The disaster committee composed of County Agent Pat Garner, Tommie Harris of Cross Plains and John Curry, Farm Home Administrator, immediately filed formal requests with the state Agricultural Stabilization Committee office at College

"If the request is approved and things move well, it is expected that at least four weeks will elapse before grain sorghums will be shipped here," Garner said.

The disaster committee also made formal application to graze soil bank lands at minimum penalties, as has been permitted in some regions of the nation.

Livestockmen present at Tuesday night's gathering were questioned as to how long their present supplies of feed would last in maintaining their basic herds. Most indicated that their supplies would be exhausted in 30 days. Several opined they would be able to hold out until

Approval of the request for drouth aid would qualify local livestock raisers to buy grain sorghums at \$1.51 per 100 pounds, well below the present going price.
