Gas Wholesaler To City Has New Well

W. B. Evans of Lubbock, who wholesales natural gas to the city-owned distributing system here, has closed a deal for a recently-completed shallow gas well, drilled by Richard Ames, on the B. H. and P. G. Freeland place, four miles north of Cross

The well produces from a 400 foot sand and is said to have a potential of one million cubic feet daily.

A second well will be drilled on the acreage soon.


FOUR LOCAL STUDENTS INVESTIGATE TARLETON


