### Increase Due To Vets On Pension

Veterans now receiving pensions, who are to get a slight increase beginning with February checks, need not apply or write the Veterans Administration, advises Carl O. Fleming, Callahan County veterans service officer.

Veterans and dependents of deceased veterans and their widows will receive questionnaires on annual income with their checks in December. Fleming reminds that in order to prevent delay in checks after December it is urgent that the card be filled in completely and returned to the proper VA office.

He cautioned that persons needing help in completing the questionnaire should contact him at his office on the third floor of the courthouse at Baird, open each morning except Saturday and Sunday.

## Season's Grid Finale Pits 10-A Winless Here Friday

Cross Plains Buffaloes will close out the 1964 grid campaign here Friday night by hosting the Eastland Mavericks in a District 10-A conflict.

Both elevens are seeking their first conference win, and the week end clash will decide who occupies the league cellar. Cross Plains has one tie and one win to its record this year, both coming in the first and second games of the season, but since has dropped seven straight. Eastland has yet to win in the current grid campaign. All 10-A foes have defeated Cross Plains and Eastland, picked to finish sixth and seventh in pre-season polls, by similar scores. One non-league school, Rising Star, also defeated both, Cross Plains 20-8 and Eastland 14-13.

Offensively the teams appear about even with the Mavericks possessing the somewhat stronger scoring punch. Eastland has scored 57 points in nine games, for an average of just over 6.3 points per tilt. Cross Plains has managed to tally 45 points for an average of just under a touchdown per contest, 5 points.

Defensively however, the Herd holds an average of a touchdown per game advantage.

The Buffaloes have allowed opposition: 204 points, a mean of 22.6 per tilt. Mavericks lead the league in points given up, 258. Opponents have averaged slightly over 28.6 points when playing Friday's visitors.

Ten returning lettermen spark the Mavericks' manpowered squad. Starting assignments in the backfield are taken by lettermen as follows: Fullback Gaylon Griffin, 150 senior; Halfback Mickey Sargent, 150 senior; Halfback John Moylan, 155 junior; and Quarterback Jerry McCullough, 150 junior.

Letter-earning linemen expected to see action Friday night are: Tackles Gary Rollins, 165 pounds and David Taylor, 170 pounds; Ends Norman Rhodes and Mike Miller, both 150 pounders; and guard Wayne Waldon, 150 pounds. All are seniors.

The last district triumph for Cross Plains came in 1962 before a huge Dad's Night crowd here over these same Eastland Mavericks. Eastland, however, regained prestige last year with a 48-0 licking of the Herd in Maverick Stadium.

Kickoff time is set for 7:30 p.m. in Buffalo Stadium Friday.

## Democrats Double Convention Votes

Callahan Democrats doubled their strength at state party conventions as a result of the vote polled in this county by Governor John Connally in the recent general election. Local Republicans suffered a loss.

Counties are assigned votes by the two political parties on the basis of one convention vote for each 300 rolled up in the governor's race at general elections. Major fractions allow an additional vote.

Callahan Democrats, having tallied 1,279 votes in the governor's race in 1962, were previously allowed four votes in state conventions. By virtue of Governor Connally having polled 2,364 votes Nov. 3, their strength will henceforth be eight, an increase of four.

Callahan Republicans, who had three votes as a result of having polled 817 in 1962, suffered a reduction of one vote. Their candidate, Jack Crichton, received 616 Callahan County votes in the recent general election.

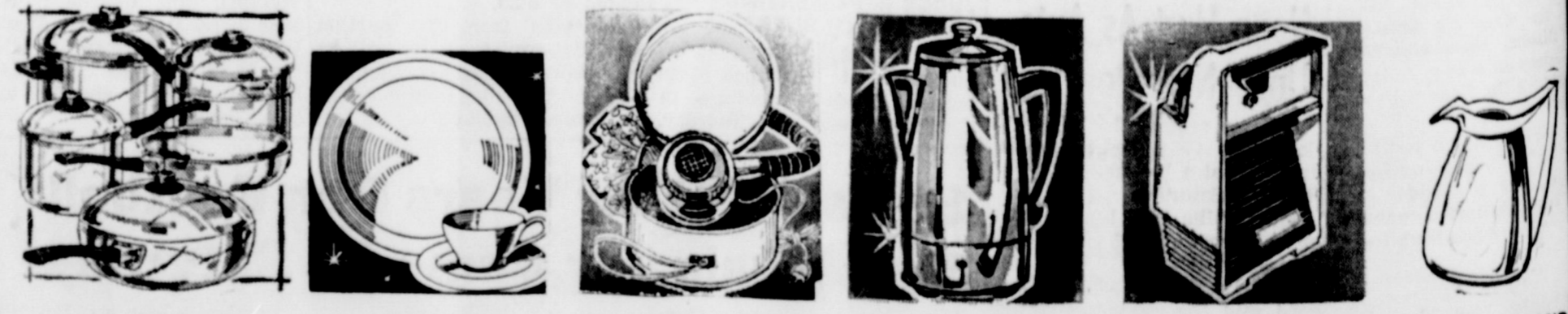

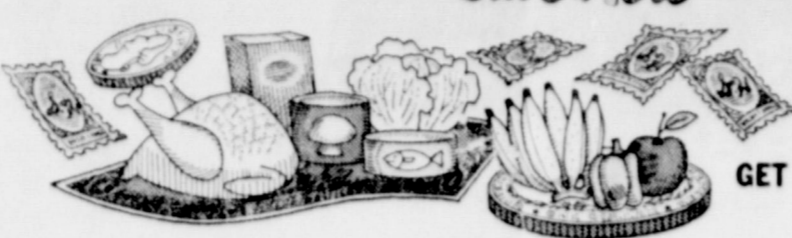

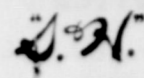

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leader said. The first will be recruitment and training of enumerators to visit all farms in the county. The second will be the actual census taking by one enumerator for each farm in the county. The third will be the processing of the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any difficult questions. The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years to gather information on the nation's agricultural resources and production.

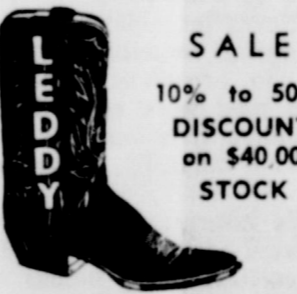

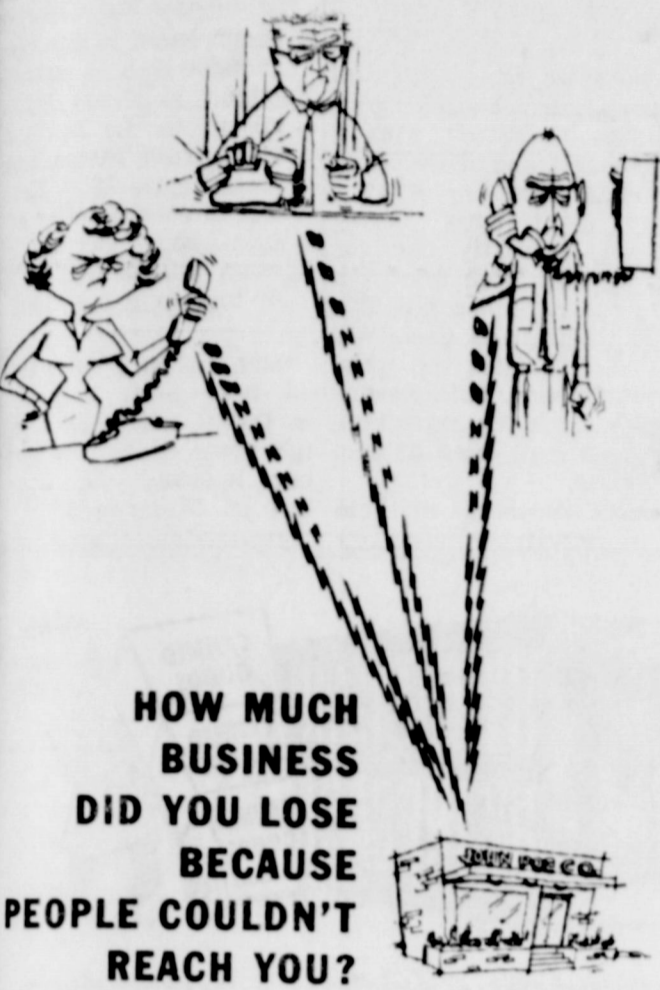

Cross Plains big effort was shouldered equally by the offensive unit in gaining 117 yards rushing and 14 in 2 of 10 pass completions. The Herd made nine first downs. Ranger, however, controlled the statistic sheet with 12 firsts, 326 net yards rushing and 93 yards passing.

**Defense Thwarts Drive**  
 A spark of determination keyed the Cross Plains defenders in the scoreless first quarter before the strong, methodical Bulldog offense poured three touchdowns across in the second stanza.

L. H. Pounds, Bulldog Wingback who harassed the Buffs constantly, opened the game with a 50 yard return of the opening kickoff. From the Herd 40 Ranger drove to the five, but Cross Plains defense stiffened and held on downs. After a quick first down the Herd was forced to punt.

Buff Center Ronnie Rhodes' blitzing tackle jarred the pigskin from Quarterback Johnny McGee's grasp with Left Tackle Bruce Adams recovering for the Bison at Ranger's 38. In three downs Cross Plains gained six yards and kicked out of bounds.

**Ranger Rambles**  
 From the Bulldog 15 the hosts moved the needed 85 yards and the first tally of the night, hitting paydirt with 11 minutes left in the first half.

Pounds carried the Bulldogs on the nine-play thrust with runs of 42, 11 and 15 yards, although it was Fullback Ray Newnam who crossed the double stripe from six yards out. Quarterback McGee pitched back to Pounds circling right end for the two-point conversion. Buff Safety Reggie Stover saved Pounds' scampering for the tally by pulling him down from behind at the Herd 32 after the 42-yard gainer.

Stover again postponed the Bulldog's second scoring drive by cutting short Pounds' goalward run after 38 yards. From the Buffs' 25 it took Ranger four plays before Pounds blasted over the right side for the final nine and the touchdown. Pounds then cross-bucked at the same slot for two more points with 6:45 left.

**Bulldogs Get Airborn**  
 Departing from their bruising ground game, the hosts used the air lanes for the third tally.

The Bulldogs clicked on three of four aerials for 44 yards in the 67-yard, 8-play march. The scoring pass was a 19-yarder from McGee to Split End Melton Kennedy who hauled in the perfectly thrown oval over his right shoulder, a stride behind

two Bison defenders in the right end zone corner. Pounds again slashed at the right side for the two points with 50 seconds remaining in the half.

**Defenses Effective**  
 Ranger's defensive unit provided the Bulldogs with scoring opportunities in the third canto, but Herd defenders proved equally as tough by staving off both threats.

Running back Jesse Renteria provided Ranger with its first scoring opportunity with a 48-yard punt run back to Cross Plains' 28, where Halfback Sammy Strickland dumped him. The Buffaloes held at the eight, but the complexion quickly changed when Linebacker Larry Blackwell intercepted a Buff pass. Bulldogs were forced to punt out of bounds and Cross Plains put the ball in play at the four.

From that point the Buffaloes put on their longest sustained march of the season and their only scoring threat of the night.

**Longest Offensive Thrust**  
 The Herd treated their loyal supporters to an 80-yard drive in 16 plays picking up five first downs in the process. The big gainer was a 21-yard scamper by Left Halfback Strickland crossing midfield to the hosts' 34. The Bison attack was stalled at the 16-yard line and Kicking Specialist James Switzer's 36-yard field goal attempt was short.

From the 20, Ranger went back to the air for a last-minute drive that was cut short by the clock. The Bulldogs completed three of five launches for 54 yards in the 55-yard drive which was handicapped by a 15-yard holding penalty.

The 17-year-old soldier entered the Army last June and completed basic training at Fort Polk, La.

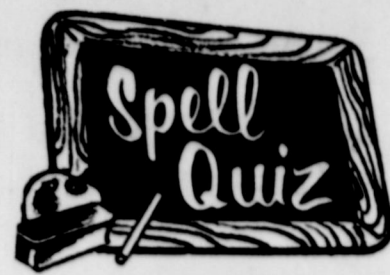

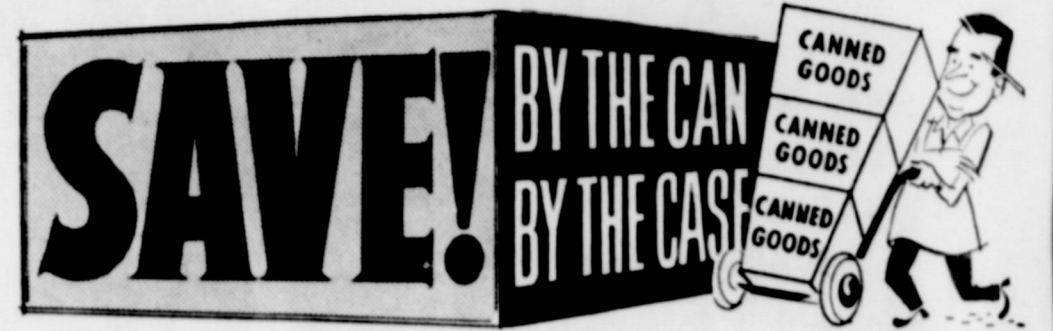
