Oil Strike On Cutbirth May Be Pool's Opener

A Cross Cut sand discovery, one which could stimulate local oil development, is indicated 10 miles west of Cross Plains.

The wildcat is John W. Barbee of Abilene No. 1 Fred Cutbirth, located in Bartola Garcia Survey 204.

Four and one-half inch casing was set to 2,261 feet, one foot off total depth.

Drillstem test was taken at 2,186 to 2,206 feet in the Cross Cut with the tool open one hour and 15 minutes. Gas surfaced in five minutes. The test recovered 910 feet of free oil, 180 feet of heavily oil-cut mud, and 30 feet of muddy water.

Initial shutin pressure in 30 minutes was 875 pounds; and final in 45 minutes, 825 pounds. Flowing pressure was 55 to 265 pounds.

Post Office Will Curtail Services

Limited adjustments in some postal services has been ordered from Washington beginning July 11. The curtailments are designed to save \$12,700,000 annually.

Service changes at the Cross Plains post office will include closing the money order window on Saturdays. Regular services will be handled at the stamp and parcel post window.

Postmaster Lloyd Bryan urges that patrons keep the change in mind and transact money order business during the week.

Money orders will continue to be accepted on rural routes as usual.

Pioneer Revival To Open Friday Night

Services begin Friday night in a 10-day revival meeting at the Pioneer Baptist Church for which the Rev. Fred Stover, Fox, Okla., pastor, will be evangelist.

The Rev. Dan Gaines, pastor of the Pioneer congregation, says that only night services are to be held with the exception of the two Sundays, when regular Sabbath schedules will be followed. Prayer services are to convene each evening at 7:30, followed by the preaching at eight o'clock.

Paul Blackstock, music director for the First Baptist Church of Bangs, will lead the singing and have charge of the revival choir.

Members of the Pioneer church are inviting persons of all faiths and those of no church affiliation at all to attend as many services as possible during the revival campaign.

Water Off All Nights

Cross Plains City Council voted unanimously Tuesday night to cut off water in the municipal system from seven o'clock each night until six in the morning.

The action was said to be necessary to conserve a minimum supply for emergency use in case of fire.

No restrictions were imposed on the use of water from six in the morning until the cut-off time at night. No rationing was placed on industrial users, such as laundries and service stations. Neither were householders forbidden to irrigate lawns and gardens.

"If the present action fails to work, we will have no alternative but to impose restraints on use at a later date," said Water Commissioner Ira H. Hall, speaking for the council as a whole.

Water consumption here hit 200,000 gallons daily last week.

Blackleg Found In Cattle Herds Here

Livestockmen in the Sabanno, Atwell and Nimrod areas have been vaccinating herds this week, following a reported outbreak of blackleg.

The disease was said to have

been first determined by a Baird veterinarian after four calves died at the Lewis Bralley place, two miles east of Sabanno. Later, Jim Hewes of Atwell took one animal to

Brownwood and a veterinarian there is said to have made the same diagnosis. One other Hewes animal also died from the same disease.

Blackleg is described as an infectious disease, usually fatal to young cattle. It is said to be occasionally prevalent in swine and sheep and is characterized by high fever and crackling swellings under the skin.

Local suppliers of veterinary medicines report sales of blackleg serum have been much in demand this week.

Most ranchers in this area customarily vaccinate all cattle in their pastures, the Review was repeatedly told in telephone contacts yesterday, however, many smaller herds have not received such safeguards.

Fred Butler recently lost four calves but he believes their death resulted from a toxic reaction after eating oak leaves. All were near a stock pond and had water.

Losses of the W. B. Holcomb farm are also of undetermined cause.

Blackstock losses from undetermined causes have also been recently reported by Oscar Shaefer of Sabanno and several residents of the Nimrod vicinity.

B. L. (Loron) Irvin, 59, who lived east of Sabanno, died Monday at 5:25 p.m. in a Ranger hospital where he had been a patient the past month. He was a retired farmer and lifelong resident of this area.

Funeral was to be held from Higginbotham Chapel in Cross Plains Wednesday at 2:30 p.m. Interment was to be in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbothams.

Mr. Irvin was born Nov. 5, 1904, north of Cross Plains. He married Alice Flowers March 3, 1936 in Coleman.

Survivors include: the widow; one daughter, Mrs. Gordon Underwood of Dallas; his mother, Mrs. W. B. Irvin of Fort Worth; three brothers, Briggs, W. B., Jr., both of Fort Worth, and Oris of Haskell; two sisters, Mrs. Ben Atwood of Cross Plains and Mrs. Bill Sheppard of Fort Worth.

Cattlemen Card Parley For Area

Callahan County livestockmen are being invited to attend a meeting in Brownwood Monday, sponsored by the Farm Bureau, for the purpose of discussing problems confronting the cattle industry.

Hilton Tarrant, president of Callahan FB, advised that the meeting will be held at Chisholm's Restaurant, beginning at 10 a.m. and adjourning at 3 p.m.

Purpose of the meeting is to evaluate the current livestock situation and give producers an opportunity to air their views of possible solutions.

Turkeys Spilled As Truck Upsets

Two traffic mishaps were reported in the Cross Plains area over the long July 4 week end. Injuries were slight in both instances.

A 1946 Chevrolet, occupied by three persons, overturned on the Greenwood hill between here and Cross Cut late Friday. One person was taken to a Brownwood hospital but was released after first-aid treatment.

A truck, carrying 2,000 turkeys turned over three and one half miles southwest of Rising Star early Monday morning. The driver, Glen Ray Morris of Weatherford, Okla., escaped injury. Dead turkeys, however, littered the pavement. Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard estimated damage at \$3,000.

Grasshoppers Bad; Control Data Issued

With grasshoppers reported doing damage in all sections of the Cross Plains area, County Agent Pat C. Garner is supplying information as to how the pests may be best controlled.

"Best insecticides are dieldrin, aldrin, toxaphene and heptachlor," he says.

It is pointed out that there are restrictions on these chemicals when used in pastures where milk cows or animals being readied for slaughter are permitted to graze.

Garner estimated that six or seven grasshoppers per square yard over a 10-acre spread, consume as much vegetation as a cow.

FIRST-HALF DRY BUT IT HAS BEEN WORSE

First six months of 1964 did not make up the driest first half-year on record in Cross Plains. Twice in the past 15 years less rainfall has fallen here between Jan. 1 and June 30.

Total moisture measured in Cross Plains the first six months this year was 9.08 inches. Less was recorded during the same time in 1952, when only 8.21 inches fell. Then again in 1960, only 8.65 inches was the mid-year measurement.

Brief Freedom Brings Jail Breaker 4 Felony Counts

Jerry Wayne St. John, 18, who recently broke jail at Baird, is again being held there and now faces four more felony counts than when first arrested.

The youth was recently captured in Dallas County, 30 hours after having escaped the Baird lock-up.

Coleman County officers quizzed St. John after he was returned to Baird and said that he confessed to two burglaries in their town as well as thefts at Clyde and Bangs.

After breaking jail at Baird, the youth is said to have hitchhiked to Clyde, where he stole a car. He then went to Coleman, broke into a beauty salon and the home of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bowen. He is said to have abandoned the car stolen

at Clyde and hitchhiked to Bangs. There, officers said, he stole another car which was later abandoned in Dallas. Officers apprehended the fugitive at Mesquite at the home of his mother.

When interviewed by Coleman officers in Callahan County jail, St. John was wearing a pair of trousers stolen from Bowen. An abandoned pair, found near the Bowen home, is said to have fitted the prisoner perfectly.

St. John said that he spent one night in the grass and weeds behind a motel at Coleman. Drought-starved chiggers found him a perfect host and he was so severely covered with the insect bites that a physician was called to attend him at the Callahan jail.

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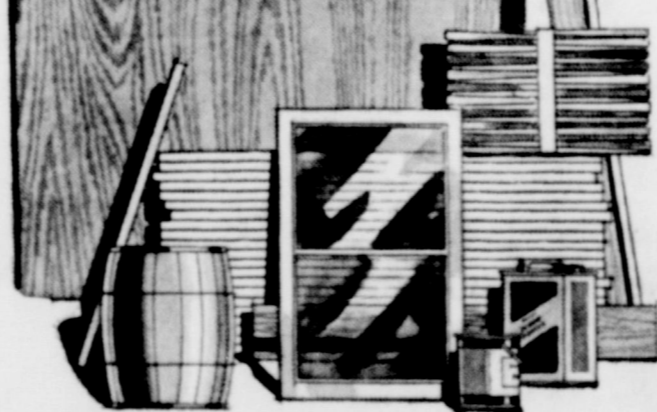


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Cisco Hands Chiefs Third Straight Loss

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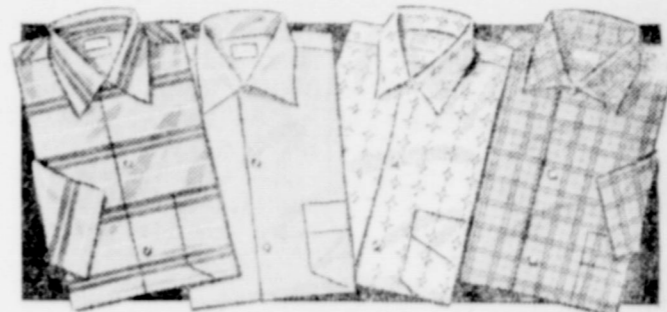
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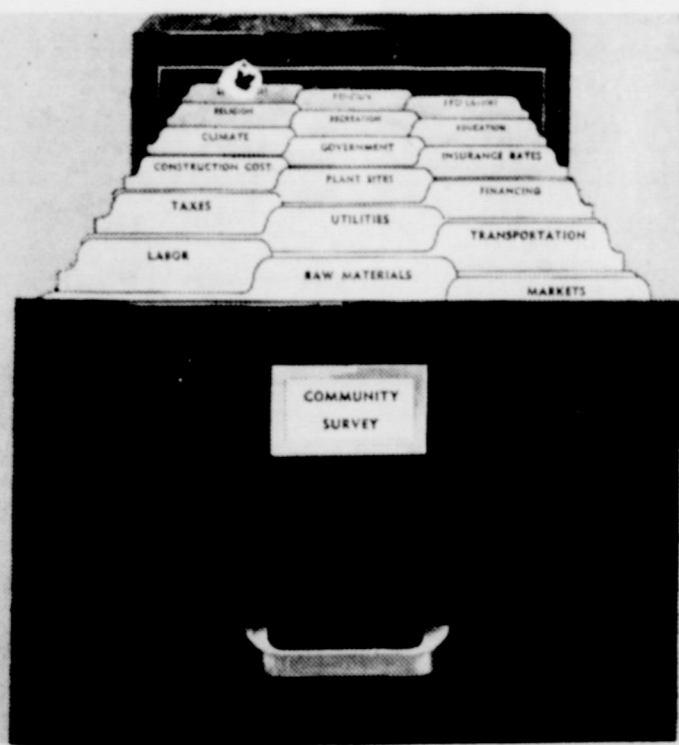

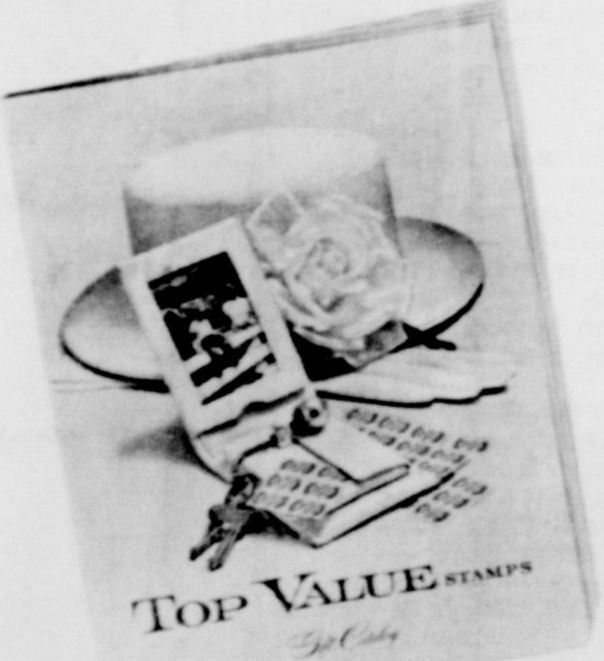
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
