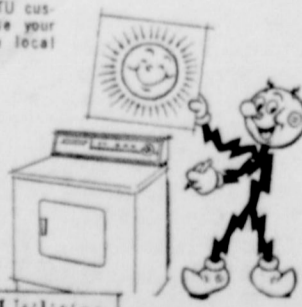

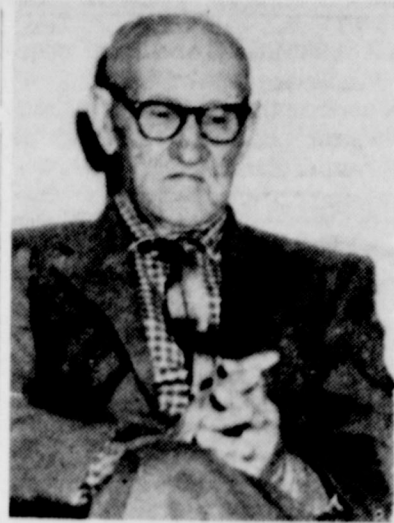

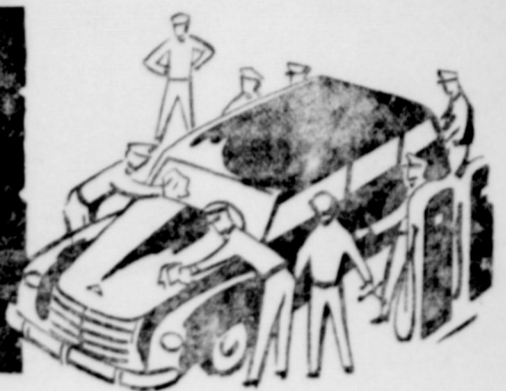
Tax Workshop At Courthouse Friday

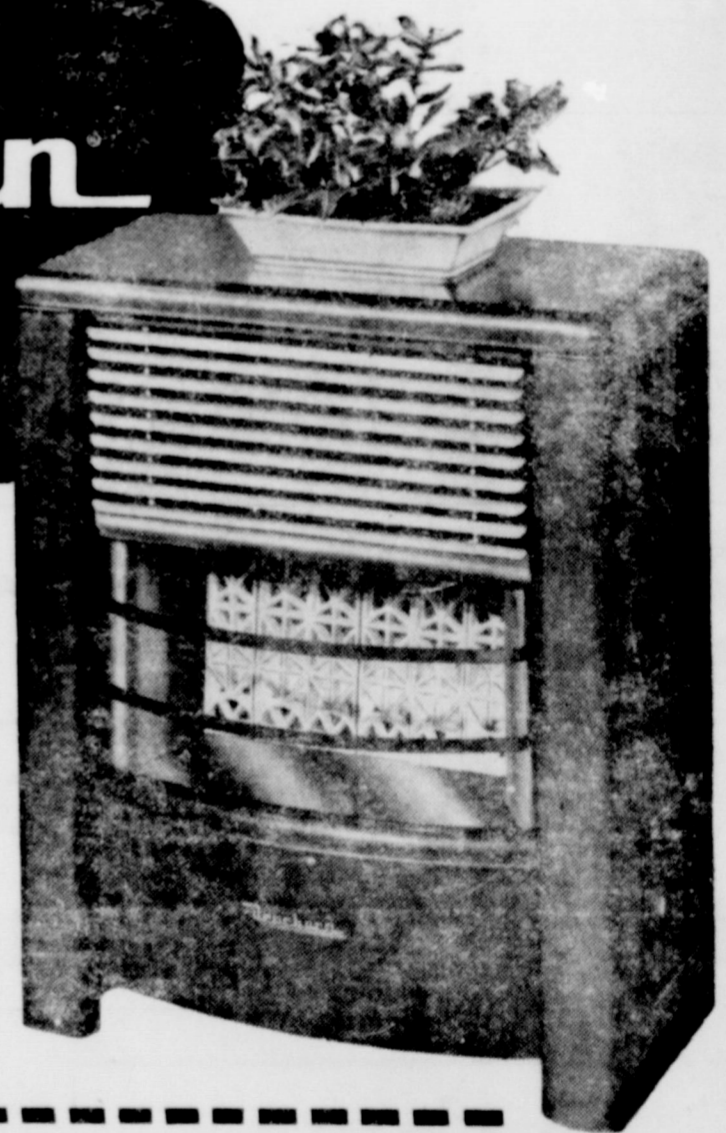

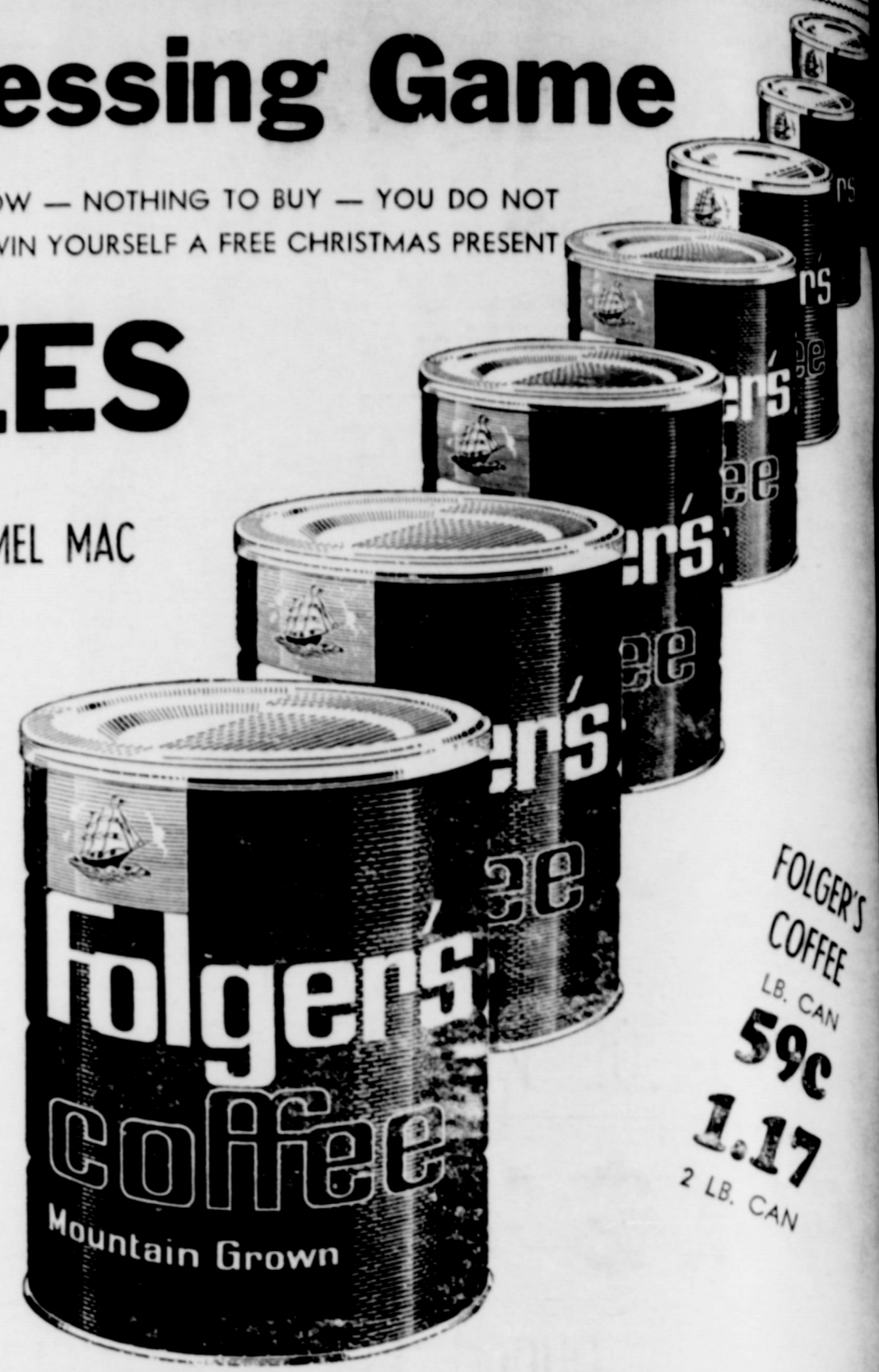
