Year's First Grand Jury Faces Crowded Docket

A heavier than normal docket faces 42nd District Court's first grand jury of the new year, due to convene in Baird Thursday of next week, Jan. 9.

Felony theft cases involving a break-in at Callahan County Farmers Cooperative at Baird and alleged stealing from an oil

lease are due for early hearings. Also scheduled for investigation of the panel is a charge made against a Callahan County man of having fired a gun at a government trapper. Three others face second offense charges of driving while intoxicated and there is one count of livestock

theft. "These are the main things we expect to come up", said Sheriff Homer Price, Tuesday. Price pointed out, however, that additional matters will be presented by other officers of the court as well as probably initiations by grand jurors

themselves. "Indications are the docket will be heavier than usual", he opined. List of persons to serve on the first grand jury for 1964 will be made public this week end and published in next edition of the Cross Plains Review.

Stephenson. Deel Edington, manager of the Cross Plains facility, and A. G. Black, general manager of the Co-Op, said that the sign would be installed prior to the annual show scheduled here Jan. 11.

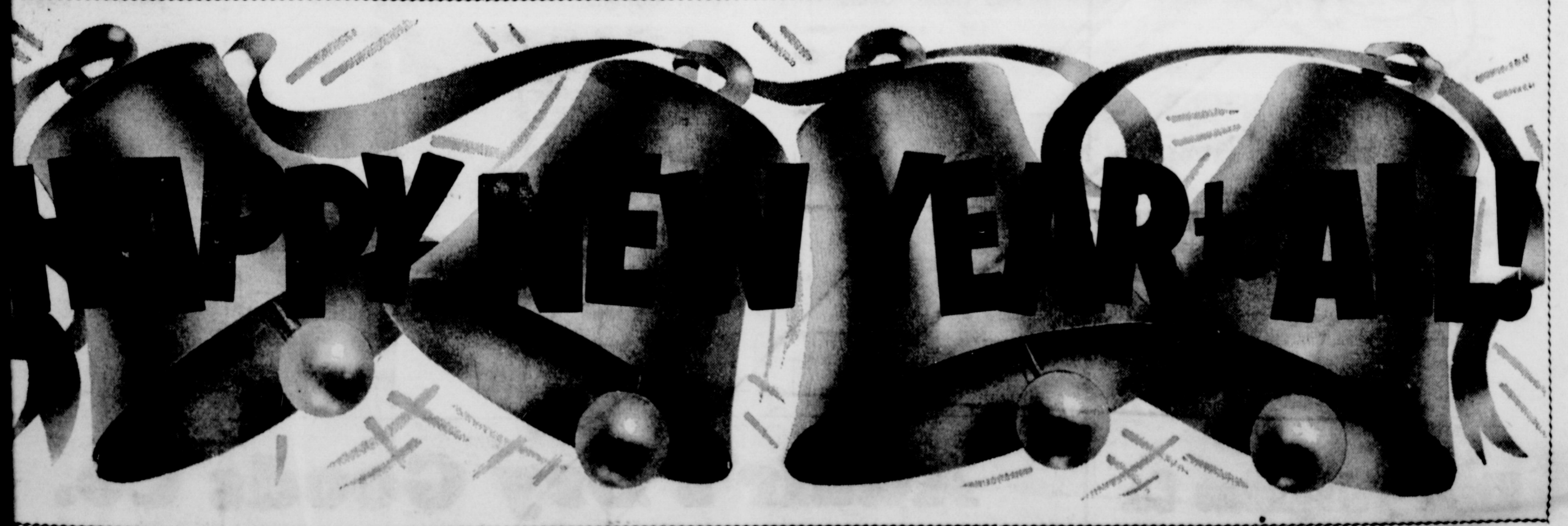

Rainfall Below Normal In 1964

Rainfall in Cross Plains during 1963 dropped 4.50 inches below normal. Total received here the past 12 months was 20.04, as compared with a 25-year average of 24.54. Driest months of the year were July August, September and October. Total precipitation during that four-month period amounted to only 1.99 inches and greatly curtailed agricultural yields.

Bufs Win Three Of Last Four Hardwood Outings

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes have dominated cage play on the local scene for the past two weeks.

The Buffaloes have emerged victorious in three of four tilts, and the Buffettes have netted a win in the team's only action.

Bufs Take Consolation

The Herd bounced back after a first-round defeat in the Brownwood High School Tournament Dec. 19-21, to cop consolation honors.

In the initial tilt Friday Goldthwaite threw off a slow start in the last three quarters to dump the Bufs 63-47. Joe Pierce counted 15 for the locals and Eddie Edmondson scored 13.

Pierce again paced the Herd's scoring in a 40-39 nipping of cross-county rival Baird in the second round elimination. The freshman cager bucketed 17 points, and was followed by Charles Barr with 12. Baird's fast finish closed the gap to one point at the buzzer after the Herd had led all the way.

Cross Plains easily downed Bangs in the consolation finals 44-35. At intermission the Buffaloes held a 20 point lead, 29-9. Barr tallied 14 points followed by Pierce and Bobby Morgan with eight each.

Bump Early

Tuesday, Dec. 17, both local high school cage teams grabbed triumphs at Early High School.

The Herd prevailed in a high scoring affair 60-56 with Barr leading the way with 26 points. Pierce tallied 18.

The Buffettes' forwards were exceptionally accurate in posting an easy 64-45 victory.

Thus far this season in 7 varsity games, the two squads have won 14 while losing only three. The Buffaloes boast an 8-2 mark, and the Buffettes record shows a 6-1 tally. Both teams lost one tilt in the Cross Plains tournament.
