T. R. Havins of Howard College, one of Texas' highly-regarded historians and who is a native of Cross Plains, was in town recently to visit his sister, Mrs. Williams.

While here, Dr. Havins covered the old section of town and recalled things of interest, some from his childhood and others gleaned from a half-century of historical research.

At the First Baptist Church stood here," he said in referring to the Merryman in the west part of town "it was just after turn of century."

His house was built and occupied by Pete Moore," he said in pointing to the present house presently owned by J. Pappy Cox.

The Live Oak thicket along banks of Turkey Creek—Cross Plains City Park—right this observation from prominent historian: was a favorite camping in frontier days and is mentioned often in old mill-records."

cial life for soldiers stationed on the Texas frontier years ago was pretty rugged. There being nothing else to do, they often had dances on Saturday night. The men would tie ribbons around their arms to designate them as "ladies" for evening and the dancing "quick and devilish."

Dr. Havins recently completed manuscript for a new book, "Rivers and Red Men," a locale of which is old Camp Colorado, once located in Jim Ned Creek, about 15 miles southwest of Cross Plains. A brief glance at the chapter was a foretaste of delightful reading, full of local history, accurately and colorfully told, will give Dr. Havins' newest work a feeling of joy.

Assessments Set On Political Candidates

Callahan County Democratic Executive Committee met in Baird Monday and set fees to be charged candidates for placing their names on the printed ballot.

Each office was assessed 10 per cent of its annual earnings with the sum to be divided by the various aspirants for the place.

Highest assessment for a county office went to County Attorney James Paul Shanks, who is unopposed for reelection. He was assessed \$675, based on an annual earning of \$6,750.

County Commissioner candidates of precinct one and three, of which there are two in each race, were assessed \$300 apiece, based on annual earnings of \$6,000.

The five candidates for sheriff were assessed \$120 each, that office also paying \$6,000.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell, who is unopposed, was assessed \$600.

Tood Cunningham, only candidate for constable of the Putnam precinct, was assessed \$108, based on an annual earning of \$1,080.

The District Attorney race was assessed \$750, with one half the amount payable in each of Callahan and Taylor Counties. A \$1,250 assessment for District Judge will likewise be paid 50 per cent in each of the two counties.

Candidates for Congress will pay \$2,250, with the sum equally divided between the 14 counties.

State Representative candidates are required to pay only a fee of \$5 in each of the counties which compose their district. That office pays an annual stipend of \$4,000.

County Democratic Chairman A. E. Dyer, Jr., said Monday night that candidates have until March 15 to pay filing fees and that drawing for places on the ballot will take place March 16.

300 May Vote On Bond Issue

Property-owning voters of the City of Cross Plains will ballot Saturday on proposals to issue \$150,000 in municipal bonds.

If approved, \$114,000 would be spent on waterworks improvements, \$22,000 would go for a public swimming pool and \$14,000 would be earmarked for

replacement of mains in the city-owned gas distributing system.

Polls Open at 8 a.m.

Mrs. W. F. Kilgore, who will serve as election judge, said the polls will open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. Voting will be in the City Hall.

Four propositions are to be voted on separately. Each will pass or fail independent of the outcome of any of the other proposals. A simple majority is required for carriage of each proposition.

Two of the propositions have to do with proposed waterworks improvements, Number one on the ballot provides for the issuance of \$39,000 worth of revenue bonds and number four on the ticket calls for \$75,000 worth of tax bonds.

The total \$114,000 would be used to develop a recently-tested water field on the W. T. McClure ranch, six miles north of town. Two wells recently drilled there by the city would be placed in production, a six inch line being laid to town. It is said that the water would flow by gravity, thereby eliminating pumping costs from the 20-odd wells now being used. Pumping expenses for the past year averaged \$158.83 monthly.

The present water field would not be abandoned says Mayor Ted Souder. "It would be held in readiness for use if some type of emergency suddenly developed."

Pool Is Controversial

The proposal to issue \$22,000 for construction of a municipal swimming pool is believed to be the most controversial proposition on Saturday's ticket. Proponents say "the children deserve it" and opponents argue "the city can't afford it." Should the pool win approval at the polls Saturday, businessmen, who recently endorsed the project, have asked that it be built in the downtown.

The \$14,000 for replacement of mains in the city gas system is said to be long overdue. City Gas Commissioner Roy Cox estimates that current line losses amount to more than \$100 monthly.

A bond issue for \$145,000 was voted on by citizens of this city five years ago this week — date was Feb. 17, 1959 — with 230 ballots being cast at that time. No tax bonds were proposed in that election, whereas half of Saturday's amount calls for tax bonds. Citizens rejected the proposals five years ago by a majority of approximately three to two.

300 May Vote

It is expected that approximately the same number will vote in Saturday's election as was tallied in 1959.

"I would not be surprised, however, to see the total rise to 300," said Mayor Souder.

Members of the City Council declared themselves in unanimous support of the water and gas proposals. Councilmen Ira Hall and L. F. Foster expressed opposition to the swimming pool two weeks ago, however, since that time Hall has signed a public statement in favor of the bonds all the way, including the swimming pool.

Mayor Souder told a meeting of businessmen recently that no increase in taxes would be required to retire the bonds.

"Our situation was studied by bond experts and the Texas Attorney General's Department and it was the opinion of both, as well as the consensus of our city council, that the obligation can be retired with present revenues."

The city's contract with W. T. McClure calls for payment of five cents per gallon for water for 20 years, then eight cents per gallon for the next eight years. A rider, attached and made a part of the agreement, gives the city an option to renew the agreement at the end of 28 years, with the payment for water at that time to be renegotiated.

Talk Of Lakes Due At Burkett Parley Today

First of two meetings called by supervisors of Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, to discuss building flood prevention dams on the upper Pecan Bayou, will be held at the Community Center in Burkett Thursday afternoon. Beginning time is 1:30.

Second of the two meetings will be at Clyde Feb. 17.

At the meeting in Burkett, J. B. McCord of Coleman will represent the CCSCD board of supervisors. Weldon Edwards will serve in the same capacity at the gathering in Clyde.

It is urged that land owners and interested individuals attend the meeting nearest them and become familiar with the tentative plans to build up

stream flood prevention dams on Pecan Bayou. Representative of the CCSCD board of supervisors at each meeting will be prepared to answer questions regarding information gained in preliminary surveys.

The Cross Plains youth won reserve championship of the boys division of the San Antonio show Saturday and then Monday his lamb claimed the same title in open competition, pitted against the finest of more than 2,000 entries.

Another Callahan County exhibitor, Miss Vicki Finley of Baird showed an Angus steer to the reserve championship of his class. The animal was the one which won grand championship of the Callahan County Show, held in Cross Plains last month.

Peanut Growers To Hold Short Course

An agricultural short-course for peanut farmers of Callahan, Brown and Eastland Counties will be held three nights next week in Rising Star with a seven-man team from Texas A & M University discussing various problems of the industry.

Classes will be held Monday, Tuesday and Thursday nights in the agriculture building—across the street from Rising Star High School—beginning each night at 7:30.

Problems to be discussed include: diseases in peanut crops, funguses, insect and weed controls, varieties of seed and advantages of each, irrigation production, farm management, harvesting and marketing.

"We are most anxious to have interested persons come in and look over our mixing and grinding facilities; in fact, the entire plant," said Deel Edington, local manager, yesterday.

Here to aid the local staff in hosting Saturday's visitors will be A. G. Black, general manager of the co-ops at Cross Plains, Baird and Clyde, who was the leading force in organization of the co-op at Baird in the beginning and who was directly responsible for installations being opened later at both Cross Plains and Clyde.

In addition to Edington other members of the Cross Plains plant's personnel are: Damon D. Jones, Mrs. Mike McClure, Lester Barr, Bart Thomas, Dave Shields, Oren Barr and E. L. Cowan.

Since purchasing the Gary Mill & Elevator Company here last November, directors of the co-op have approved vast improvements to the Cross Plains facility, including the installation of new scales, capable of weighing loads 50 feet long and up to 100,000 pounds. New grinding and mixing equipment has been added, new auguring equipment was recently installed at two of the firm's elevators and more storage has been added.

Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. is designated handler for drought feeds and is presently accommodating livestockmen from Brown, Coleman and Eastland Counties as well as Callahan. The concern

is dealer for Purina livestock feeds and has stocked a complete line of chows and health aids.

Livestockmen with special feeding problems are invited to

contact the co-op in Cross Plains for scientific advice. "We will arrange for a specially-trained Purina representative to tackle the individual problem," Edington said.

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Crime Presents Menace To National Security

At the recent Attorney General's Law Enforcement Conference in Austin, Sheriff Rufe Jordan of Pampa reminded us that America has a habit of winning when engaged in a conflict. This winning is a comfortable thing, but comfort has a way of dulling our sensitivity to danger, or at least to the direction from which danger may come. History teaches us that great civilizations have not fallen from the onslaught of outside forces, but have been destroyed by forces from within. We keep telling ourselves that this cannot happen in America because we are aware of the dangers of communism. We know that there is a cold war being waged, and because of this awareness, it cannot happen here.

I believe that we have lost sight of a danger within which can have a dual impact on our national life. Not only does crime take its toll in lives and money, but also, it has a relationship to the communistic threat.

During the past few weeks we have become increasingly aware of the need to weigh the political implications of economic problems. This has been impressed on us as we have struggled with the proposal to sell wheat to Russia. We have been reminded that there are political as well as economic questions to be answered. Perhaps we should take a clue from this situation and recognize that the problem of crime in America has international political overtones.

Every problem we face in America must be examined in relation to the over-all important struggle with Russia. This cold war is in reality a war of attrition. We must conserve every resource. We cannot afford waste, and crime is waste.

We have been throwing our resources down the rat hole of crime for too many years. Perhaps one reason we have done so little about this problem is because we do not recognize the extent of the waste nor the scope of the threat to our national life. Or, if we periodically permit ourselves to be jarred into some recognition of the problem through news reports and the activities of some special investigating committee, we still face the problem of maintaining a sustained public interest, an interest which we will follow through to make sure that the results of special studies have an opportunity to bear fruit.

The Cost of Crime

When we ask, "What is the cost of crime?" the answer is so nebulous we refuse to give it our serious thought. It is true that it is almost impossible to get an exact figure reflecting the cost of crime. For many years we have used figures that were reported as long as 10 or 15 years ago. We have never really bothered to try to update them, even though there has been an increase in crime and also a change in the value of the dollar. These estimates of annual cost have ranged upward from \$20 billion. But whatever the figure is it does not adequately tell the story. Who can count the economic loss when a young man dies in an armed robbery? Or who can add up the staggering cost which must be added to reflect the toll of injury and death, wasted lives, the suffering of victims and their families, as well as the anguish endured by the families of the criminals? This human waste and agony is by far the largest part of the price we pay for permitting crime to flourish.

An example of human waste is to be found in the life of H. C. S.—born in 1906. In 1919, at the age of 13, H. C. S. went to the Kansas State Reform School. He escaped four times, returning after the first three escapes; but on the fourth, he came to Texas, where he was subsequently arrested in connection with a burglary and was committed to the State School at Gatesville. He escaped, was returned and paroled. Later he received another conviction and went to the Texas State Penitentiary at Huntsville. He served sentences for conviction in Texas, Kansas and Arkansas, was re-

leased in September of 1952, again arrested in February of 1953 and convicted of 12 indictments for burglary, and was returned to the Texas Penitentiary where he has remained in custody since that time. From 1919 to 1963, a period of 44 years, this man has lived a combined total of not more than five years outside of some penal institution. In his life of 57 years, nearly 40 years have been spent behind bars.

But let us take a brief look at the latest figures available on crime in our country as reported by the Federal Bureau of Investigation. This report shows that serious crime in this country was seven percent greater in volume during the first three months of this year than in the same period last year. This was attributed to the continued upswing in crimes against property, with theft showing a 12 percent increase, auto theft up nine percent, and burglary up six percent.

To bring the crime picture a little closer to home so that we might see where we are at this time, the Department of Public Safety's analysis of this crime report indicates that on the basis of combined reports of 12 Texas cities crime is up in our state more than 12 percent for the first quarter, as compared to the seven percent increase indicated nationally. For the first six months of 1963, murder and homicide (statewide) increased 13.3 percent over the same period for 1962. Rape reflected an increase of 27.5 percent; robbery, 14.8 percent.

The crime picture becomes more meaningful when we note that during each day of the first six months of 1963 three murders and four rapes were committed in Texas. During this same period, the daily count of crime in Texas included 90 robberies, 161 burglaries, 363 aggravated assaults, 3,763 thefts, and 44 automobile thefts. It must have been a tabulation similar to this which motivated Thomas Wolfe in "Of Time and the River" to describe America as . . . "the place of violence and sudden death; of the fast shots in the night; the club of the Irish cop, and the smell of brains and blood upon the pavement; it is the place of the small town killings and the men who shoot the lovers of their wives . . . it is the place of ugly drunks and the snarling voices and foul-mouthed men who want to fight; it is the place of the loud word and the foolish boast and the violent threat; it is also the place of the deadly little men with white faces and eyes of reptiles, and who kill quickly and casually in the dark; it is the lawless land that feeds on murder."

But let us approach the crime picture from another angle. Let us note the number of people who have been fingerprinted in connection with some violation of the law. During the years the Department of Public Safety has been in existence, the fingerprints of some 1,215,934 persons have been placed on file. Of course, all of these were not arrested in Texas, as some fingerprint cards represent wanted notices placed on file with us from other states. However, if we compare the population of the state with the number of individuals who have been fingerprinted for some violation in Texas, we will still find that an alarming percentage of the population has been handled in connection with some violation of the law or conflict with society.

The fingerprint arrest tabulation for the period November, 1962 through April, 1963 again indicates that our young people are accounting for too great a portion of the crime increase. Sharp increases are shown in these figures for the age group 18 through 21. However, arrests are also on the upswing in the age group 25 through 28. In this regard, further trouble may be in the wind if the recent prediction by the United States Secretary of Labor materializes. He was quoted as saying there will be a growing "slag heap of human beings, most of whom started as school dropouts," unless more jobs are found for teenagers. I think we are safe in saying there is a crime problem in the United States and in Texas. I think we can also say that the prob-

lem is made even more acute because crime is draining the vitality of this state and nation when every effort should be bent toward halting the aggression of communism.

The first question you ask is, "What do we do?" "Where do we start?" The answer, unfortunately, is not easy. The prevention of crime is a long, slow, often doubtful process. The problem of crime must be attacked from many sides. For this reason it is difficult to keep public interest aroused sufficiently to sustain a day-by-day, year-round effort to stamp out lawlessness. But if we are to make any headway we must know something about the causes of crime. This is a study that has occupied many talented minds, and when we note the complexity of the task, we see why crime prevention is a difficult problem.

The Fight Against Crime

There are some things we can do to help reduce the toll of crime even though we may not be able to find a completely satisfactory answer to the cause of crime. For one thing, we can encourage and support the usually accepted institutions that help to build the moral fiber of our country—the church, the school, and the family as a living cooperative unit. Good schools contribute immeasurably to a foundation for rich and orderly living. The moral fiber of our national community draws its guidance and strength from the witness of the church.

Then there are some conditions directly related to law and the administration of justice which deserve attention if we are to root out crime. Over the years many laws, good and bad, are enacted. In some instances, well-meaning reforms work to the detriment of good law enforcement and result in a further increase in criminal activity. Some are petty; others are needless. Petty laws often throw an extra burden on the police, which hamper them in performing their really important functions. Antiquated and needless laws are often broken by citizens whose intentions are innocent; and when the public, generally, has no regard for the law, general respect for law deteriorates and the impact is felt in other and more serious ways.

In other instances fear of the abuse of privilege may encourage the enactment of statutes which are probably not needed. This is particularly true when the fear is fostered by infrequent and isolated incidents causing undue or premature alarm for revision in statutes. These may result in rules and procedures which further hamper the effective enforcement of the law. The net result is the continued increase in crime.

The problem of respect for law is particularly acute in America today. Through the years the prevailing philosophy in America has been that two wrongs do not make a right. The end, no matter how good, does not justify the use of bad means. More recently, it appears that there is a concept at work which promotes the use of any method or means, even if unlawful, if the desired end is legal and moral. This disposition has never been the concept of good jurisprudence in America and can only result in a further deterioration of respect for this nation, which claims to live under a government of law. We have yet to reap the full impact of this philosophy, but already we can see the contribution it is making to the surging increase in criminal activity in our state and nation.

For the most part, I think we agree that progress and betterment of the community in most instances will tend to reduce the amount of crime. Progress and the betterment of the community depend upon a better understanding of the concepts of law enforcement, of the activities of the police, and the meaning of true liberty under a government of law.

Many people are unfamiliar with the role of law enforcement in a democratic society. Many have no basic understanding of the goals of law enforcement. Some communities expect their police to provide quick and absolute answers to all problems that are related to crime

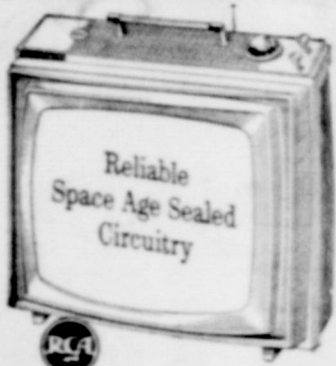

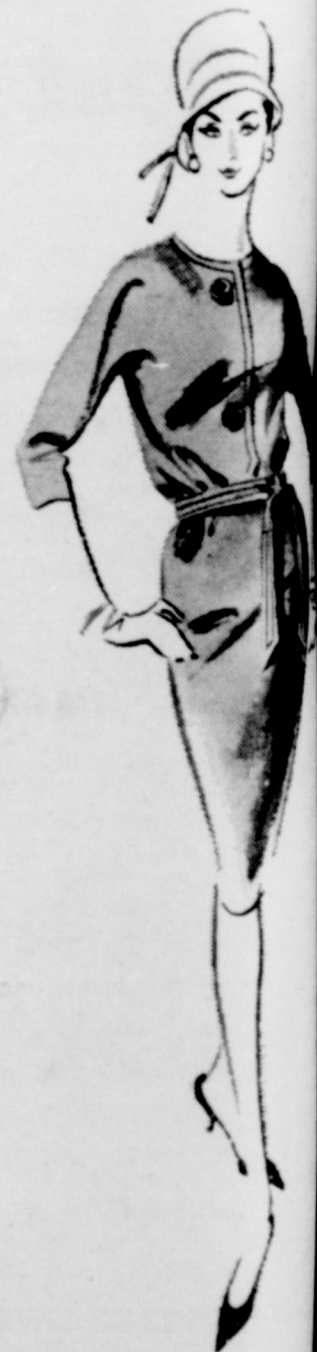

January 26, 1934: A check with produce dealers revealed that the following prices were prevailing Thursday.

Spring Chickens, lb. 12½c; Heavy Hens, lb. 7c; Light Hens, lb. 5c; No. 1 Turkeys, lb. 9c; No. 2 Turkeys, lb. 5c; Cow Hides, lb. 4c; Butterfat, lb. 13c and Eggs, dozen 15 cents.

January 25, 1935: R. Blaine Jordan, of Cross Plains was recently awarded one of 50 prizes in a nationwide contest sponsored by a Kansas publication. The object of the prize offer was to secure a good name for a radio. Mr. Jordan submitted the name "dual-tone."

January 31, 1936: Miss Louise Placke, younger daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Placke, and Gilbert Williams, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Williams, of Amerada, were united in marriage Wednesday night, January 22. The ceremony was performed by Minister J. P. Saylor, presiding elder of the Church of Christ in Burkett.

February 12, 1937: Cross Plains high school boys and Eula girls grabbed honors in the Callahan County basketball tournament held here Friday and Saturday. Baird boys and Cottonwood girls were runners-up.

February 11, 1938: R. E. Wilson has just completed the remodeling of his cafe on South Main Street. Fixtures have been re-arranged to give more room and make table service less difficult. New covering has been placed on the floor of the restaurant.

February 13, 1939: Interest is running high here concerning a double header basketball contest to be played in the local gymnasium Monday night, February 13, between Cross Plains and Burkett. Both boys and girls teams are to participate.

Dope favors Burkett boys and Cross Plains girls. One of the largest crowds of the year is expected.

February 16, 1940: Wes Strackbine and Merlin Garrett who live two miles south of Cross Plains and about a quarter of a mile apart, have installed a telephone system in their homes. They obtained two old boxes that had been discarded and at the small cost of \$1.85 for batteries and wire installed the system. "Although it does not give us service into town it is a fine convenience in our homes, and we invite other neighbors

in our community to join us," stated Garrett.

February 14, 1941: Selectees from Cross Plains who will enter training in the U.S. military service during February were among the group of draftees entertained by the Callahan County American Legion Monday night. They were H. R. Lacy, Doke Pierce, and Eugene Flowers.

February 13, 1942: Linden Newton, Cross Cut school principal, has been notified by the selective service commission to report for military service.

February 12, 1953: The students in Cross Plains schools are solidly behind their country in the present fight for freedom when a check up revealed that the 503 pupils enrolled own a total of \$3,270.15 worth of defense bonds and stamps.

February 11, 1944: More poll tax receipts were issued in Callahan County this year than at any time in the past five years, according to figures released from the office of Mrs. T. W. Briscoe. 2,896 people in Callahan County secured poll tax receipts and earned the right to vote in 1944 elections.

February 16, 1945: Sgt. and Mrs. Bill Upton announce the birth of a son on January 16th. The baby weighed seven pounds and has been named Van William.

February 15, 1946: During the Victory Clothing Drive which ended February 10, Cross Plains donated 3,002 pieces of clothing weighing 1,650 pounds according to A. J. McQuin, committeeman.

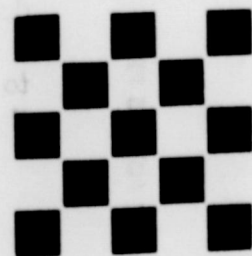


