Boot-Clad Robbers Loot Oil Properties Near Here

Boot-wearing thieves are reported looting oil leases in Callahan County. Officers were following clues late Tuesday, however, no arrests had been made.

Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard revealed discovery of a number of oil field items, stashed in brush just west of the Turkey Creek bridge on the old Cottonwood road Monday.

Found were seven working-barrels, pump-jack weights and sundry items valued in excess of \$400. Boot tracks were found nearby.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long, Jr.

reported early Tuesday that an oil lease owned by Louis Pitcock of Graham, just south of Putnam, was looted the night before. Taken were half a drum of Tretolite, cleaning solution, high pressure valves and connections for pipelines and well-heads. None of the items found near Cross Plains, though, are believed to have come from the Pitcock property. Boot tracks and those of a pick-up truck, which officers believe they can identify, were found nearby.

Thefts are also reported from an oil lease, four miles west of Cross Plains, owned by C. B. Ellis. Similar items are said to have been stolen there. Officers are comparing clues found at the scene with those left in localities of other recent robberies.

The equipment discovered near Cross Plains Monday has not been reported lost. In the meantime it is being warehoused here, waiting identification by the owner.

Officers Freed In Mississippi Murder Call At Callahan Jail

Two Mississippi law enforcement officers, both of whom have been mentioned in national news in recent weeks, visited at Callahan County jail Friday.

They were Sheriff Lawrence Rainey and Deputy Cecil Price of Philadelphia, Miss., both of whom were freed only last Thursday from federal charges of conspiracy in deaths of three civil rights workers in their county. The case attracted wide attention.

Rainey and Price came here to pick up four Mississippi youths, who were being held in jail at Baird.

Deputy Sheriff N. L. Long,

Jr. said the prisoners were taken into custody by highway patrolmen for speeding and had been held since Dec. 8. They were wanted in connection with burglary of a school, service station and feed mill in Mississippi, Long reported.

Long said that several days ago local officers knew Mississippi officers were planning to come here to pick up the prisoners.

"We didn't know who was coming, but we knew somebody was," he said.

Asked if the federal charges in connection with the civil rights deaths were mentioned, Long said, "Sure, it was mentioned, but that's all."

Sheriff Rainey and the group left in two autos enroute to Mississippi. Long said that the group used one auto which was owned by one of the accused youths.

\$197,309.41 Left With Local Peanut Farmers

With only remnants of the current peanut crop yet to be marketed, figures compiled Monday afternoon revealed that 934 tons had been sold here, bringing farmers \$197,309.41.

Drying facilities closed for the season at Callahan County Farmers Cooperative Monday morning. James Oscar Koehn, who maintained records on all transactions at the plant, reported 1,699,875 pounds were handled through the dryer and stored in local warehouses for Southwestern Peanut Growers Association.

B. D. Montgomery is still buying field dried sacked peanuts for E. L. Ganey of Abilene. He had bought an additional 89

tons for this account up to noon Monday. Scattered yields yet to be sold are expected to push the total value of the 1964 peanut crop in the Cross Plains area to well above \$200,000.

An interesting sidelight to statistics maintained at the peanut dryer is that the total intake at the plant was 2,418,580 pounds, revealing the nuts entered with a total moisture content of 718,705 pounds.

Facilities for drying peanuts were used in Cross Plains for the first time this season. Plans are to make additional improvements before next year's crop begins to move. It is expected that this city will become headquarters for 1,500 tons 1965.

Five Putnam Students Will Study At Cisco

Five Putnam High School students are participating in a series of seminar programs at Cisco Junior College for gifted youth of small schools.

The seminars are part of the Small School Project set up in 1960 by the Texas Small Schools Assn. and the Texas Education Agency to improve educational opportunities offered to students in smaller schools in the state.

The five from Putnam meeting at the Region VII center at CJC are Gay Isenhower, Charlie Cunningham, Charline Davis, all seniors, and Roddy Reynolds and Bobbie Isenhower, juniors. The region includes schools in Putnam, Moran, Zephyr, Huckaby and Priddy.

Since the project got underway with 18 schools in 1960, it has grown to include about 100 schools. There are five regional centers in the state. Putnam has experimented in the areas of multiple classes, team teaching, supervised correspondence study, programmed learning and speed reading.

Christmas Recess For 484 To Begin Tuesday

Cross Plains schools will dismiss Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 for a 12-day Christmas recess. Classes will resume the first Monday morning in the new year, the date being Jan. 4.

Third six-weeks period, marking half of the current school year, will end Jan. 15.

Superintendent Paul L. Whitton has reported average daily attendance running far below last year.

"Unless we gain enrollment after the first of the year or have an almost perfect attendance, we are faced with certain reduction in the size of next year's faculty," he said.

Only 18 Respond To Cemetery's Aid Call

Only 18 persons, 11 local and seven non-residents, have thus far responded to a public appeal for funds made last week in behalf of Cross Plains Cemetery Association. The total of contributions was reported at \$162, which is said to be \$76.44 short of what has been spent for maintenance of the burial plot this year. Funds to cover the current deficit and a minimum of \$125 for January's operation are urgently needed, declared Mrs. John Howard Balkum, secretary-treasurer of the Cemetery Association.

"We are hoping that families who have moved from Cross Plains but have loved ones buried here will send in annual contributions this Christmas," said Mrs. J. Peyton Smith, Cemetery Association president, yesterday. "Without a manifestation of interest by these people the present dignified condition of the grounds may be impossible to maintain."

All contributions will be publicly acknowledged through the columns of this newspaper in the first edition of 1965.

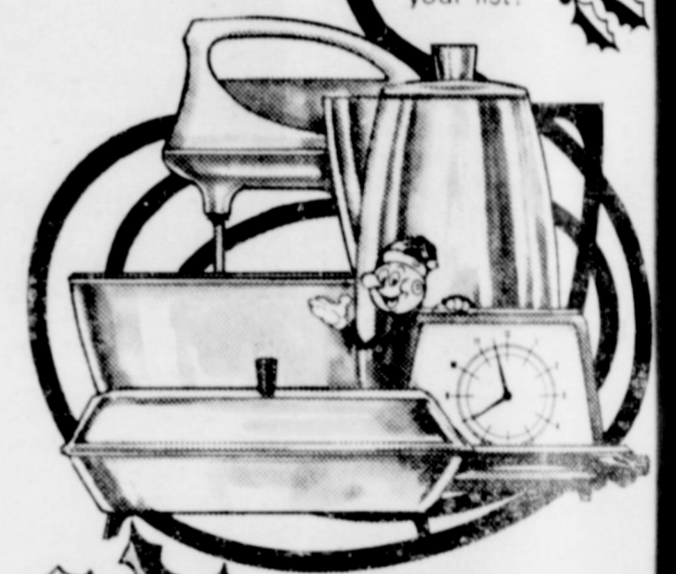

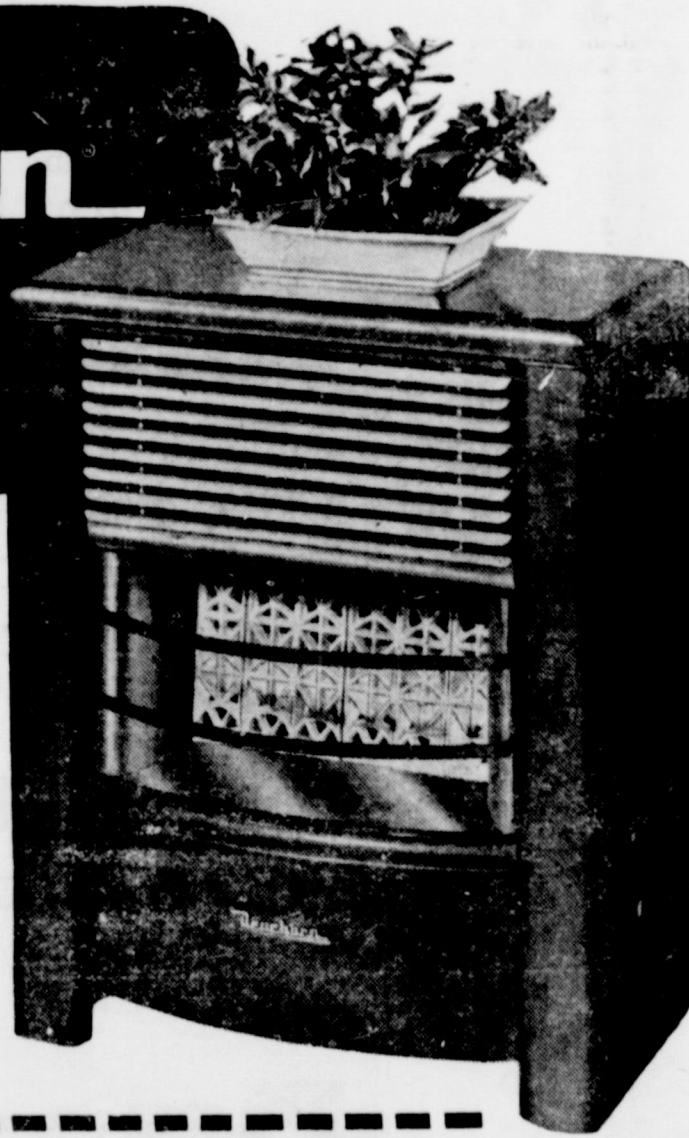

One Of Houston's Most Distinctive Homes Occupied By Former Cross Plains Couple

One of Houston's most distinctively furnished homes is one owned and occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Frank Ross King, former Cross Plains residents. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Baker of Burkett.

Back in Houston after a 21-year assignment in Venezuela and Columbia with an oil company, the couple remodeled a home on Kirby Drive and filled it with antique furniture brought from South and Central America.

When they settled down in Cuidad Bolivar and later in Caracas, Mrs. King lost no time in

learning Spanish or in starting to antique hunt. The South Americans have to consider you a friend before they'll sell family antiques, she said.

One of the Few

"I seemed to be one of the few Americans who liked Spanish Colonial. People were skeptical at first, but when they saw that I was sincerely interested, they would invite me to see things. We made some wonderful friends through antiques."

It's more difficult to buy family antiques from private owners now, she said, because

this generation of owners is beginning to appreciate old things more and is more reluctant to sell them than before.

However, the Kings bought from many families who had inherited antiques and wanted to sell them to buy more modern furnishings. Some priests also would like more modern things in their churches.

Beautiful Statues

That's how Mrs. King acquired many of the beautiful statues and paintings of saints, candlesticks, and altar pieces. Most of the original frames are intact.

One day a woman who knew

the Kings were interested in such things pulled up in front of their house and announced breathlessly that she had a car full of things the church wanted to sell in order to "modernize."

In addition to antiques with a religious significance, Mrs. King has bought German and French antiques from residents or descendants of the European aristocrats that widely populated Venezuela and Columbia.

Everything is left, or restored to its natural wood. The Kings believe in using the antiques and in letting the natural beauty of the wood speak for itself. They don't like painted furniture — have only two pieces, a chest and table pedestal painted celadon green, in the kitchen.

For polishing, they use paste wax or paste shoe polish in the color of the wood!

They liked the antiques just as much in their ranchstyle modern house in Caracas as they do in the traditional house in Houston they just finished remodeling.

The company had their furnishings flown to Miami, then trucked to Houston in a moving van. The packing was a tribute to the movers and to Mrs. King. She hired four men who worked four long days and she supervised the crating of everything from tables to teacups. When she didn't think some things were packed satisfactorily, the men undid them and started over again.

Not one thing was broken, chipped or damaged, not even a piece of Mrs. King's extensive collection of Mary Gregory glass.

She began collecting the glass in Venezuela and has vases, lamps, boxes and other pieces. Most are a beautiful shade of blue. The designs are etched on in white in a sort of cameo effect. By coincidence, the Mary Gregory glass is of American origin. Mrs. King thinks it must have worked its way to South America via Europe.

The Kings two sons have inherited their appreciation of antiques and have always been handy at helping with cleaning and refinishing. Mr. King gets the credit for doing the work on a German desk. He painstakingly removed several layers of paint, delicately working around the inlaid leather top, and finally revealed the beautiful original buried walnut.

No one was allowed to rent or buy German houses or possessions during World War II in Caracas, and Mrs. King had to wait several years afterward to buy the desk. By the time she heard it could be sold, it had been, but she talked the buyer into selling it to her.

Several chests and sideboards with marble or parquetered wood trim are used in the dining room, but the focal point is the dining table Mrs. King designed. It was carved in Venezuela of solid mahogany, much of which is two to four inches thick.

Callahan Livestock Exhibition Here Expands To 2-Day Affair

An enlarged field of entries and addition of a horse show has resulted in Callahan County Junior Livestock Show being made a two-day affair. It will be held at the organization's seven-acre tract and showbarn, one mile north of Cross Plains on State Highway 206. Dates are to be Jan. 15 and 16.

Announcement was made Tuesday of superintendents and judges of various phases of exhibition and the number of entries in each category.

Clyde FFA Chapter will have 20 hogs, six sheep, one dairy heifer, 10 rabbits and five pens of poultry for a total of 42 entries.

Eula FFA will send 10 pens of broilers, two pens of hens, two pens of turkeys and five rabbits for a total of 19 entries.

Baird FFA has entered 11 fat steers, 24 lambs, 12 hogs, 12 pens of broilers and eight rabbits for a total of 67 entries.

Callahan County 4-H Clubs will send 16 steers, 72 lambs, seven hogs, 15 horses and 20 breeding sheep for a total of 140 entries.

Cross Plains FFA will have 15 head of beef cattle, five dairy

animals, 28 sheep, three hogs, 40 goats, six pens of poultry, eight rabbits and eight horses for a total of 113 entries.

Sterling Lindsey, Coke County farm agent, will serve as judge of breeding beef and the steer classes.

Gene Tongate, Brownwood feed dealer and a recent judge at the Fort Worth Show, will rate fat lambs.

Jackie Richards, View Rancher, will judge breeder sheep and goats.

Don Smith, Talpa breeder of blooded horses, will judge the recently-added horse show.

T. W. Colby, Abilene Christian College professor, will again serve as judge of the dairy and swine divisions.

Byron Wilson of Abilene will rate rabbits.

Marvin Weber, Abilene feed merchant, will judge poultry.

Superintendents and assistant superintendents of various divisions of the show will be: beef cattle, James Snyder and N. L. Long, Jr.; lambs, James Herring and Travis Chapman; horses, Burrus Miller and Tod Newton; breeding sheep, Sidney Foy; breeding goats, Nath-

an Foster and A. H. Ringhoffer, Jr.; dairy cattle, C. Lee Smith; swine, Mel Green and Tommy Spears; poultry and rabbits, Tommy Millhorn.

First day of the show will be devoted to judging dairy cattle, breeding swine, market barrows, breeding sheep and goats and poultry and rabbits. Second day's schedule calls for selections of champions among breeding beef cattle, market lambs, dry-lot and milk-fed steers and hores.

A directorate of 16 prominent livestockmen from all sections of the county has been formulating policies and working to make this year's show the most outstanding livestock exhibition ever held in Callahan County, reported Pat C. Garner, county agent, Tuesday.
