Has someone forgotten?

Through the first 10 months of this year only \$1,002.05 has been contributed for the upkeep of Cross Plains Cemetery. Fixed expenses totaled \$1,360.88. The deficit has averaged about \$38.00 per month and a \$464.07 surplus which existed at the beginning of the year is now exhausted.

LBJ Takes Presidency As World Mourns JFK Death

Local people were stunned with the sickening news from Dallas shortly after noon Friday that John F. Kennedy, 35th President of the United States, had been killed by bullets from an assassin's gun and that Texas Governor John Connally lay critically wounded.

Subsequent events which saw Lee H. Oswald, 24-year-old avowed-Marxist and former resident of Russia, charged and later himself murdered by a Dallas night club owner; Lyndon B. Johnson sworn in as the nation's chief executive, and the entire free world mourn the loss of a

dynamic leader were all anti-climatic.

Details of the heinous crime are now well known to local residents and the fourth week end in November made history and infamy which none will forget.

Reaction to the President's death was immediate and spon-

taneous here.

In less than two minutes after the tragic news was received in Cross Plains the post office flag was placed at half-staff. As though acting on cue, the bank and mercantile establishments quickly followed suit. The ensign of the nation, flown daily at the local school campus, was lowered to mid-mast.

Cross Plains people felt the hurt and reacted patriotically. Every flag for sale in town was bought and flown.

Many entertainment functions were immediately canceled. Paul Conn temporarily closed his Pioneer Drive-In Theater. No showing was held Friday night.

Most all Cross Plains churches took note of the historic events in Sabbath services and besought divine guidance for President Johnson as he assumed the helm of state. A special memorial service was held at the First Baptist Church Monday morning at 9 o'clock. Seventy-five persons of many faiths attended.

Classes were dismissed and Monday was a full holiday at Cross Plains schools as well as at most all other educational institutions in this section of the state. Cross Plains business establishments closed during funeral time of the fallen President in Washington.

Local people were abreast of history last week end.

Local Man Dies In Surgery Monday; Buried At Burkett

Funeral for T. Z. Sheppard, 78, long-time resident of the Cross Plains and Burkett areas, was held from the First Baptist Church here Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, with burial in the Burkett Cemetery.

Officiating clergymen Tuesday afternoon were the Rev. Don Turner, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains, and the Rev. Don Patton, Fort Worth Pentecostal minister. Burial was under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains.

He died in Olney Monday morning while undergoing surgery.

Born Dec. 24, 1884, in Jackson, Miss., Mr. Sheppard would have been 79 years of age on Christmas eve day. He was a retired farmer.

He and Mrs. Sheppard made their home northwest of Burkett, near Webbville, until eight years ago when they moved to Cross Plains. Since then their home has been at the corner of Avenue E and 13th Street, in the north part of town.

Mr. Sheppard had not been seriously ill before going to Olney for the surgery, which was not believed to be of a serious nature. Death resulted

from heart seizure.

Survivors include the widow; four sons, C. C. and Billie Joe of Abilene, and J. T. and Mack of Olney; two daughters, Mrs. Loren Duncan of Fort Worth and Mrs. Wesley Webb of Cisco; a sister, S. B. of Beirne, Ark.; a sister, Mrs. Owen Maynor of Winnsboro, La.; 16 grandchildren and 15 great-grandchildren.

Grandsons were pallbearers.

History Told Of Military Fort Near Cross Plains During Days Of Confederacy

At the beginning of hostilities in the Civil War, the Confederate government professed great concern over the protection of the Indian frontier in Texas and the same day that Lincoln was inaugurated, L. P. Walker, Federal Secretary of War, ordered Ben McCulloch to raise a regiment of 10 companies of Texas frontier. Colonel H. H. Culloch accepted the command and mustered the companies already under his command into the Confederate service and set about raising five additional companies and the portion of the frontier was furnished by these

units, the brunt of which fell upon the "Texas Frontier Regiment", as it was officially known.

On Jan. 29, 1862, Col. James M. Norris was appointed by Governor Lubbock to command the regiment and while the companies were being enlisted Lt. Colonel Obenchain and Maj. J. E. McCord were ordered to make a tour of inspection for the purpose of selecting the sites for a line of posts. On March 17, he stationed one-half of Captain Cureton's company at a point where the Gainesville and Fort Belknap road crossed the west prong of the Trinity river in Archer County. On the 21st the other half of the com-

pany was stationed at Fort Belknap, near Belknap in Young County. Soon after he placed one-half of the company under Captain John Salmon in Stephens county near the present town of Breckenridge. For the other half under Captain T. N. Collier a site was selected and designated Camp Pecan. This camp was located on the Pecan Bayou a few miles southwest of the Caddo Peaks in Callahan County. The exact location of this camp was at a point where the military road from Camp Cooper to Camp Colorado crossed the Bayou, the site being in the southeastern part of Callahan County.

This was the first line of defense to be established after federal troops had been withdrawn from the West Texas frontier just one year before.

On the whole, the work of the "Frontier Regiment" was effective and only a very few depredations by the Indians were reported during the two years it was maintained.

It has been recorded that life in the regiment was hard, especially during the first few months. The men were not properly armed, each being required to furnish his own weapon. They were poorly mounted and in most cases the horses were only grass fed. Much sickness prevailed and at one time measles broke out and

spread through all the companies. This was in April and May of 1862.

The men usually had no shelter and were without medical and surgical aid and in many cases were without cooking utensils. Subsistence for the men and forage for the horses had to be gathered anywhere it could be found. Later the men fared better as some tents were provided and also during the summer crude huts were constructed.

In speaking of the deficiencies, Colonel Norris stated: "At this time we could not make a successful defense if attacked by the Indians for want of ammunition, the principal

lack being caps and lead. Although a great part of the powder sent to us would not kill a man ten steps from the muzzle of the gun loaded with all the powder that could be forced in the cylinder." The Indians were quick to discover the weakness of the line of camps and began to make numerous raids and with greater boldness. It also fell upon the "Frontier Regiment" to protect the Ledbetter Salt Works in the southwestern part of Shackelford County not far from the Callahan County line. An abundance of salt was manufactured from the saline waters of the south-prong of Hubbard creek.

In the last years of the Civil War another duty was assigned the "Frontier Regiment", that of rounding up the draft dodgers from the eastern part of Texas who fled to West Texas for the purpose of escaping military service. Beginning in the early part of 1864 and continuing until the close of the Civil War, the attention of the regiment was principally directed to jayhawkers and deserters.

The surrender of General Kirby Smith on June 2, 1865 ended the Confederate resistance in Texas and following this event, the officers and men of the "Frontier Regiment" were paroled until the proper exchange or release could be made by Federal authorities.

Basketball coach Scot Edington said yesterday that approximately 15 girls would be named to the traveling teams, and that about 10 boys, who had only four workouts prior to the initial tilt, would be selected as the Buffalo traveling squad.

From last year's Buffette team returns: guards, Dean Hollingshead, Cynthia Hickman, Kathleen Cowan, and Judy Cloud; forwards, Sue Edington, Sandra Barr, Dianna Purvis, Beth Hutchins and Patty Pennell.

Other Buffette team members are: guards, Carolyn Tunnell, Linda Purvis and Betty Purvis; forwards, Darlene Hargrove, Connie Roby and Terry

Baum. According to Edington three Buff returnees are ready to go and there could possibly be a fourth later in the season. Experienced Buffs are; Charles Barr, Eddie Don Edmondson and Tommy Purvis. Kenneth So-well is presently out with an ankle injury, but it is thought that he will report later in the season.

Coach Edington said that 30 candidates reported for practice sessions, and that a "B" schedule might be played if interest and personnel remain strong.

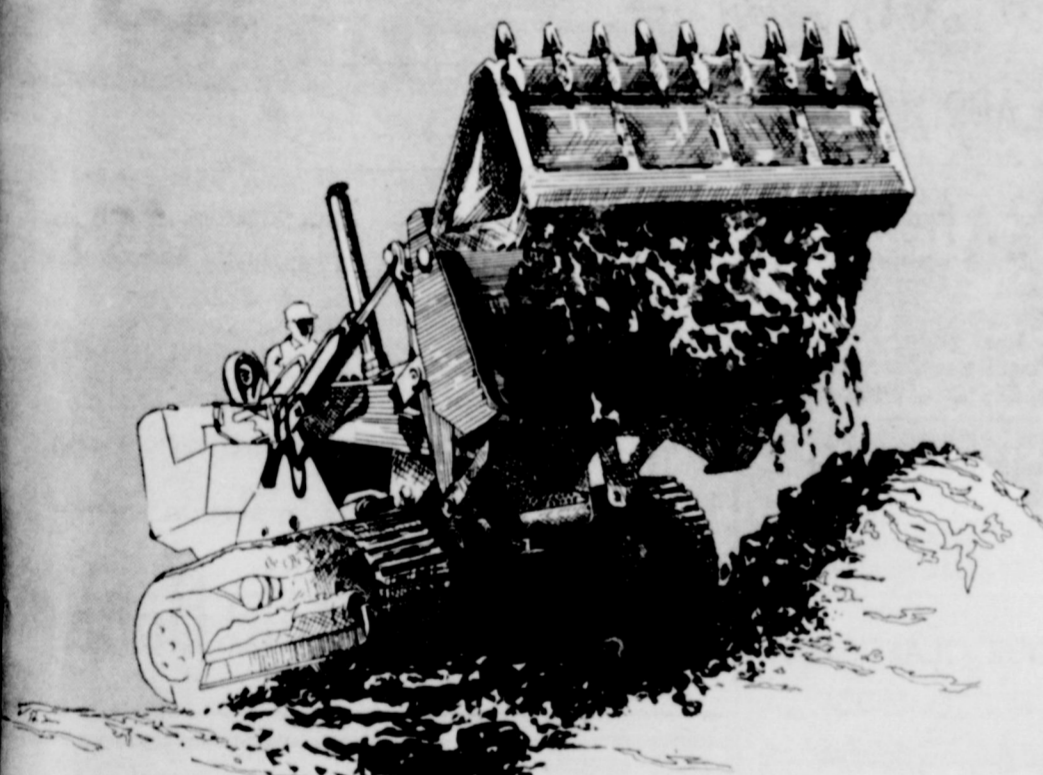

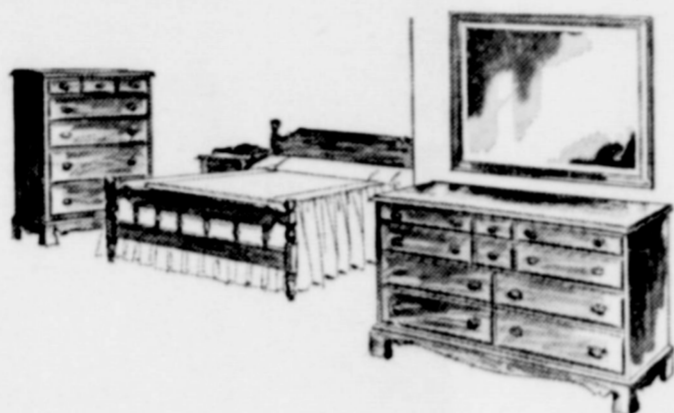

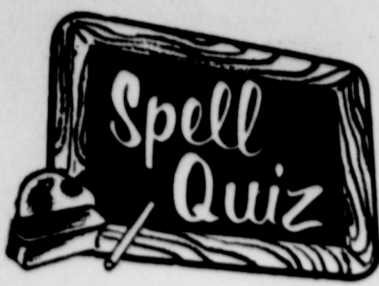
