

# **Drouth Feed-Grain Enroute To County**

J. C. Earp of the Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization Committee yesterday that applications are now being taken from livestockmen for feed grain, being made available by the federal government in designated drouth-stricken areas.

An order for three carloads of maize was placed last Friday and is expected to arrive in Baird within a few days.

The grain will be available to livestockmen for their foundation herds at \$1.51 per 100 pounds.

Earp explained that foundation herds were regarded as female animals kept for breeding purposes and herd sires. Feed grain for other animals will be charged at the rate of \$2.01 per 100 pounds.

Dairymen will be entitled to 10 pounds per day per "wet" cow at the \$1.51 price.

Five pounds per day will be available for beef cows on grain ration. Price for this category will also be \$1.51.

Mother animals of all types, other than hogs, will qualify for the lower price of \$1.51.

Feed grain for hogs will be allotted at \$2.02. Ten pounds will be distributed per animal unit in swine. Three and onethird hogs are classified as an animal unit

Earp was unable to say yesterday exactly when the first grain would be available to Callahan County farmers, however, he stressed the advantages of making immediate application.

Confusion caused by a recent election on repeal of the poll tax in Texas may disfranchise many local voters during 1964.

No poll tax payments were accepted until results of the election became known and persons who paid property taxes early were unable to purchase poll tax receipts.

County Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell said Monday morning that his office had not received poll tax blanks from an Austin printer and none could be written until the forms arrived. "We had been promised Dec. 1 shipment and are expecting the necessary forms immediately," he said.

Ordinarily about 450 persons have paid poll taxes for the ensuing year by Dec. 1. To that date this year only 25 had made application for the voting per-
