Smokey Edwards In Sheriff's Race

W. C. (Smokey) Edwards of Baird, former Callahan County deputy sheriff and long-time employee at Premier Refining Company's plant between Baird and Putnam, this week filed as a candidate for sheriff.

His introductory statement to voters appears hereunder:

After long and studious consideration, I have decided to offer myself as a candidate for Sheriff of Callahan County, subject to action of the Democratic primaries.

\$150,000 Bond Election Set Here February 15th

An election asking issuance of \$150,000 in municipal bonds will be held in Cross Plains Feb. 15.

Although only three major projects are called for, four propositions will appear on ballots. Two will have to do with expansions to the waterworks, one will pertain to a municipal swimming pool and the other will concern improvements to the city-owned gas distributing system.

Of \$114,000 in bonds proposed for waterworks improvement, \$75,000 would be general obligation bonds and \$39,000 would be revenue bonds. The swimming pool and gas system projects would be financed entirely with revenue bonds, on which it would be specified that holders could never demand payment out of funds derived from taxation.

Each of the three projects will pass or fail, independent of action taken on the other two. In case of improvements to the waterworks, however, estimated cost aggregates \$114,000 and both the proposal concerning tax bonds and that of \$39,000 revenues would need sanction of voters.

It is pointed out that only freeholders (qualified voters who have rendered property for taxation to the city) will be eligible to ballot on the bonds.

Members of the City Council met with their engineers, attorney and bond representative Monday night and discussed various phases of the proposed new improvements.

A Review writer attended the meeting and asked questions about specific phases of the election and the proposed pro-

jects. The questions and answers are listed hereunder:

Q. How many wells would be placed in production at the new water field if the project is approved by voters at the polls Feb. 15. This question was answered by Tye Collins of the National Engineering Company of Austin, employed by the City of Cross Plains.

Collins answered: "We recommend that enough wells be used to produce 156 gallons of water per minute."

Water Commissioner Ira Hall said two wells would produce that amount.

Q. On whose land will the water wells be located?

A. (By Hall) That of W. T. McClure

Q. What will the city pay for the water?

A. (By Hall) 5c per thousand

gallons; measured at the settling basin within the city limits of Cross Plains.

Q. What size line would be used to bring the water from the McClure Ranch to Cross Plains?

A. (By Collins) A six-inch line, either cast or asbestos. We would ask bids on both types.

Q. Upon arrival of the water within the city, would it be treated or filtered?

A. (By Collins) It would pass through a settling basin and also be chlorinated.

Q. Will the new water be softer than that currently used by the city?

A. (By Collins) Present water has a measured hardness of 432; water from the strata now under study has a hardness of only 290.

Q. Will the present water

rates be continued if the waterworks bond is approved, or will they be raised or lowered?

A. (By Hall) I would recommend that the minimum be raised to \$2.50 for 3,000 gallons. This, however, would be up to the City Council.

Q. Would the new source of supply give adequate water and pressure to all sections of the town on a hot Summer day?

A. (By Collins) The supply would be adequate, however, we have not studied the matter of pressures.

Water Commissioner Hall volunteered the opinion that the pressures would be adequate anywhere the line on private property, leading away from city mains, are not of subnormal size.

Callahan Calves Claim Top Fort Worth Prizes

Callahan led all West Texas counties in prize collecting in the junior steer division of the Southwest Exposition & Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth last week end.

Scott Odom, 17, Cross Plains FFA member and son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Odom, showed an Angus steer to the overall reserve championship of the junior division. His steer was also champion of the Angus steer class.

He lost out for the overall title to a Hereford steer owned by Mark Daniel, Goldthwaite 4-H Club boy. Young Odom was in Fort Worth again Wednesday to show his Angus against three other steers for the reserve championship of all classes of the Fort Worth show.

Shackleford and Callahan County boys made a clean sweep of the Charolais steer class.

Victor Schkade, Shackleford 4-H boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. August Schkade of Albany, showed a 1,045-pound steer to the championship of the division. His animal was bred by Tom Blanton of Albany.

The reserve champion was shown by Jim Freeman, 15, Cross Plains FFA, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Freeman. The steer was one which the Cross Plains youth won in scramble calf competition at last year's Callahan County Sheriff's Posse rodeo. The steer was also bred by Blanton.

Odom's reserve champion steer was first in the senior calf class and was bred by Luther

McClung of Abilene. The same calf was sixth in his class at the recent Abilene show.

Odom's calf which will be one of the top sellers of the Fort Worth show is expected to bring in the neighborhood of \$2,000. In addition, the Cross Plains exhibitor has already picked up more than \$125 in prize money at Fort Worth.

In the Hereford class competition, Weldon Lynn Edwards, 18, Callahan 4-H boy and son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Edwards of Clyde, had the reserve champion. It was a steer bred by his grandfather, Morris M. Edwards of Abilene and was a calf that stood first in its class at Abilene.

In the Hereford junior class: Scott Odom, Cross Plains, seventh.

In Angus junior steers: Vicki Finley of Baird, 14th. This was the calf which won the grand championship of the recent Callahan County Show in Cross Plains.

There were only two Charolais classes in the show. The winners included Benny Brame, Bill Moore, Stanley McGowan and Lawrence Westbrook, all of Baird; Jimmy Freeman and Mike Ingram of Cross Plains and Victor Schkade of Albany.

Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places within the City of Cross Plains, Texas, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation, published in the City of Cross Plains, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

water for lawns and gardens?
A. (By Hall) Yes.

Q. If the waterworks bonds are approved, will there be any extensions of service to people now being supplied from other sources?
A. (By Hall) We are considering adding some homes along State Highway 36. This would be up to the council as a whole.

Q. If the \$114,000 is approved for waterworks improvement, who will have charge of purchases, negotiating contracts and selection of equipment?
A. Mayor Ted Souder referred this question to Collins, who said, his firm would prepare specifications and bid submittal forms as well as make recommendations, however, negotiations and final selection of successful bidders would be a function of the Cross Plains City Council.

Q. Do you have any idea how many local people might be employed on the waterworks project if it is undertaken?
A. (By Collins) My estimate would be a maximum of 10.

Swimming Pool
Q. Where did the \$22,000 figure come from as an estimate of the proposed swimming pool?
A. (By Mayor Souder) Gerald Bowden secured estimates from a firm in Dallas and supplied us with the data. A 30 by 60 foot

swimming pool was priced in the range of \$16,000 to \$22,000 and a 30 by 70 foot pool in the range of \$18,000 to \$24,000, depending upon lot costs and other local factors.

Q. How would the pool be operated?
A. (By Souder) The city would lease it to a reputable operator, retaining jurisdiction for protection of the interests of the municipality.

Gas Questions
Q. The \$14,000 being asked for improvements to the gas system, is it for replacement of lines only?
A. (By Gas Commissioner Roy Cox) Yes. We are suffering expensive leakage and it is only good business to replace the damaged pipe.

Q. How did you arrive at the figure \$14,000 as being the amount of money needed?
A. (By Cox) This is an estimate. No one could accurately predict the exact amount of money.

Q. What is the outlook for gas rates in the future? If this election carries will gas rates go up, come down, or remain the same as now?
A. (By Cox) There will be no cause for change. I'd say they will remain unchanged.

Questions regarding the city's financial condition were answered by C. N. Burt of Dallas,

well-known Texas bond representative, who is working with the council in the present submittal. Burt, who has previously handled bond issues for the city, local school district, this commissioner's precinct and Callahan County, would negotiate bond sales for the municipality in the event proposals are favored by voters at the polls Feb. 15.

Q. What is the present indebtedness of the City of Cross Plains?
A. When bonds have been paid which the city has called in and for which funds are presently deposited in the local bank, the bonded debt will be only \$19,000. All other obligations of the city, such as the balance owed on a loader, maintainer, reservoir, etc. aggregate \$16,800.

Q. If evaluations remain at the present level what per cent of tax collections would be required to retire the general obligation bonds?
A. It would take about 60 per cent.

Q. What per cent of the revenue from water, gas and sewer systems would be required to pay off the revenue bonds?
A. A conservative estimate would be between 35 and 40 per cent of the net proceeds, perhaps even less.

Q. What rate of interest would the city pay on the bonds issues now being proposed?
A. I would estimate four per cent for the tax bonds and four and one-fourth per cent for the revenue issues.

Q. Last official audit of the City of Cross Plains showed fixed assets of the municipality to be worth \$221,174.84. This is for such properties as the waterworks, gas and sewer systems, City Hall and various types of machinery and equipment. In view of what the city owns, would you say the proposed new bond issues would be more than an average for towns of this size and type, less than average, or about normal?
A. I believe your debt would be less than the average owed by towns of the size and potential of Cross Plains.

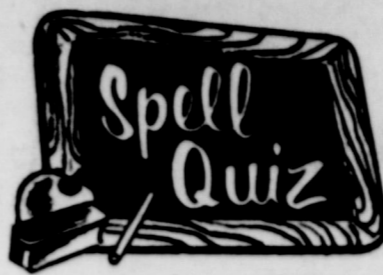
