## Feb. 17 Deadline For New Grower Peanut Allotment

New peanut farmers are being advised that Feb. 17, 1964, is the final date to file for new grower allotments.

To be eligible for a new grower peanut allotment the following requirements must be met: (1) The operator must be largely dependent on income from the farm for his livelihood. (2) The farm is the only farm owned or

operated by the farm operator or owner for which a peanut allotment is established for 1964. (3) In addition, the producer must have had experience in growing peanuts during at least two of the past five years. Experience as defined under the regulations means growing peanuts on an allotment farm as an owner, tenant, or sharecropper.

## FM Road To Oplin Sought By Court

A resolution has been unanimously adopted by Callahan County Commissioners Court asking Texas Highway Department to give full consideration to the construction of a Farm-to-Market Road from Cross Plains to Oplin.

To serve the greatest number of people along the way, the Callahan officials have asked that the FM Road follow approximately the same course as that now utilized. The road would go west from the old Coleman Highway, in front of the Tom Cross, R. B. Belyeu and Oren Barr homes and follow the existing right-of-way westward across State Highway 283 and on to Oplin.

The resolution as adopted by the court read as follows: "Be it resolved that the Commissioners Court of Callahan County, Texas, does hereby respectfully ask that the Texas Highway Department give full consideration to the construction of a Farm-to-Market road covering the route taken by the present county road running from the City of Cross Plains to the town of Oplin in said Callahan County, Texas.

"Be it further resolved that the Court be of record in urging such a project in order to benefit the many citizens of this County who continuously use this thoroughfare. In the opinion of this Court such a paved road would greatly affect the economic standards of the area concerned and bring a long-needed and awaited boost to an area with great potential.

"Unanimously passed this the 13th day of January A. D., 1964."

The resolution was signed by County Judge Byron Richardson and Commissioners Roscoe Shelnett, Glen Swor, G. A. White and Duke Mitchell of Precincts 1, 2, 3 and 4 respectively.

# Price Quits Sheriff Race; 3 Others File This Week

Callahan County's political pot began to simmer Monday with announcement of Sheriff Homer Price that he is withdrawing from the race for reelection. Indications that the boiling point may soon be reached came with announcement of three others for the post Price is vacating.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. of Cross Plains tossed his hat into the ring last week end, as also did James E. Day of Clyde. Then Monday Deputy Sheriff Tod Newton of Baird became a candidate.

Deadline for filing for county office is Feb. 3. Opening statements of the three candidates for sheriff appear hereunder:

## N. L. Long, Jr. Makes Statement Of His Candidacy

After careful consideration I have decided to offer myself as a candidate for Sheriff of Callahan County, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

By way of introducing myself, permit me to submit the following autobiographical data.

I was born and reared in Callahan County and will be 35 years of age Feb. 17, 1964. My immediate family consists of my wife and our 9-year-old son. I am a veteran of the Korean Conflict, having served at outposts in the Arctic Circle.

My experience as a peace officer has been that of working as a deputy under three separate sheriffs of Brown and Callahan Counties. I have also been privileged to attend in-

service training schools conducted by various enforcement arms of our state and federal government.

If elected your sheriff, I will devote my dead-level best to making the type of officer you expect and have a right to demand. Law and order must be maintained at all times, however, it is imperative in a county such as ours that the sheriff be able to cooperate with state and neighboring officers to accomplish the greatest results while exercising necessary economy. I know that I can work harmoniously with the Department of Public Safety, Texas Rangers, federal officials and all neighboring municipal and county peace officers. I invite

your investigation of my reputation among any of these agencies, and I have in the past worked with most all of them at one time or another.

My religious and fraternal affiliations include membership in: the Baptist Church, Masonic Lodge, American Legion and Texas Sheriff's Association.

Between now and election day — May 2 — I hope to visit with every voter of the county and discuss my aims and aspirations. In the meantime, your investigation of my character, reputation and general fitness for the job is urgently invited.

If elected I will do my best to keep law and order at all times, without fear of contradiction and offering equal consideration to all violators.

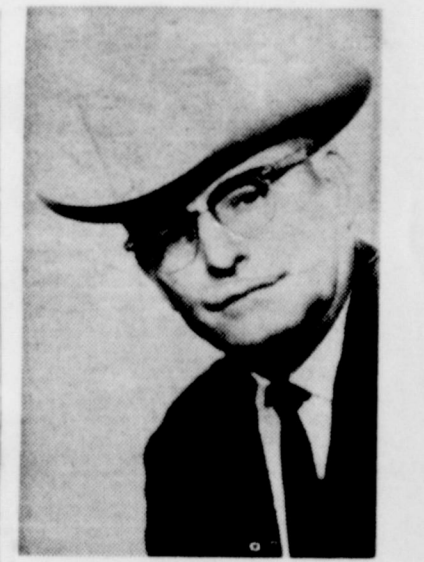

## Do You Remember?...

Jan. 15, 1943: Figures released by Joe G. Weiler, chairman of the sale of defense bonds and stamps in the Cross Plains community, reveal that this Area exceeded its quota in the purchase of war securities during the week ending Jan. 15, 1943, by \$18,000.

Jan. 14, 1944: The basketball tournament here last week ended in a tie between the teams declared by all observers to be one of the most successful held in the local gymnasium. Despite snow, muddy streets and freezing cold, the event was well attended and the excitement ran high throughout the nights and two days.

Jan. 12, 1945: The Red Cross room, located over the office, is again open and all members of this community are invited to help with this work. The room is being used for the boys going over to the front.

Jan. 18, 1946: January 25 is set for the annual show of fat calves and hogs here in the Cross Plains chapter of the American Farm Bureau, under the direction of O. J. Mondson, high school Vocational Agriculture instructor. The show is scheduled to be shown at the lot east of the C. D. West Service Station, weather permitting. However, if the day is bad, site will be moved to A. D. Petty's peanut stand on south Main street.

Jan. 10, 1947: The old saying "an ill wind that blows good" was proved again in Cross Plains last week. As merchants lamented the business because of the cold which kept people away from the stores, three dry days did a "land of rubber boots, galoshes, and shoes" were sold by local merchants.

## Tampering With Valves At SCS Lakes Unlawful

Management of the 11 flood-retention dams in the Cross Plains area is a function of Turkey Creek Conservation District and warning is made that unauthorized persons tampering with gate-valves or other equipment will be prosecuted.

Persons on whose land the flood-control structures are located have the right to use impounded water as provided by law. It is pointed out that property owners may release water at their discretion, so long as a sufficient amount is retained to meet needs of the water district in irrigating of grass on dams and other similar uses.

Dams may be grazed by land owners or lessees only in accordance with agreements reached with directors of Turkey Creek Conservation District.

This is necessary, say soil conservationists, to assure adequate turf and protection of dams. Without regulated grazing, they opine tax payers may be subject to unnecessary expense in maintenance.

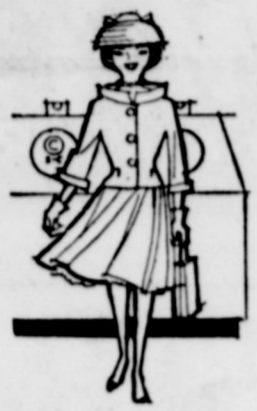

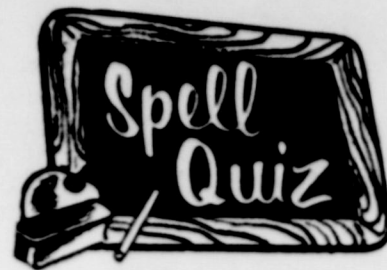
