## Home Towner

Paul Conn enjoys a rare distinction. He knew the president of the United States, when both were at Johnson City.

Remember him as a lanky, little kid with a "grit", says the theater owner.

Mistletoe is the state flower of Oklahoma and is held in affection comparable to which Texans lavish upon bluebonnets.

In recent days, mistletoe has won new popularity in Cross Plains. Gathered from the parasitical plant has provided part time jobs for more than 100 workers and expended thousands of dollars in local channels of trade. Legend says that any girl hanging below a clump of mistletoe should be promptly kissed. The Cross Plains, which in three weeks supplied about 60 tons of mistletoe for northern markets, may therefore, be responsible for much Christmas smooching.

A well-informed source estimates there are about 100 numbers of television sets and bathtubs in the Cross Plains trade territory, approximately 1,200 each.

It is not heard about the importance of trading at home and how much good is done by a locally-spent dollar.

Money taken out of town has small chance of ever finding its way back to this community, whereas that which is retained here may help pay bills and pay local citizens. The point is best illustrated by a thing that happened during the depression of the 1930's.

A merchant sold \$10 worth of goods and took a check in payment. The check was cashed from one store and the money reached the bank where there were 15 endorsements on the check.

The check was hot and the merchant refused payment.

Instead of running the check backward and making the merchant get \$10 from the man who gave it to him, the holder called in the 14 endorsements and proposed that they split the loss by giving 67 cents each. Every check had made 10 percent or more — at least \$1 — on the money he'd sold. By paying 67 cents apiece no one in fact each had a minimum of 37 cents profit.

Reading at home turned a hot check into a slight profit for 15 separate business concerns.

Who ever thought that a check would render a service to Callahan County? Although such was not the original intention, the checkman despot has done his part.

People of Baird have sought a medical doctor to practice at Callahan County Hospital. Their fight seemed hopeless until a prominent Cuban doctor was forced to flee his homeland to escape a dictator's vengeance.

Dr. Ernest Vernezobre fled his private hospital and barely escaped Cuba with his life. He came to the United States, married a Registered Nurse in Virginia and the couple moved this week to the Callahan County seat to begin medical practice.

## High School Boy Dies In Collision

Clayton Lloyd McMillan, 17-year-old local high school student, was killed almost instantaneously Saturday night at 6:10 in an accident on State Highway 36, between the western city limit of Cross Plains and the Turkey Creek bridge.

The popular local youth lived only a few minutes after his 1950 model pickup truck was involved in a collision with a 1945 model flatbed truck.

Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard of Cross Plains and Patrol Sgt. Roger Sosebee of Eastland said the accident occurred as the larger, flatbed truck, loaded with mistletoe, started to turn left off the highway to a dirt road.

None of the occupants of the larger truck sustained serious injury. The vehicle was driven by James Cecil Smoot, 17, of Sabanno. He was accompanied by his brother David Ray Smoot, David Carrol Grider and Donnie Ray Gardner. All of the youths are local high school students. They had been gathering mistletoe to sell to buyers in Cross Plains.

Judges for the event were faculty members at Abilene High School.

Eddy Joe McAnally served as master of ceremonies and introduced the 41 young ladies who competed in the event.

In coronation ceremonies Miss Shocklee was escorted by Kent Bowden, son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Bowden, who was recently chosen most handsome boy in Cross Plains High School.

Miss Edgington was escorted by Eddy Don Edmondson, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. B. Edmondson, second most handsome youth.

Miss McMillan was escorted by Charles Barr, son of Oren Barr of Cross Plains and Mrs. Frances Barr of Fort Worth, the local school's third most handsome youth.

The three Cross Plains High School beauties are all prominent in local school undertakings, being active in campus organizations and extra-curricular affairs.

## Clarence Edgington Dies Unexpectedly

Funeral services for Clarence B. Edgington were held from the First Methodist Church here Saturday at 2 p.m. with the Rev. Charles J. McAfee, pastor, officiating, assisted by the Rev. Don Turner, local Baptist pastor. Burial was in the family plot of the Burket Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains.

Mr. Edgington, who had recently been hospitalized with a heart condition, died unexpectedly in his parked automobile, near his home in the south part of town, Thursday night.

Born near Burkett Dec. 16, 1892, Mr. Edgington was a member of one of the early-settling families in this section of Texas and had been a lifelong resident of the Cross Plains area. He was married Dec. 11, 1911, to Miss Madie Pauline Koenig, who died Dec. 9, 1960, just before the couple would have celebrated a 49th wedding anniversary.

Mr. Edgington had been long identified with livestock and agricultural activities in this area, however, several months ago he moved from his place between here and Burkett and was currently making his home in Cross Plains. A grandson, Edde Gwynn Elliott, lived with him.

Of the 16 teams, eight boys and eight girls, seven area schools are represented by both boy and girl aggregations. Entries in this week end's melee are Cross Plains, Early, Eula, Santa Anna, Scranton, Talpa-Centennial and Ballinger. Jim

Ned brings a boys quintet and Goldthwaite sends a girls sextet.

### Balanced Brackets

Basketball Coach Scot Edgington said over the week end that four of the area's strongest small school teams are invited to participate in the male division, and that the female octaves will find opposition very strong.

Although Edgington would not venture an opinion as to whom he favored, he did say that a quartet of entries, Jim Ned,

Talpa-Centennial, Scranton and Eula, all perennial cage powers, would furnish plenty of thrills in the boys' bracket of the upcoming event. Edgington was hasty to add that little was known of the prowess of some of the competitors.

Edgington was equally tight-lipped about the girls' division, stating that the teams were too well-balanced to predict a possible winner. Adding to the difficulty of picking a favorite was the limited information of some teams.

### Six Tilts Thursday

Half-dozen games are to be played both Thursday and Friday, but eight games are on tap Saturday in two sessions.

## Mistletoe Gathering Adds \$10,000 Here

One hundred and nineteen people have been gathering the mistletoe for sale to Lubke and he estimated that the final seven days here would see more brought to market than during the first 11 days.

"We believe our purchases in Cross Plains will aggregate 120,000 pounds," Lubke said. In addition to gatherers, 11 persons have been employed here in crating and packaging mistletoe for shipment.

A second buyer moved in last Sunday and posted an eight cent per pound price, one cent higher than Lubke's quotation. The late-arriving buyer is Thomas J. Smith of Dallas, operator of an air-freight service. He too, plans to suspend operations this week end, the Review was told.

The first 11 days of operation Lubke's firm bought 55,000 pounds in Cross Plains compared with 20,000 in Comanche and 4,000 at Goldthwaite. Sales grossed \$3,850 the first 11 days.

The Herd grabbed a quick lead and added to it each quarter, although according to Edington, "we had a lower percent-

age from the floor than we like." It was the Buffs' second straight triumph.

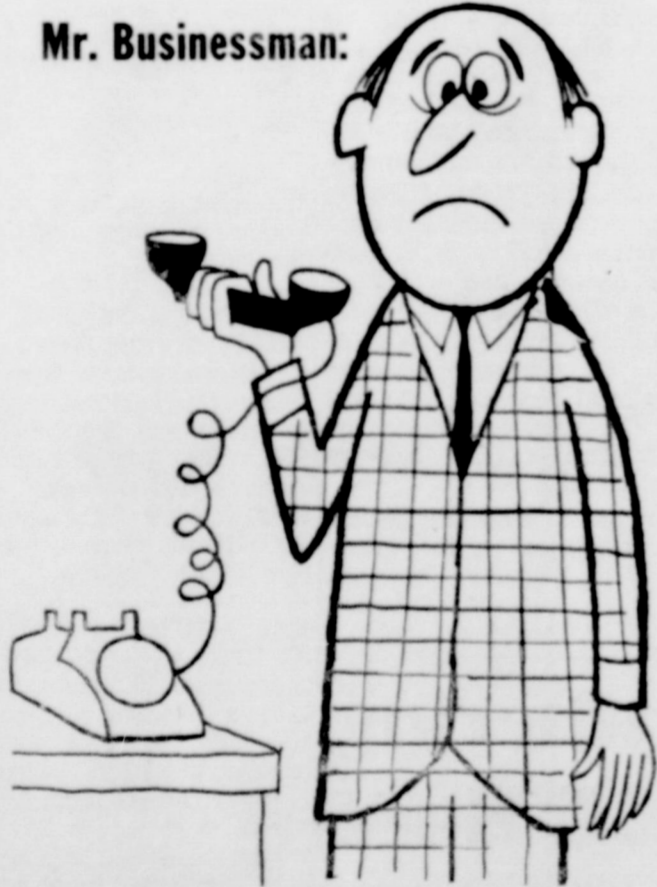

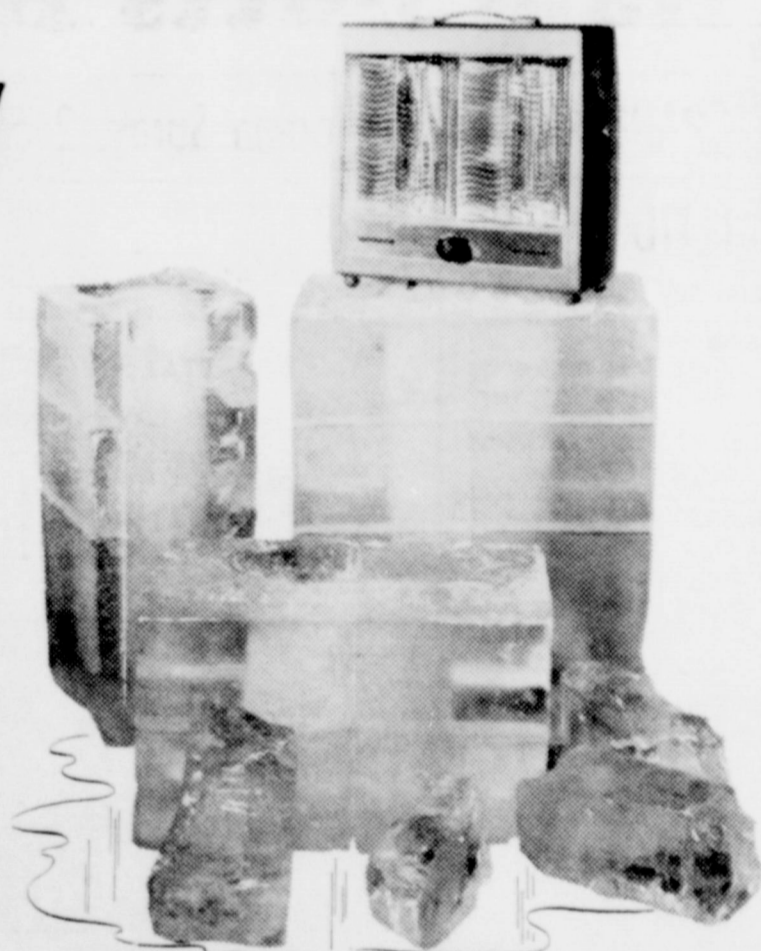

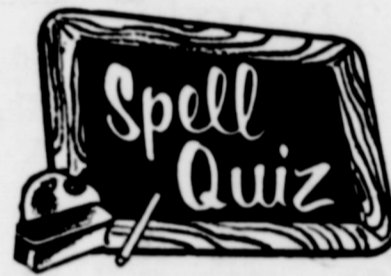
