeting was called by members of the county disaster relief committee, which is composed of Garner, Tommie Harris of Cross Plains and John Curry, Farm Home Administration supervisor in this county.

Proposed Amendment Not As Local As First Reading Indicates

Editor's Note: This is the third of a series of four articles dealing with proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution to be voted upon by citizens of the state Nov. 9. This article is intended to be impartial.

Proposition number three on the ballot proposes that a new subsection be added to the state constitution providing for retirement, disability and death compensation funds.

It would apply only to political subdivisions in Jefferson County — Beaumont is the county seat — but it has implications which could affect the remainder of the state.

It would not affect Jefferson County itself, only those political subdivisions within, such as cities, towns, school districts,

hospitals districts, navigation districts, and the like.

The amendment would give each political subdivision within Jefferson County the right to (1) set up its own retirement plan or (2) join the County Retirement System of Jefferson County which already exists under constitutional authorization. Each political subdivision would determine whether it would adopt a retirement plan and if so, which plan, by the holding of an election within the particular political subdivision at which the plan would have to be approved by a majority of the qualified voters in the subdivision.

If such a fund should be adopted by the voters of any subdivi-

sion within Jefferson County, the amount contributed by the subdivision out of tax funds would have to "at least equal" the amount contributed by each person covered. This implies it could exceed the person's contribution by any amount, so long as it did not exceed the specific limitation of 7½% of the amount paid to such person by the political subdivision.

The amount of money which can be contributed to such a fund under this proposed amendment is substantially different from the contributions allowed to a county retirement system under Section 62(b) of Article XVI. The county contribution must equal, but it may not exceed, \$180 for anyone dur-

ing a year's time. The conflict between these provisions would make it impractical for any political subdivision to join the Retirement System of Jefferson County unless it adopted the lower limitations applicable to the county.

The money for the retirement fund could be invested in bonds, the payment of principal and interest of which are guaranteed by the federal government.

Already there are statutory provisions permitting pension funds in many political subdivisions, such as municipal or city employees, county employees, firemen, policemen, judges, navigation district employees, public school employees. It can be seen that there would be con-

siderable overlapping of possible pension benefits, and although it would seem that a political subdivision could only participate in one such pension plan, considerable pressure would no doubt be exerted for selection of the plan which offered the most money. All plans would require the expenditure of tax revenues.

The proposed amendment would provide that recipients from any such fund would not be eligible for any other pension retirement fund or direct aid from the state of Texas, unless the amount contributed by the Retirement Fund by the political subdivision was released to the state as a condition to receiving the other pension aid.

While this amendment would apply only to subdivisions of Jefferson County, it is important to tax payers of the whole state. If it is adopted it will probably be a forerunner of similar proposals for other counties. It is of general interest also because it poses a problem of equity between county employees and those of the various political subdivisions within a county. It would allow higher contributions resulting in higher benefits for employees of city, navigation and other districts than employees of the county would receive. It would allow the districts to contribute more to the fund than their employees do, while county contributions are fixed at an equal amount.

Ranger Runs Past Herd 6-6 Friday In 10-A Tilt

Bulldogs swept past Cross Plains Buffalo last Friday night.

Just three minutes later, with 6:30 left in the first chucker, halfback L. H. Pounds intercepted Cross Plains' first play from scrimmage pass on the Ranger 45 and returned it to Buff 28. Left halfback Jimmy Drennan slashed off right tackle from two yards out for the counter on a fourth down situation. Following the five-play drive right guard Johnny Comancho booted the ball through the uprights.

Left end Jesse Renteria returned the ensuing Buff punt 47 yards to the Buff 13, and Newnham cracked in from one yard out on the second play. Comancho kicked the point.

Longest Gainer
Buff left end Alvin Parrish grabbed a perfectly placed pass from the arm of quarterback Joe Pierce for the longest single Bison gain of the season. The aerial traveled 35 yards, and Parrish plucked the oval from the grasp of two Bulldog defenders which he was between. Two plays later the drive fizzled via the fumble route on Ranger's 24.

The Buffs stalled one other Bulldog drive in the first half by holding for downs on the local 12.

Second Half Surge
After intermission a brief Buff thrust was stopped on the Bulldog 47, and nine plays later Drennan climaxed the march with a nifty eight yard run up the middle. Drennan also added the two points.

Pounds set in motion Ranger's final tally with a 44-yard return off a Buff punt.

Drennan again followed his hard-charging linemen from four yards for the tally. The 44-yard thrust took five plays. Drennan circled right end for another two pointer.

Two fumble recoveries and extra defense halted three more host threats. The first was recovered on the Buff two following Ranger right end Ronnie Hinds' 76-yard return of an intercepted Herd aerial which stopped a local drive that carried to the Bulldog 25.

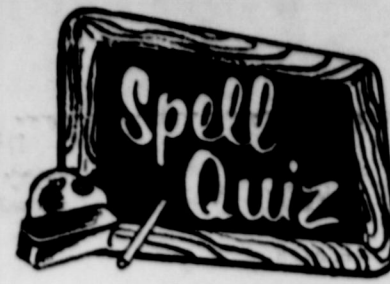
