Farm Incomes May Get Lift From Recreational Charges

Rural recreation as a business enterprise is increasing in the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District. The demand for outdoor recreation has never been greater. With more leisure time, more spendable income and more mobility, people are seeking the out-of-doors in increasing numbers.

Farmers and ranchers are finding that their land and water, when properly developed for recreation, is a new means of boosting their income.

O. L. Joy, a farmer located one mile south of Cross Plains on Highway 279, is in the process of developing his 267 acre farm into an income producing recreation enterprise. He is now equipped to accommodate people with lodging in his farm motel and provide visitors with out-of-doors recreation consisting of fishing, picnicking, arrowhead hunting, hiking, camping, horseback riding and supplies including fish bait. In addition to what Joy now has, his conservation plans consist of further developing riding and nature trails along the banks of Turkey Creek, clean picnic and camping grounds under big Pecan trees, construct low water dams on creek for fishing and swimming, and plant cropland fields to crops that will provide food and cover for quail, squirrel and dove.

Joy has a combination of several kinds of recreation enterprises on his farm. Fishing waters in this area are probably the most common since nearly all farmers and ranchers with suitable sites have ponds stocked with fish. Flood water retaining structures on landowners in the Turkey Creek watershed have unlimited possibilities for fishing waters, as well as other forms of recreation such as swimming, boating, water ski-

ing, hunting, skindiving, picnicking, camping, hiking sight-seeing and just relaxing near the water.

"Any kind of income producing recreation enterprise takes a lot of planning to provide a place that will be attractive enough for people to come to and make the best use of land and water," says James Herring, Callahan County soil conservationist.

The Central Colorado Soil Conservation District and the Soil Conservation Service will provide technical assistance to farmers and ranchers interested in planning income-producing recreation as part of alternative land uses on their farms and ranches. Herring informed.

Callahan Farmers Pick 12 Men From 4 Areas

Results have been announced of a mail election in which 12 men from four different precincts were chosen to administer the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation program in Callahan County.

Revisions Explained In Voting Box At Rowden

Recent rulings by the Texas Attorney General require slight changes in voting procedures which will be operative in Callahan County at the Nov. 3 general election.

The following statement, signed by all members of the Callahan County Commissioners Court, was released for publication Tuesday.

"Due to a recent ruling of the Attorney General, it will be necessary that all ballots at each voting box be identically printed. Because of this decision, a problem has arisen regarding the voting box at Rowden, where the precinct east of Rowden is County Commissioner Precinct 4 and Justice of Peace Precinct 6 and the west half of the Rowden voting precinct pertains to County Commissioner Precinct 2 and Justice of Peace Precinct 5.

"In order to avoid this problem the Commissioners Court of Callahan County hereby requests that all voters to the

east of the Rowden North-South Road vote at Cross Plains and those to the west of said road shall continue to vote at Rowden.

"Upon the elimination of the Belle Plain box, it now becomes necessary for voters in the old Belle Plain precinct to ballot at the Rowden box so that they may properly vote in County Commissioner Precinct 2 and Justice of Peace Precinct 5.

"The cooperation of the voters in these precincts is respectfully requested."

The statement was signed by County Judge Byron Richardson and Commissioners R. R. Shelton, Glen Swer, G. A. White and Duke Mitchell.

Buffaloes Take On Albany In District Tilt Friday Night

Cross Plains High School Buffaloes take on the formidable Albany Lions in the second District 10-A encounter for the Herd Friday night at 7:30 in the Shackelford County seat.

The Lions, who were favored to take the conference crown, had a disappointing start, but were playing strong Class AA schools. Since opening defense of its title, Albany has defeated Eastland and De Leon, the latter thought to possibly be the strongest opposition in the loop.

In spite of 3-3 season Albany has a big, experienced team which lost only five lettermen from the squad which posted a 12-2 season mark in 1963. Thirteen returning lettermen, paced by seven starters, place the Lions in heavy favorite roll Friday night.

Dick Shelton, 197-pound, first

team all-state guard last year, heads the Lions forward wall. Joe Tucker, 189-pound guard, tackles Bob Oliver, 228 pounds, and Jim Sullivan, 247 pounds, and Larry Bartee, end-halfback, 144-pound speedster, all were selected all-district in 10-A last year.

The backfield is also blessed with an all-district returnee in powerful Fullback Charles Brewster. He garnered all-area laurels as a sophomore in 1963, and tips the scales at 204.

The guiding hand of Johnny Woodward was lost via graduation, and if there is a weakness in the Lion squad it could be in the quarterback slot. Albany's passing game is reported to be less effective than in previous years, but is countered with running of Brewster and halfbacks Garry Bartee, Joe Bob Cauble and Joe Joyce.

Explanation Given Of Proposed Change In State's Constitution

Editor's Note: Texas voters will ballot on three proposed changes to the state constitution when they go to the polls for the General Election Nov. 3. A short summation of the second of these propositions is published here.

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws affecting particular conservation and reclamation districts."

Section 59 of Article XVI of our Constitution now provides for the creation of con-

servations and reclamation districts and makes them "governmental bodies politic and corporate with such powers of government and with the authority to exercise such rights, privileges and functions concerning the matter of this amendment as may be conferred by law."

The Legislature may authorize such indebtedness as may be necessary for these districts but the indebtedness must also be approved at an election by the qualified taxpaying voters of the district.

This proposed amendment would add a new Subsection (d) to Section 59 restricting the Legislature's authority to create such districts by requiring notice at both the local level

and the state level.

Notice of intention to introduce a bill creating a conservation or reclamation district would have to be published in newspapers having general circulation in the area where the district would be located. Publication would be required at least thirty days and not more than ninety days prior to introduction of the bill. The notice would set forth the general substance of the contemplated law.

A copy of the published notice and a copy of the proposed bill would have to be delivered to the Governor, who in turn would submit the notice and the proposed bill to the Texas Water Commission. Within thirty

days from the time the notice and the bill were received by the Texas Water Commission, it would be required to file its recommendations regarding the bill with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, and Speaker of the House of Representatives.

Similar notice and copy of the bill would also be necessary when amending a law creating or governing an existing conservation or reclamation district if the bill would (1) add additional land to the district, (2) alter the taxing authority of the district, (3) alter the authority of the district with respect to the issuance of bonds, or (4) alter the qualifications or terms of office of the mem-

bers of the governing body of the district.

Requirement of public notice in the area where the district would be located is similar to existing constitutional provisions in regard to local or special laws. The Constitution generally prohibits special and local laws. Those which it allows may be passed only if there has been a notice previously published within the locality affected by the proposed law. Such notice requirements help to prevent legislation which would treat one part of the state differently from others. They guard against the granting of special privileges and encourage uniformity in legislation throughout the state.

In 1957, and in 1962 the Constitution was amended to authorize a state bond program to aid political subdivisions in the conservation and development of water resources, and to acquire and finance additional storage where necessary to the fullest development of a project's potential. In general these provided state leadership for the "optimum development of the limited number of feasible sites available for the construction or enlargement of dams and reservoirs for reclamation of the public waters of the state." Requirement of notice to the Governor and to the Texas Water Commission is in line with that policy and would in some measure strengthen it.

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Gorman Panthers Thump Herd 16-8 Saturday Night

Gorman High School's Panthers pleased a homecoming crowd there last Saturday night as they handed Cross Plains its third straight setback, 16-8.

The fired-up Panthers completely controlled the first half and scored the first time they had the pigskin. The second half was a more even struggle with each eleven scoring eight points.

Statistically Gorman led with eight first downs to five for the Herd, all of which were earned in the last half. The Panthers ground out 196 yards rushing to 64 for Cross Plains. Neither unit completed a pass although Cross Plains attempted seven and Gorman one. An alert Buffalo defense corralled four Panther fumbles and set the stage for the lone Cross Plains touchdown.

Score Quickly

Gorman wasted no time in gaining the upper hand as they marched 25 yards for a touchdown after Fullback Gary Overstreet set up the tally with a 43-yard return of the opening kickoff to the Bison 25. In the midst of confusion because of uncertain reasons why penalty markers were thrown, Overstreet circled left end from 10 yards out and the touchdown. Quarterback Daryl Hurst knifed through the middle for the two-point conversion following the seven-play drive.

From the first tally until half-time a defensive battle developed with two short Gorman offensive thrusts being halted on fumbles recovered by Bufts Joe Pierce and Ronnie Rhodes.

After intermission, a brief Buffalo drive was cut short by two penalties and a long loss. After the punt Gorman cranked up its second touchdown drive. Hurst climaxed the 48-yard march with a six-yard sweep of left end, crossing the double stripe in the extreme left corner carrying a Buffalo defender. Overstreet jumped over right tackle for the two point conversion. The attack took five plays with Overstreet gaining 37 yards on runs of 26 and 11.

Buffaloes Score

After a short-lived Bison offensive thrust and punt, Fullback Jim Brown recovered the third Panther bobble at the hosts' 14 and set in motion Cross Plains' touchdown. He opened the blitz with a five yard burst, and then Left Halfback Sammy Strickland hit over right guard for nine yards and the tally. Strickland then penetrated the same spot for the two-point conversion.

Later in the fourth stanza Cross Plains picked up another Gorman miscue at the 32, but Panther defenders held on downs at their 23.
