Boundary Dispute Headed For Court

Settlement of boundary lines which Coleman County disputes with Taylor and Callahan Counties is headed for the courts, as a result of action taken by Coleman County Com-

missioners Court last week. The Coleman body approved a \$3,000 budget item to cover estimated cost of a suit and authorized retaining Hal Woodward, prominent attorney and

member of the Texas Highway Commission, as legal counsel.

Coleman County judge Frank Lewis has declared the case will be filed in a court outside judicial districts of the counties involved. Although nothing is yet definitely known as to where the trial will be docketed, it is expected here that a panel of three judges will be designated to hear the case.

County Attorney James Paul Shanks is representing Callahan County in the litigation.

Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson said Monday afternoon that members of this county's Commissioners Court had held two meetings with Coleman officials hoping to work out an amicable solution.

"We cannot, however, cede 1,456 acres which would not only affect Callahan County tax rolls and its outstanding bonds but would also involve other political subdivisions which are a part of this county," he said.

Richardson agreed with Lewis that it is important to get the dispute settled, however, he expressed regret that the matter should have to be adjudicated by the courts.

"I think members of both Callahan and Taylor County Commissioners Courts would have preferred a workable compromise," he declared.

Coleman County's position in court will be to seek legal ratification of its northern boundary as Coleman County presently recognizes it.

Judge Richardson was in Austin last week and conferred with officials at the state capitol regarding the overlapping boundaries. He points out that the Texas General Land Office will remain neutral but that the boundary line now being followed by that agency is the one which Callahan County presently uses that which is being disputed by Coleman officials.

The northwestern corner of Comanche County is said to be the nearest point which has been established by an act of the state legislature. A projection of that line westward currently serves as a boundary for counties all the way to the eastern edge of New Mexico.

The Callahan-Coleman overlap is said to vary from 850 feet down to about 400 feet along the 25-mile common boundary. Coleman County contends that the discrepancy exists even further westward along its mutual boundary with Taylor County. A small "no man's land" is also reportedly present between Callahan and Taylor Counties, however, no dispute has arisen between those two counties.

It is pointed out that presently some property owners along the disputed line are being levied on for taxes on the same land in two separate counties.

Following a meeting with the Coleman County Commissioners Court, Callahan County Commissioners, upon motion by Duke Mitchell, passed a resolution Jan. 13, of this year, expressing the belief that the proper boundary line between the two counties is that line surveyed by Callahan County in 1898, with the assistance of a surveyor from Coleman County, this line being the one that is presently used by the Texas State Land Office and the one which is acknowledged by Callahan County as being official and correct.

By accepting Coleman County's boundary line Callahan County would lose 1,456 acres. By accepting Callahan County's line, Coleman County would lose 726 acres.

Best Rain In 32 Years Gauges Near 8 Inches

Heaviest rains in 32 years blanketed the Cross Plains area last week end. S. F. Bond, official U. S. Weather Bureau observer gauged 7.88 inches.

A steady downpour began Saturday night and continued intermittently until Monday afternoon. It was the heaviest fall recorded in Cross Plains since 1932, when the then-new Brownwood Lake was filled in seven hours and much flood damage was sustained.

Last week end's rains, though, were not damaging. The fall was almost constant but never excessively hard. Streams in the area ran but none bankfull. Most moisture soaked into drought-parched soil as it fell. Many livestock ponds, though, were replenished. Week end rains brought the total received this year to 19.88 inches.

Buffaloes - Wildcats Renew Grid Rivalry Saturday Night

Saturday night at Rising Star the 32nd renewal of the Cross Plains Buffalo and Rising Star Wildcat grid rivalry will begin at 8 p.m.

The almost annual battle dates back to 1929, under interscholastic sanction with 31 games in the record books. Cross Plains holds the edge with 20 victories against 10 defeats and one tie. Buffaloes also own the longest consecutive winning streak with nine from 1950 through 1957 and 1960. Rising Star is currently duplicating its longest victory string with triumphs the past three years as well as 1947-1949.

The Saturday date was slated because of the high school's annual homecoming. It was originally scheduled for Friday.

Identical Records

Both elevens will carry the same record into Saturday's melee. Both are undefeated, but each has been tied.

Cross Plains battled Early to 0-0 deadlock and defeated Santa Anna 13-0, while Rising Star clipped Eastland 14-13 and fought to a scoreless draw with Rochelle.

Saturday's hosts were picked to win their conference, District 21-B, in pre-season polls. Only

four lettermen were lost off last year's 4-6 squad which dumped the Herd 14-0.

Experienced Squad

Seventeen lettermen returned to the Wildcats this season headed by Guard Fraizer Clark, who doubles as kicking specialist. Tackle James Cox and Quarterback Terry Geye, all 1963 All-District selections. Joining Geye in the backfield will be last year's big gun, Fullback Kenny Butler and Danny Wooley. Doug Fisher, Rex Long, Dwight Cater and Jimmy Rutherford, who doubles at end, Butler, a 180-junior, rolled up 70 yards rushing in last year's win over the Herd here.

Other linemen expected to see action are guards Garry Duggan and Davy Jones, tackles Bobby Burns and Russell Botts, who tips the scales at 260 ends Larry Duggan, Dick Golston and John Hutchinson, and center Mike Donham, a 230-pounder.

Cross Plains observed its annual open date last week end, and barring practice injuries should be in top shape for the annual affair. It was reported during the week that several Buffaloes might start at different positions Saturday than they customarily fill.

Sheep And Goat Expert Due Here Next Tuesday

Jim Gray, Texas Extension Service sheep and goat specialist, will lead a discussion at the City Hall in Cross Plains next Tuesday morning aimed at greater profits for local people engaged in that industry.

The meeting will begin at 10 o'clock and close at 12. Gray will speak on the feeding, breeding and selection of foundation herds. Pointers he will introduce are expected to aid wool and mohair producers in increasing annual clips by as

much as three and four pounds per head.

Callahan County Agent Pat C. Garner, who arranged for Gray's appearance here, said that a practical demonstration would be held on a nearby sheep farm during the afternoon.

"I feel that Mr. Gray can be of real help," Garner said, "and urge sheep and goat producers to plan to attend both the morning session and the afternoon demonstration."

150 Members Needed For Recreation Center

A campaign is being launched simultaneously in Cross Plains, Rising Star and surrounding areas to obtain a minimum of 150 members for a vast recreational center to be built at Lakewood Country Club.

The Farmers Home Administration, which has agreed to loan approximately \$70,000 to build the project, requires that at least 150 persons commit themselves to a \$5-per-month payment to assure financial solvency for the first year. After that the facility will be operated from the collection of fees only, assessed at the time of use.

Plans are now being drawn for construction of a clubhouse, swimming pool, rebuilt golf course, including a miniature layout, picnic areas, docks and piers for boating and fishing. An entire new water system is called for to adequately irrigate old greens and fairways.

Unless a sufficient number of members for the first year's guaranteed operation can be secured the project will be impossible, the Review was told.

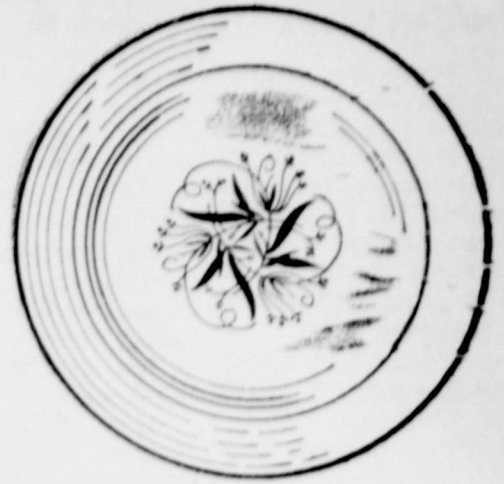



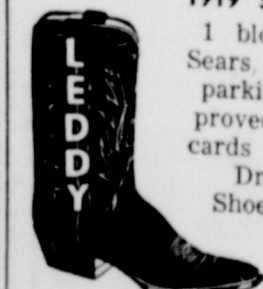
