County Judge Names 26 Persons To Committee On History Preservation

County Judge Byron Richardson has announced the appointment of a 26-member committee, charged with the responsibility of preparing a two-year program for the preservation of Callahan history. Local efforts are to cooperate with a statewide endeavor.

Heading the Callahan Committee will be B. C. Chrisman of Baird, former long-time school executive and recognized authority on local history.

Result Changes In Baird Vote Check

A re-count of write-in votes at the Nov. 3 general election in Baird has resulted in a different winner of the constable's office than that announced election night.

The re-tabulation, made Monday afternoon by County Attorney James Paul Shanks and District Attorney Bradley Miles, showed Glen Curtis the victor. The canvass revealed he re-

ceived 12 write-in votes to 8 given Tod Newton. First reports gave Newton 5 and Curtis 3.

Shanks said that it became his duty to request the re-count after affidavits were filed with him from seven persons who said they voted for Curtis. Judge J. R. Black ordered the investigation and named Shanks and Miles to conduct the tabulation of write-in votes in his presence.

Curtis has now been certified as the winner of the constable's post for precinct one, Baird. His term will begin Jan. 1. The office pays \$12 annually.

Newton had previously declared that he did not seek the office and would not qualify. He recently resigned as deputy sheriff at Baird to become associated with a trucking firm.

Shanks explained that no one has held the constable's post at Baird in recent years but the state constitution requires that the position be listed on the ballot. There were no official candidates for the place, so a space was left for write-ins.

"The place for the write-ins was in the lower right-hand corner of the ballot. There was an oversight by people counting the ballots but I am certain there was no intentional error made," Shanks said.

Curtis is expected to take the oath of office when other recently-elected officers are sworn in the first of the new year.
