When the Legislature adjourned, Gibbens' demanding legislative activities continued into the interim when he was named Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Texas Legislative Council, a research and Bill producing arm of the Legislature. Also, he was given membership on interim committees to be concerned with Conflict of Interest and the Legislative Internship Advisory Program and the Preservation of State Records.

In addition to these assignments Gibbens has been named on two different occasions by House Speaker Byron Tunnell to represent the State of Texas at interstate conferences.

Gibbens is a graduate of Breckenridge High School and the holder of a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Government from Texas Tech. He was married in June of 1963 to the former Beth Cannon of Madisonville, Tex.

Gibbens stated that he will issue a formal statement of his candidacy and program at a later date.

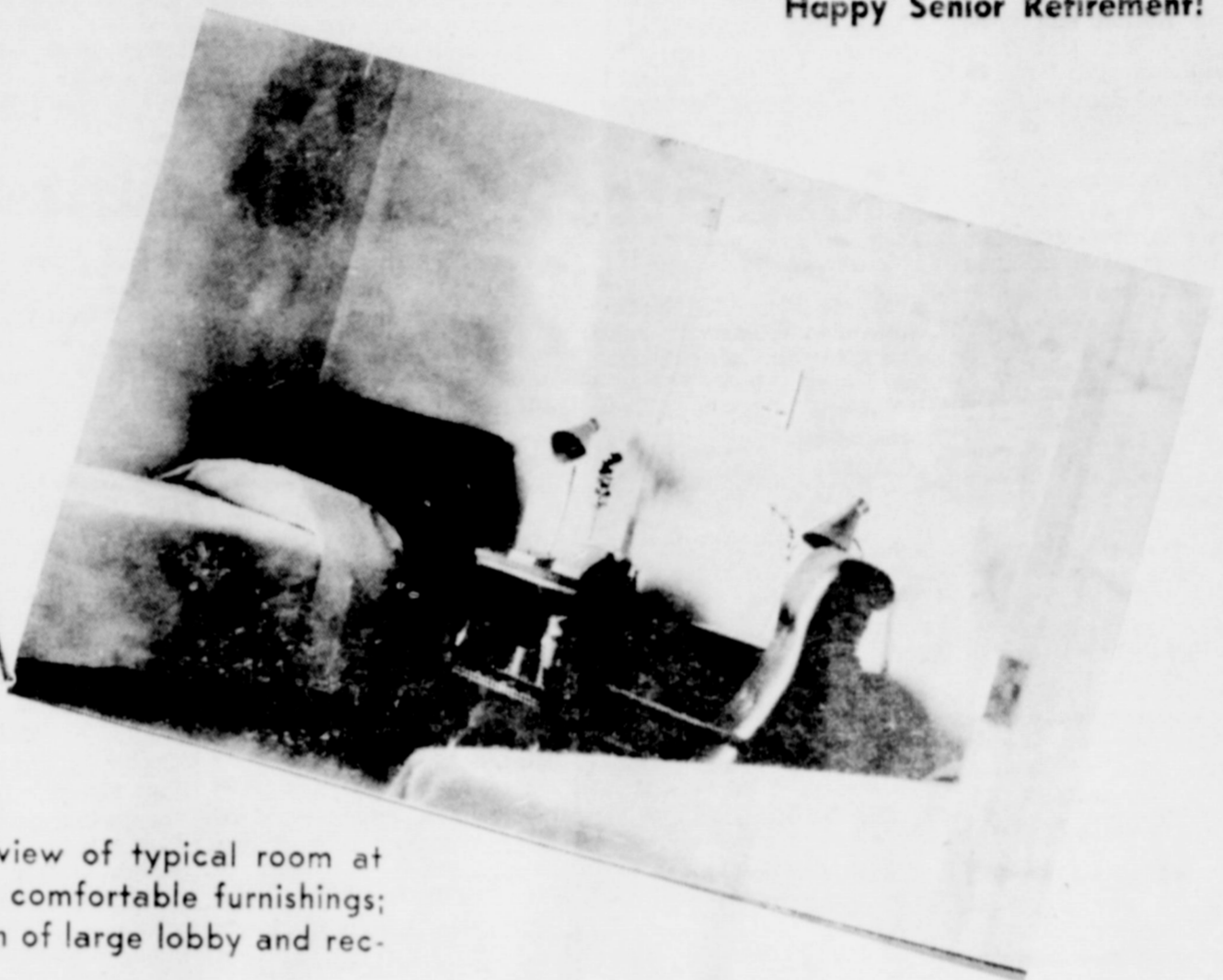

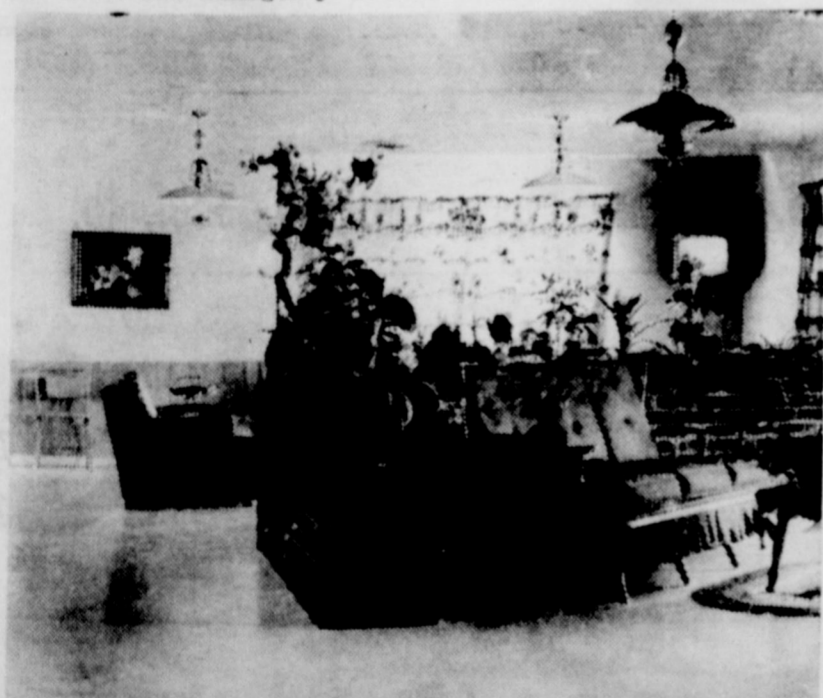

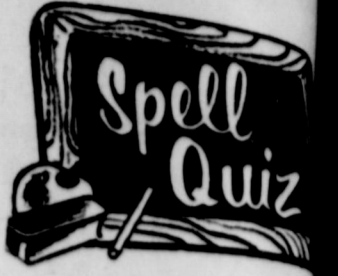
