## Permit Granted For Deep Oil Try On Sam Plowman

Permit has been granted for the deepest oil test to be drilled in the Cross Plains area this year.

The venture will be Eugene Goltz of Abilene No. 1 Sam Plowman, nine miles west of here. Permit depth is for 4,200 feet to test the Ellenburger limestone. Rotary tools will be utilized.

The drillsite is spotted 2,673 feet from north and 1,559 feet from east lines of Victoria CSL Survey 202. It is 467 feet from north and east lines of an 80-acre lease.

## Terry Watkins To Take M.A. Degree

Terry Watkins, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Watkins and a former teacher in Cross Plains High School, will take his Master of Arts degree from Illinois Institute of Technology in Chicago the last of this month.

The advanced degree, from one of the nation's top technological institutions of higher learning, is being earned in mathematics.

Beginning in September Watkins will become a member of the faculty at West Texas State College in Canyon, from which institution he took his Bachelor of Science degree in 1961. He will be a professor of math. Instructors at West Texas State are required to have a minimum of 30 hours graduate work beyond the M. A. level.

Watkins, who has been recipient of numerous scholarships and grants during his college and graduate work, was at the Chicago institute on an academic year, financed by the National Science Foundation. He will enroll at the University of Texas this Summer on a fellowship, to do work toward his PhD.

## Pistol Taken From Pond In Eula Area

Dyess Air Force Base authorities and Callahan County officers collaborated Tuesday in recovery of a military-type weapon from a pond near Eula. The weapon is reported to have been a .22 caliber pistol, the kind which is a part of military survival kits.

Additional details were not available early Wednesday morning.

Officers are continuing investigations for possible leads in connection with the murder of Johnny Charles Maner, 23-year-old service station attendant, who was murdered at the station where he worked at the intersection of State Highway 36 and 283, four miles west of Rowden, in the early morning hours of March 25.

Sheriff Homer Price, when contacted by the Review shortly before midnight Tuesday said he knew hardly anything about recovery of the weapon from the pond.

"I was not out there," he said.

## Mayor And Council In Bonds Deadlock

A controversy has arisen in the city government regarding issuance of \$53,000 worth of revenue bonds, voted in a municipal election Feb. 15.

C. N. Burt of Dallas, who has been representing the city in the bond preparation, met with the council Tuesday night of last week, preparatory to issuance of the securities.

Dr. M. E. Roth, newly-elected mayor, refused to sign the bonds, explaining he felt some of the proposed expenditures are unnecessary.

Four councilmen — Roy Cox, Ira H. Hall, Freddy Tatom and Darwin Anderson — sought consumation of the bond transaction. Concensus of the four was that \$14,000 voted for laying of new lines in the gas distributing system, required immediate issuance in order that work could be completed during Summer months.

The \$39,000 voted for extensions to the water system, they argued, would be available for possible enlargement of the present water supply. L. F. Foster, only other member of the council, was not present at the meeting. He was confined to bed at his home with a case of mumps.

A difference of opinion also arose between the mayor and councilmen as to whether or not the city should keep a loader now in use here. The equipment, reported to cost \$4,000, is now being utilized by the municipality, which has the option to pay lease for the time used or to keep the machine and apply the amount of lease on purchase.

If returned June 1, the city would pay \$1,200 for lease and owe nothing more on the machinery. If bought, the \$1,200 would be applied on the purchase price, the remainder to be paid with six per cent interest bearing note.

In explaining his opposition to purchase of the loader, Roth said that he had been advised by a former county commissioner that county-owned equipment had been made available to the city on an actual expense basis. He pointed out that the present commissioner had assured him the same arrangement is possible.

Decision to acquire the loader was made upon motion by Darwin Anderson, seconded by L. F. Foster, passed at a meeting of the Council Jan. 21, 1964. A secret ballot was taken with three aldermen voting for and two against. All members of the city council were present at the meeting, according to minutes of the proceedings on file at the City Hall.

Callahan Republicans held their county convention at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Garrett, two miles south of town, Saturday night.

Five resolutions were passed. They were: (1) Opposition to the Democrat administration's policy on beef and oil imports, (2) Binding delegates to the state convention to support Senator Barry Goldwater for president, (3) Opposition to Medicare legislation proposed by President Lyndon B. Johnson, (4) Called for ending all expenditures on foreign aid programs paid out of federal tax funds, and (5) Advocated return to the full principles of the Monroe Doctrine and its complete enforcement.

The resolution on foreign aid was warmly debated. Some wanted to limit the resolution to read "no foreign aid to Communist countries." Others argued foreign aid brought Castro to power in Cuba and that the United States is presently giving aid to England and France, who in turn are helping Cuba. An attempt to leave some foreign aid in the form of "standard of living" reforms, such as factories for consumer goods, was discussed. It was pointed out, though, that the U. S. has in many cases built state-owned factories instead of establishing privately-owned enterprises, and no vote was ultimately taken.

Callahan County delegates to the state G.O.P. convention were named as follows: Jack Tunnell of Cross Plains, Dr. J. E. Mikeska of Clyde and Paul Washburn of Baird. Chosen alternates were: Harold Garrett of Cross Plains, Mrs. Max Judy of Clyde, Mrs. C. C. Holden of Denton Valley, Mrs. Burl McCowen of Cross Plains and Bryce Jones of Baird.

Delegates were uninstruced except on the Goldwater issue.

## Harold Garrett To Represent Church

Harold Garrett of Cross Plains, well-known layman, will be one of two commissioners to represent Brazos Presbytery, which comprises an area from Abilene on the west to Fort Worth on the east, at General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in Oklahoma City from May 20 to May 27.

The other delegate, a member of the clergy, is the Rev. Jerry Boles of Stamford.

## WOW LODGE PLANNING BUILDING IMPROVEMENT

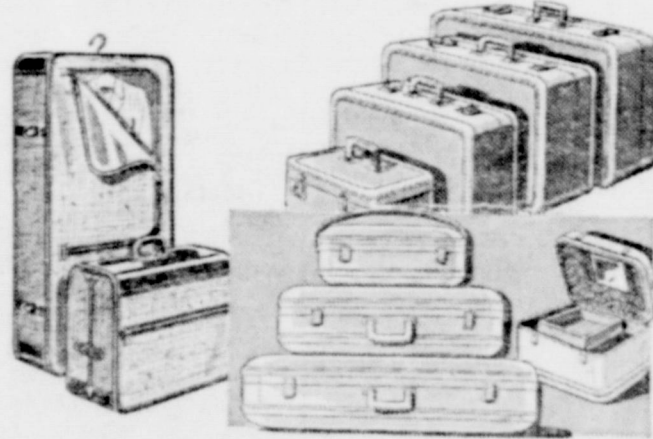

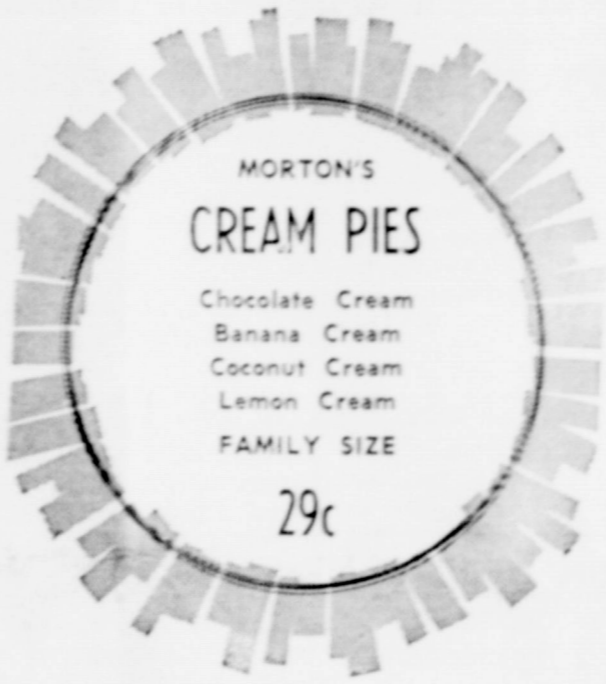

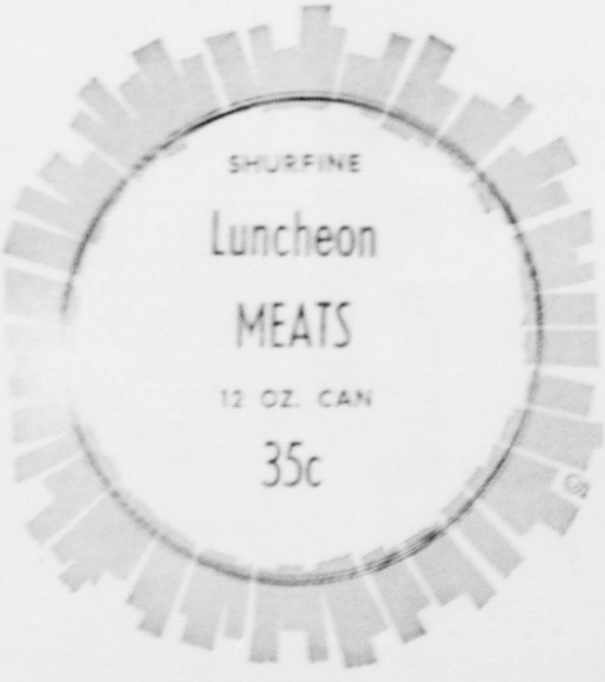

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# Stumbling Horse Once Saved Renegade Indian In Fight Near West Caddo Peak

The matter of life or death often turns on an insignificant circumstance. Big foot, the notorious Kiowa Indian renegade, were he alive today, could relate how he missed death by a gopher hole near Caddo Peak in Callahan County in the summer of 1874.

Big Foot was a hated Indian. The whole frontier knew him or knew about him. For thirty years previous to 1874, he had roamed the western section of Texas, killing and stealing horses. He was marked for any white man's bullet. In the parlance of the time, "He needed killing."

Somehow, Big Foot seemed to bear a charmed life. On every occasion when he had come to grips with the whites, he had managed to escape without harm. Once near Georgetown, in Williamson County, he rode through a hail of Ranger bullets. Later, in Bell County, he shot it out with a posse of white men and rode away untouched. From Brown County he managed to keep a day ahead of angry settlers intent on his destruction, for the murder of Bill Williams' wife

and two children on Jim Ned Creek near Thrifty.

The federal government operated the Indian reservation at Fort Sill, Okla. The Indian agent there was a Quaker who refused to enforce harsh discipline on his Indian charges. This policy only served to encourage Big Foot to leave the reservation and to depredate in Texas.

So frequent were the raids of the Indians that a battalion of Texas Rangers took up stations across West Texas. Company E of the Rangers camped at the mouth of Mud Creek on the Jim Ned in the early summer of 1874.

Company E was under the command of Captain Jeff Maltby, who spent the declining years of his life at his home near Admiral in Callahan County. Andrew Mather, a Williamson County resident, was sergeant of the company.

Early in June, 1874, Captain Maltby ordered Sergeant Mather and 15 other Rangers to make a scout into Callahan County for possible contact with a band of roving Indians.

Mather and his men reached West Caddo Peak the first day and made their camp just south of the mountain. The sergeant

sent John Parsons out with orders to kill a deer or a yearling. Parsons left his horse, walking toward the mountain. He moved to the foot of the peak on the west side and stopped in a trail to listen for possible movement of a deer. Almost instantly he heard the thud of horses' feet.

Drawing back a little from the trail, he was partly hidden in the brush. Intently he watched ahead for the approach of the riders. He did not have long to wait. Rounding a clump of bushes less than a hundred feet away from the Ranger came the leader, followed by other Indians. Parsons recognized the leader as Big Foot, the hated Kiowa.

The ranger was aware that he was in a close place. If he made a movement, the Indians would note it. To run meant to get shot in the back. Help could not arrive in time to save him if he called to his companions. He determined to risk everything on one shot. He would kill Big Foot and suffer the consequences.

Leveling his gun, he took deliberate aim at the Indian's forehead. He pulled the trigger and the bullet from his rifle was on its way.

Parsons was a crack shot. He confidently expected Big Foot to pitch forward from his horse. But he received the surprise of his life when the Indian immediately behind Big Foot was the one to fall, a bullet between his eyes and blood covering his face.

Big foot and the other Indians kicked their ponies into the brush and Parsons made a run for the Ranger camp, calling for aid and informing his companions that Indians were near.

Mather and his men saddled their horses and tried to contact the Indians. They were unsuccessful and returned to camp after dark without having seen an Indian. Even the dead one had been carried away.

The next morning Parsons pointed out the position from which he had fired on Big Foot. Combing the ground closely, they found where Big Foot's horse had stepped into a gopher hole. They concluded that the bullet from Parsons' gun had missed its mark for the reason that Big Foot's head was lowered enough as his horse stepped into the hole, for the bullet to miss him and strike the Indian immediately behind.
