Fire Insurance Rate Dips In Cross Plains

A new schedule of fire insurance discount and penalty rates, announced this week by the State Insurance Commission, will mean a small advantage to Cross Plains.

Fire policies within the city of Cross Plains will be subject to a five per cent discount.

A person paying \$100 annually for fire insurance will henceforth receive the same protection for \$95.

Electric Rate - Cut Due This Summer

Savings resulting from the reduction in Federal income taxes will be passed on to West Texas Utilities customers according to plans for system-wide rate re-

ductions announced Monday. These reductions in rates will save customers about \$1 million annually, approximately 2.8% at this time. Savings will be even

greater as electric sales grow.

Bill Button, WTU local manager announced that the company plans to pass on the full benefits of the tax reduction which it will receive under the new law. Under the new law the income tax on corporations will be reduced in two steps of 2% each. The corporate income tax will go from 52% to 50% in 1964 and from 50% to 48% in 1965.

"We are giving customers the benefit of both the tax reduction already established for 1964 and the tax reduction scheduled for 1965," Cal Young, WTU president said. "Passing this tax saving on to customers in the form of rate reductions will simply leave the company with the same rate of return it has been earning."

"Such system-wide rate reductions require extensive study," Young continued. "In addition, after the new rates are designed, considerable work will have to be done to adjust our IBM computer billing procedures to these new rates." Young added, "We expect to have the new rates in effect by mid-summer . . . probably July or August. Prior to the time the rates are placed in effect, they must be approved by each incorporated city."

"WTU has a unique record for any industry . . . one of which we are very proud," Young pointed out. "WTU has never raised a rate. Through the years we have consistently reduced the cost of service as plant efficiency and improved operations, together with increased customer usage permitted. This planned rate reduction is a continuation of that long-established policy."

WTU supplies electric service for Cross Plains and 165 other West Texas towns and communities in 50 counties extending from the Red River to the Rio Grande.

Long Lines May Await Local Vehicle Owners

There may be long lines awaiting local automobile owners.

Registration of vehicles is said to be moving at only half speed in Cross Plains. Deadline for displaying 1964 license tags is April 1.

Safety inspections, for which the final date is April 15, is progressing a bit more rapidly. No more than one-third of the area vehicles, however, are believed to presently have the necessary windshield certificate.

A. J. (Ted) McCuin, deputy assistant tax assessor-collector, who handles the sale of license tags here said late Tuesday that his office had registered 135 passenger cars, 27 pick-ups and 24 farm trucks.

"To the same date last year we had registered about twice this number," he said.

For safety inspection of vehicles, Cross Plains has two stations. One is at Johnston Truck & Supply and the other is Cross Plains Motor Company.

Both places predicted Tuesday that unless there is a quickening of the inspection pace, there will be long waiting lines near the middle of April.

Saturday Deadline For Council Filing

Saturday is the final day in which candidates may file for any of three city council posts in time to have their names on the printed ballot. Texas law requires that aspirants file 30 days before election.

Aldermen Ira Hall and Roy Cox are unopposed for reelection. For mayor, though, Ted Souder, incumbent, is being contested by Dr. M. E. Roth. Both mayor and aldermen are chosen for two-year terms.

Hold-over members of the City Council are: Freddy Tatom, Darwin Anderson and L. F. Foster. Date of the city election is April 7.

Frank Spencer Nominated For Coleman Production Director

Frank Spencer, prominent Cross Plains area farmer-stockman, is one of four men nominated for two places on the board of directors for Coleman Production Credit Association.

He will oppose G. W. Jenkins of Melvin, the incumbent, for a three year term. Candidates for the other place on the di-

rectorate are S. P. Horne and Truett Hipscher, both of Coleman.

Third section of a series of four annual meetings of Coleman Production Credit Association will be held in the Coca-Cola Auditorium at Abilene Thursday, March 12, at 7:15 p.m. Final meeting of the series will be at Coleman March 17.

Cross Plains Volunteer Fire Department received two alarms almost simultaneously shortly after eight o'clock Tuesday night. One came from near Adams Crossing, north of Burkett, where a grass fire was raging. The other was from the Jess Flippin place between here and Pioneer.

At the Flippin home firemen fought to prevent a grass fire from spreading to the house and nearby outbuildings. A high

wind, which shifted from the south to the north, complicated curtailment.

The problem near Adams Crossing was similar. Heart of a grass fire appeared to be on the Mack Holdridge place. 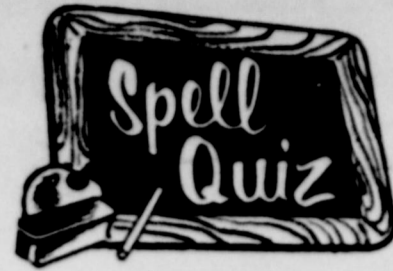
