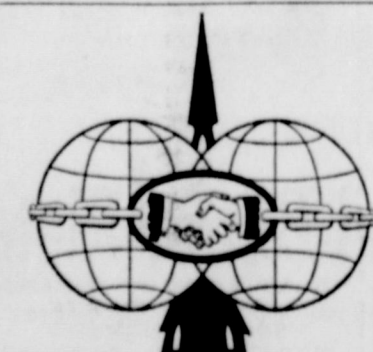

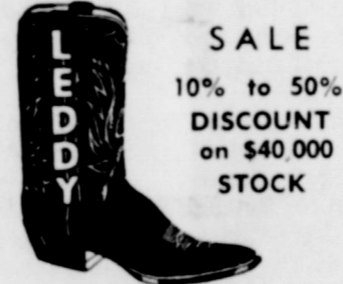

Clyde Bulldogs Slash Herd 30-0 In League Tilt Friday

Clyde High School Bulldogs used a fast-striking offense and a stout defense in the first half here last Friday night to send the Buffaloes reeling to their sixth straight defeat.

Clyde rolled up a 30-point halftime margin and settled for that score through the second 24 minutes. The Bulldogs managed only one touchdown in the first quarter, but crossed the double stripe four times for 24 points in the second period while holding the Buffs to only eight plays from scrimmage.

The visitors racked up seven first downs to the Herd's six and 184 yards rushing to the Buffs' 86. Cross Plains was limited to one first down in the first half and had a minus three yards on the ground.

Although the Buffaloes were played off their feet in the initial quarter Clyde scored only once. Fullback Connie Ramos was the first to solve the Buff defense for a touchdown with 4:26 left in the canto. He rambled 29 yards up the middle for the tally. A Quarterback Buddy Howe pass fell incomplete on the two-point conversion try, which was the first of five unsuccessful conversion attempts.

Big Second Quarter

The Bulldogs iced the game away in the second stanza with 24 points, scoring the first four times they possessed the ball.

The touchdown onslaught began with just 34 seconds gone in the quarter. Ramos plunged over from four yards out capping a 33-yard, 6-play march. Howe was spilled on a roll-out on the points after attempt.

Four minutes later a screen pass from Howe to Tailback Rick Dennis clicked for 36 yards and a touchdown. The play came on a fourth down and 17 yards to go. Dennis gathered in the check-off aerial behind three blockers and sped down the sideline untouched into paydirt. The lone successful conversion, a pass from Dennis to Ramos, was canceled by a penalty, then Howe's kick was blocked by Buff Right Guard Joe Pierce.

An unidentified Clyde gridder smothered a Bison fumble on the Herd 22 to set up the

fourth tally. In two plays the visitors scored with Howe circling right end with 5:44 remaining in the half. The pigskin was bobbled on an attempted placement kick.

With just 40 second left in the first half Fullback Edward Ramos rumbled over left tackle for the last touchdown. His kick was wide following the 30-yard, 6-play drive. Bulldog Right Guard Otis Carter set up the tally with a blocked punt and recovery.

The second half started with the exchange of fumbles which handed Clyde its deepest penetration of the second half, to the Buff 14.

Cross Plains got one sustained march cranked up early in the final stanza that carried 42 yards to the Bulldog six where Bulldog defenders held on downs. End Mike Turner blocked a Clyde punt and got possession for the Buffs at the visitors' 12 yard line later, but on the next play Left Tackle Joey Griffin corralled another Buffalo bobble.

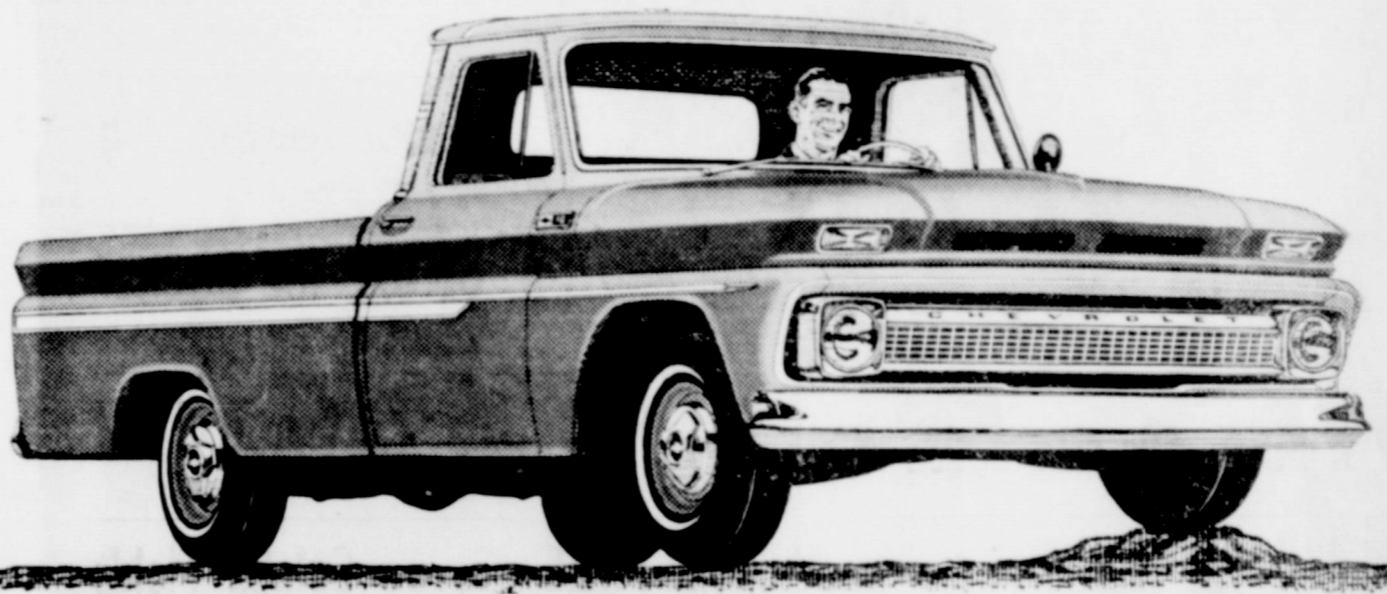

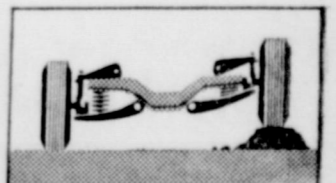

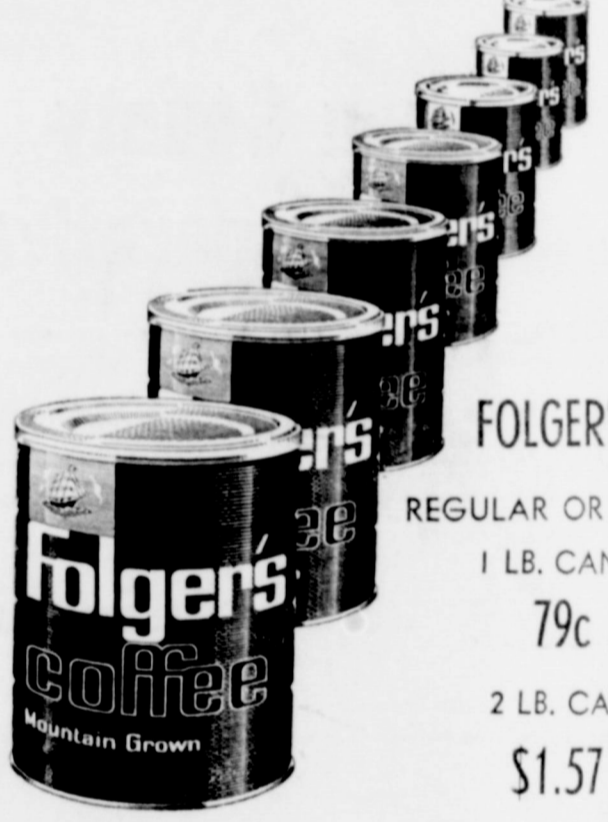
