City Council Votes Tuesday To Issue Water, Gas Bonds

Cross Plains City Council meeting in regular session Tuesday night passed a resolution to issue \$53,000 worth of revenue bonds, recently voted for improvements to the water and gasworks.

Mayor M. E. Roth was not present at Tuesday night's session, having telephoned from Abilene that he would be unable to attend. In his absence, Mayor Pro-Tem L. F. Foster presided.

The motion, unanimously passed, called for issuance of

the bonds but for them to be sold only as needed.

In addition to Foster, councilmen present Tuesday night were: Ira Hall, Roy Cox, Freddy Tatom and Darwin Anderson.

The city's attorney, Gaston Swofford of Clyde, attended Tuesday night and advised the group that the mayor pro-tem could sign the ordinance authorizing issuance of the bonds. The bonds themselves, however, are said to require the mayor's signature.

Hail Damage In Area \$100,000

A destructive hail, which ripped across a section of country about two miles wide, shortly after 10 o'clock Saturday night, did damage estimated at more than \$100,000. The area ravaged lays generally east of Pecan Bayou. The hail appeared to follow a southeasterly direction.

A. J. (Ted) McCuin, local insurance agent, reported that he had written only seven hail insurance policies on grain crops this year and four had suffered total losses.

Among losses reported were these:

Sterling Odom, one mile south of Rowden, lost 36 acres of wheat and 25 acres of oats. He also suffered damage to an early maize crop.

Tommie Harris, just east of Odom's place, suffered no damage there but 50 acres of oats which he had on his father's land, five miles farther southeast, were ruined.

Anthony Sikes sustained more than a 50 per cent damage to

his grain, just north of Odom. Jerry McDonald lost 35 acres of wheat.

Franzel Odom, Fred Cutbirth, and J. L. Bonner suffered total losses of their grain crops to the hail. Frank Spencer, who lives in the Burnt Branch area near them, had no damage on his home place but lost most of a crop he had on Leonard Baum land. Lewis Fortune lost an entire crop.

To the east Hadden and Glen Payne experienced extensive damage. On to the south Deel Edington lost 35 acres of wheat and 35 acres of oats. Ed McCannally likewise lost virtually all of his grain crop.

At Dressy, Morris Odom had 50 acres of wheat demolished. Toward Burkett, Roger Watson is said to have lost 57 acres of wheat. Jack DeBusk 78 acres of wheat. Joe Hanke, Sr. and Joe Hanke, Jr. complete losses of wheat and oat crops and sufficient damage to cotton that the crop will have to be replanted. Bill Edington reported his grain crop a total loss.

DRIEST MAY FOR 53 YEARS PASSES HERE

Only .30 of an inch of rain fell here last month. "It was the second driest month of May in my recollection," said S. F. Bond, local weather observer.

May 1911 was drier, he reported. No moisture fell during the month 53 years ago.

Total rainfall received in Cross Plains during the first five months of the present year has been nine inches, well below what observers say is the normal.

17,905 Bushels Of Wheat Bought Here

To Tuesday morning 1,074,330 pounds of new crop wheat and 117,760 pounds of oats had been bought by Callahan County Farmers Cooperative, Inc. in Cross Plains.

Wheat purchases approximated 17,905 bushels and the oats 3,680.

The Co-Op has paid \$26,735 for wheat alone since buying began May 21.

Monday was the most active day of the harvest season with 337,160 pounds of wheat being sold here.

Harvesting is expected to continue through another 10 days.

Both Parties Slate Elections Saturday

Although short ballots confront both Democrats and Republicans in the run-off primary slated Saturday, election officials are laying plans to accommodate a heavy turnout.

Polling time will be the same as that of May 2. It will

be from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m. All over Callahan County the polls will be located in the same quarters as were utilized before. In Cross Plains Democrats will ballot at the City Hall and Republicans at the study hall in the high school building.

One Local Race

One local race confronts Callahan County Democrats. It is that for sheriff, in which the incumbent, Homer Price, is opposed by Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr. Price, a write-in candidate in the first primary, received 567 votes to Long's 868 in the first primary. Only other race in which local Democrats will ballot Saturday is that for United States Representative at Large. Candidates are Joe Pool of Dallas County and Robert W. Baker of Harris County.

The Republican ballot to be used in this county will bear the names of George Bush and Jack Cox, both of Harris County, for United States Senator. The winner will oppose Senator Ralph Yarborough in the general election in November.

Results of Saturday's voting from both Democratic and Republican polling places will be tabulated and displayed on a bulletin board at the local newspaper office.

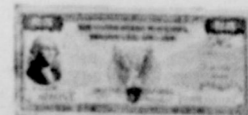

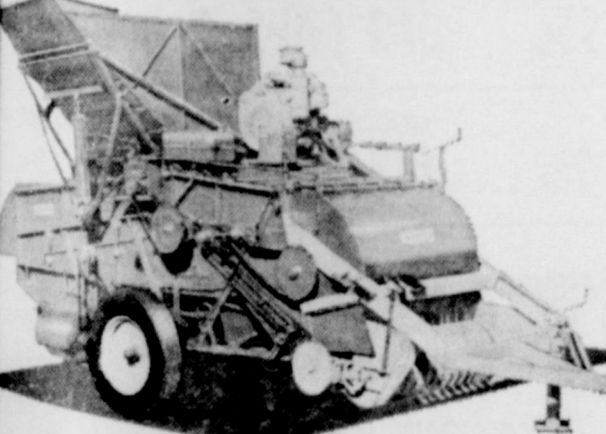

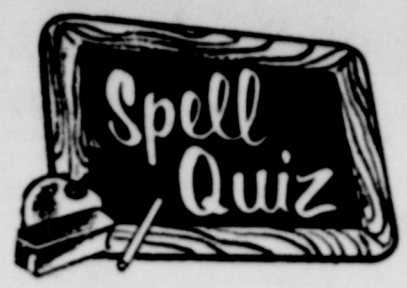
