The Rev. Charley Myrick Cottonwood reads as impressive a wedding ceremony can be heard anywhere. He speaks the lines with clarity and great dignity.

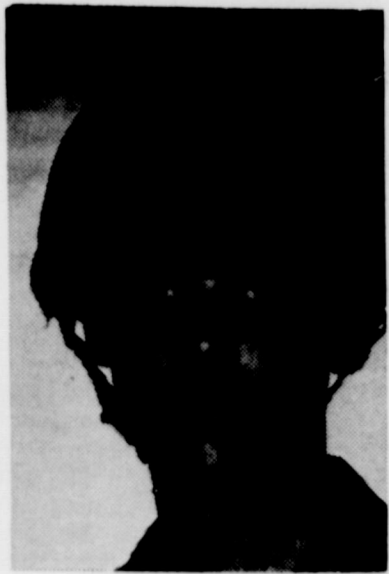
"I'll officiate free, or for a fee, but admits that a \$5 guarantee brings out a few dollars."

City Utility Sales \$6,742 In Month

Utility sales by the City of Cross Plains vary little this year from the same months of 1963.

Total sales of water, gas and sewer service during the past 30 days aggregated \$6,742.55, as compared with \$6,808.70 for the identical period last year. Billings were from Jan. 15 to Feb. 15.

Gas sales for the month just ended amounted to \$1,463.60.

Gas purchased by the city for that period was \$2,421.32. During the same month in 1963 sales were \$4,385.50 and purchases were \$2,399.

Water sales for the 30-day period were \$1,516.95, as compared with \$1,678.20 for last year.

Sewer department billings were \$762, an increase of \$17 over the year before.

Gas Wholesaler To City Has New Well

W. B. Evans of Lubbock, who wholesales natural gas to the city-owned distributing system here, has closed a deal for a recently-completed shallow gas well, drilled by Richard Ames, on the B. H. and P. G. Freeland place, four miles north of Cross Plains.

The well produces from a 400 foot sand and is said to have a potential of one million cubic feet daily.

A second well will be drilled on the acreage soon.

Cause of the mishap is under investigation by General Dynamics Astronautics, by whom Hubbard had been employed as a welder since Dec. 16, 1963.

Farmers Warned; Rabies Spreading

The threat of rabies to live-
stock is reported on the increase
in this and adjoining counties.

Veterinarians and county
agents agree that wild animals
appear to be the chief carriers
and transmit the disease to do-
mestic animals. Skunks, rac-
coons, foxes and bats are listed
as most common carriers.

Untrained persons are cau-
tioned against any attempt to
examine an animal behaving in
a peculiar manner, or acting as
if it had an object lodged in its
mouth or throat. Such animals,
if rabid, can transmit the dis-
ease to humans by biting them.

The safest thing to do in these
conditions is to call a veterinar-
ian immediately. Rabies in its
early stages may resemble sev-
eral other livestock diseases.

With especially valuable cat-
tle and horses, owners may
wish to protect the animals by
having them vaccinated.

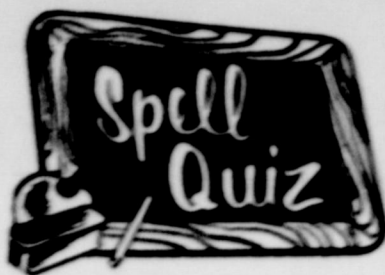


2 Local Exhibitors At Houston Show
