Petroleum Provides Callahan County With Its Greatest Cash 'Crop'

A \$7.2 million a year ingredient in the prosperity of Callahan County is the production of oil and gas, the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association says in its current survey of economic factors stemming from petroleum operations here.

Using just-published U. S. Bureau of Mines figures as a base, the Association has projected what oil and gas activities mean in this county. In 1962 Callahan County was producing more than 2.3 million barrels of crude oil and 3 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

The oil was valued at \$6.8 million; the natural gas at \$357,000.

Callahan County ranks 105th in the state as total value of oil and gas production.

"Demand for Texas crude picked up enough last year to give us an increase of about three per cent over 1962 on a statewide basis. This slightly improving trend seems to be holding this year as more autos are put on the road and nationwide business conditions accelerate," said James L. Sewell, president of the Association. "It will be

several months, however, before we know to what extent individual counties are participating in the current market."

The dispersion of oil dollars through Callahan County business channels and the healthy effect given property values by petroleum industry activity are indicated by several figures published by the Association.

It is estimated that royalty payments to Callahan County landowners who are fortunate enough to have producing wells on their property create a "crop" worth about \$894,-

000 annually. These and other farmers and ranchers who have leased acreage for exploration receive additional rental and bonus payments, but sufficient current data is not available for measuring the amount.

Oil and gas operators invested an estimated \$2.7 million in Callahan County last year in the search for new fields and in the development of zones where production has been found. The Oil and Gas Journal reports that 216 wells were drilled in the county in 1963, resulting in 94 oil wells, one gas well,

and 121 dry holes.

Drilling operations included 57 wildcat wells in which operators hunted oil in new territory or at new depths. About \$1.3 million of the drilling expenditures was lost to dry holes, the Association estimated.

Petroleum industry payrolls contribute about \$312,000 a year to the county, according to Texas Employment Commission records. They show about 84 persons directly employed in oil and gas operations.

The state government's financial interest in Callahan

County operations is measured by the \$337,000 a year which the operators and royalty owners provide the state government in production taxes. These payments are in addition to those paid to local units of government and schools as property taxes. Oil and gas property taxes are reflected in local support of many Texas school districts. For example, 36.8 per cent of the local taxes for the Cross Plains School District comes from oil and gas operations; 47 per cent at Baird; 64.3 per cent at Eula, and 25 per cent at Clyde.

174 Signers Gained For Big Playground

An elaborate playground for both young and old loomed bright yesterday as a count was made of persons who had signed to guarantee \$5 per month for the first year of operation of a vast recreational center, midway between Cross Plains and Rising Star.

Committees working on membership drives reported 174 signatures had already been obtained and that many others had committed themselves to do so.

A minimum of 150 members is required by Farmers Home Administration, which would loan \$70,000 to build the project, as a means of guaranteeing financial success the first year. Thereafter the center will be operated on a fee basis, charged only at time of use.

Fred V. Tunnell and Dave Lee, who have handled the membership recruiting campaign in Cross Plains and surrounding areas, said last night they had met with enthusiastic response. "Everyone seems to want to see the recreational facilities developed," they said in a joint statement.

Bad Week Passes For Angus Calves

This has been a bad week for Angus calves. Two were killed in widely separated traffic accidents, reports Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard.

Friday morning Mrs. Lewis Wheeler Mitchell, 50-year-old resident of the May community, hit one of the calves on Farm Road 583. The animal was killed and Mrs. Mitchell's 1953 Buick damaged to the extent of \$200.

Then Monday at 1 a.m. Robert Wesley Williams, Brady truck driver, hit another Angus calf on U. S. Highway 183, a half mile south of Rising Star. That calf, too, was killed and the truck slightly damaged.

Only other accident on highways near Cross Plains over the week end was one which occurred Saturday, eight and one-half miles west of Cross Plains on State Highway 36. Jack Donald Gipson, also a resident of the May Community, driving a 1963 Rambler, hit the left rear of a 1959 Oldsmobile, driven by Glen Ferguson of Route 5, Abilene. No injuries resulted and damage to the two vehicles was estimated at \$500.

Changed Mail Schedule Now In Operation Here

Changed mail schedules at Cross Plains post office went into operation Saturday. Instead of two outgoing and two incoming mails daily, there is now one arrival and one departure.

Under the new schedule mail will arrive each weekday morning at 8:10 and leave each weekday afternoon at 4 Sunday and holiday schedules will be the same with the exception of departure time, which will

be 9:10 a.m. instead of 4 p.m. All mail to and from Cross Plains is now processed through a sectional center at Stephenville. Only exceptions to this are rural routes ties, originating here for local distribution.

Postmaster Lloyd Bryan says in no case will the new schedule result in slower mail delivery and that in most instances it will be speeded.

"Establishment of sectional centers throughout the United States is a step toward Zip Code perfection, a program designated to eliminate delays and process mail more efficiently," he stressed.

Activation of the Stephenville sectional center displaced the star route from Brownwood to Cross Plains. Glenn Morgan of Brownwood made his last run on this route Friday. He will continue, however, to serve a star route from Brownwood to May.

Bailey Wilson, who handles the star route from Cisco to Cross Plains, via Rising Star, will continue as before with only a slightly altered timetable.

De Leon Bearcats Due Here Friday In 10-A Loop Opener

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes come back home Friday night to open District 10-A warfare against the highly-touted Bearcats from De Leon.

The Bearcats, newest member of the 10-A family, have long been on the Buffalo schedule, with De Leon winning a 6-9 thriller here last year in a non-conference tilt. It appears, however, that this season's Bearcats are much improved with a 3-1 record thus far. The lone loss was to powerful Class AA Dublin. Cross Plains comes into the initial loop encounter with a better record than in recent campaigns with an even 500, a win, a loss and a tie.

7:30 Game Time

All conference games will begin at 7:30 p.m., a 30-minute step-up from non-league clashes. Kickoff Friday will be at 7:30 in Buffalo Stadium.

The Bearcats returned 15 lettermen from their 4-6 record squad in Class AA tussels last year, and although picked in pre-season polls to finish fourth in 10-A, are now thought to be the main obstacle in Albany's path to another league crown.

Speed and depth in the backfield provide the Bearcats with a potent offense, as has been proven with easy victories over Hamilton, Goldthwaite and Comanche. If De Leon has a weakness it is in the line where depth and weight is somewhat lacking.

Getting the starting nod from Head Coach Marvin Saunders in the backfield Friday night will probably be Quarterback Gary Burleson, 179 pound senior; 170 pound senior Johnny Terrill at fullback; and Bill Lamb and Mike Smith, both 140 pound juniors, at halfbacks.

Farmers May Graze Diverted Pasture

Farmers who have diverted acreage under the Feed Grain or Wheat Programs for 1964 are authorized to begin grazing that acreage, said J. C. Earp, office manager for Callahan County ASCS. However, producers are reminded that they must pay for having diverted acres under these programs as they have in the past.

Producers with Conservation Reserve (Soil Bank) contracts are not included in this authorization and they are still required to file a request to permit grazing or haying of this diverted acreage and secure the county committee's approval.

Baird Telephone Firm Sues Callahan County

A suit, styled Home Telephone and Electric Company, Inc. versus Callahan County, has been tentatively set in 42nd District Court at Baird for Oct. 26.

The plaintiff, operator of telephone systems at Baird, Putnam and Moran, says in its original petition that values

placed on its properties for taxing purposes were fixed "with conscious disregard of true market values and with conscious failure of the Commissioners Court, sitting as a board of equalization, to exercise fair and impartial judgment and use sound discretion as required by law."

The telephone company will be represented by Scarborough, Black, Tarpley and Scarborough, Abilene attorneys. Callahan County will be represented by County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

New Type Pump Doubles Oil Production

Walter V. (Tooter) Adams, of Cross Plains, who has produced oil over much of Texas and in Cuba, believes a revolutionary type of pump now being tried on a lease near Burkett may bring renewed activity to the shallow oil-bearing stratas of this section.

Three months ago Jack Earl, a Houston inventor, bought the old Shaw, Fox & Adams lease on the C. C. Burns land four miles northwest of Burkett and moved Adams here as his production superintendent. Three of the revolutionary type pumps were installed on the lease and production has already jumped from 20 to 40 barrels daily. Adams believes the real gains have just begun.

The pump reportedly lifts fluid by the principle of sonic vibrations. The new equipment has no pumpjack and no rods in the hole. Constant vibration on the tubing activates a lifting force.

"There is no pulling of rods and tubing to install cups," Adams says, "and a lease man's job is greatly simplified."

Cost of operation of the sonic-type pump is said to be less than equipment in general use throughout the oil fields of the Cross Plains area. Ability to handle greater quantities of fluid boosts production levels.

Presently 12 oilers, six injection holes and one water well comprise the operation on the Burns lease. Production is

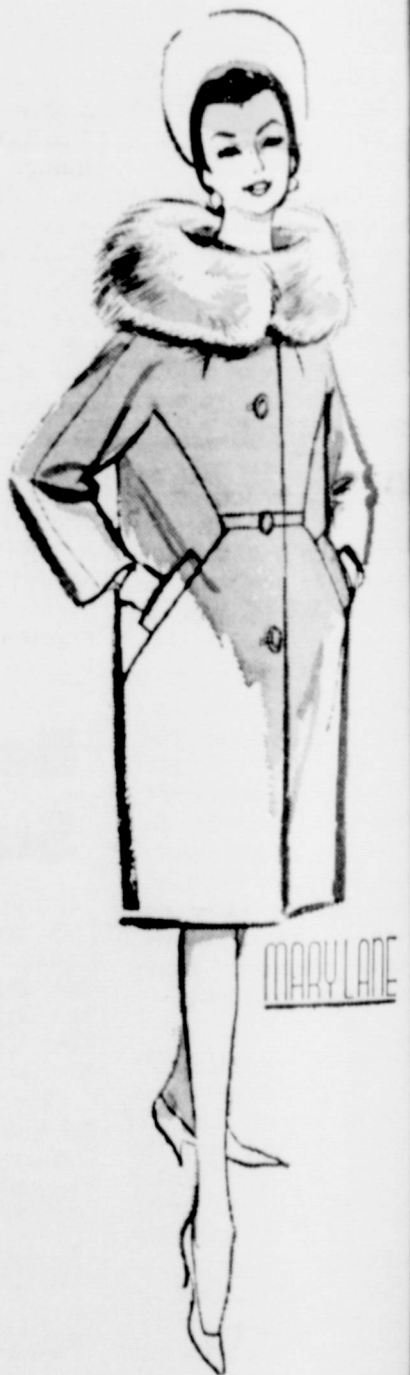



Rising Star Runs String To 4 Straight With 20-8 Win

Rising Star High School's Wildcats used a well-balanced attack Saturday night to hand the Cross Plains Buffaloes their first defeat of the season 20-8.

In pleasing an overflow homecoming crowd, the host Wildcats accomplished two firsts, both blows to Cross Plains prestige. Rising Star's first quarter touchdown marked the first time this season that opposition had crossed the Herd's goal line, and the victory ran to four consecutive games won by the Wildcats. Previously Rising Star had managed only three straight triumphs before Bisons returned to the winner's circle.

Sterling Defense

Although Rising Star lacked no offensive punch in playing ball control, but the Wildcat defense stood impregnable except for a brief collapse early in the final period. Cross Plains managed just one first down, that in the lone scoring drive, 57 net yards rushing, and none passing. The Wildcats, on the other hand, racked up 15 first downs, 173 yards on the ground and 86 yards and 14 points via the air lanes.

After a near break-away by Buff Right Halfback Bobby McMillan on a 57-yard return of the opening kickoff, Rising Star completely commanded the first three quarters, holding the Herd to a minus 14 yards rushing in the first half.

Hard Running Fullback

Although the passing of Quarterback Terry Geye and receiving of Left End Larry Duggan accounted for 40 yards and eight points, it was the bone-jarring running of Fullback Kenny Butler that kept the Wildcat offense moving.

The 180-pound junior gained 87 yards in 22 carries through the Buffalo defenders. His longest run of the night was an 11-yard burst up the middle, and only once was he held to no gain.

Center Mike Donham gave Rising Star its first break with a fumble recovery at the Herd 17. Butler moved the oval to the five in two tries, but a five-yard penalty shoved the Wildcats back to the 10. Geye rolled to his right and launched his second straight completion to end John Hutchinson on the next play. Frazier Clark's kick was wide to the right with 21 seconds remaining in the initial quarter.

On their next possession the Wildcats got enough for the victory. Following a Bison punt Butler carried five straight times for 22 yards to the Cross Plains 16. Geye got seven and Butler five more before Geye crashed into paydirt from four yards out over his own right side. From a fake placement Geye hit Duggan in the right corner for the two-point conversion.

Two-thirds way through the third stanza Rising Star capped the longest drive of the night. Geye used the fake kick trick again to hurl a nine-yarder to Duggan in the right flat and the TD. A pass failed on the point after attempt.

Buffaloes Tally

With 10 minutes remaining in the last quarter Cross Plains scored.

It took the Buffs just three plays to sprint the 59 yards. Left halfback Sammy Strickland began the blitzkrieg with a 31-yard scamper on a pitch-back from Quarterback Tommy Purvis who sprang Strickland with a block at scrimmage. Fullback Ronnie Rhodes then slanted off tackle for five before Purvis circled left end cutting through a right oblique corridor for 23 yards and the touchdown. Purvis then kept off his own right tackle for the two point conversion.

Rising Star mounted another mild threat which was cut short when Buff defender David Grier corralled a loose ball on the Herd's 25 late in the fourth canto.

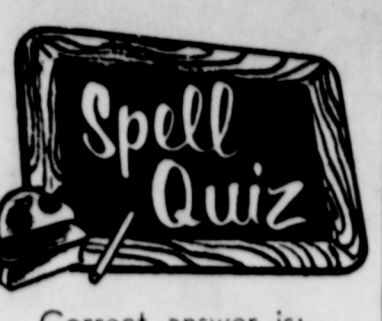
