## Rain Brightens Outlook Here

Soaking rains of uniform quantity fell over Cross Plains and area Friday night and Thursday morning. Precipitation was welcomed by area farmers and gardeners, giving a much needed moisture to winter pasturage and grain crops. According to S. F. Bond, local weather observer, the two-day rain for the city of Cross Plains averaged 1.90 inches. Combined with previous moisture, the total here early in the month has netted 2.50 inches of rain here. Coffey reported the total rainfall with 2.40 inches at the Cottonwood Store. Area measured an even amount, as also did Atwell and Cross Plains gauges. Kellar's Grocery reported 1.85 inches. Star's gauge at the store there showed 1.33 inches. ## Less Than 1,000 In County May Get Poll Tax Receipt

Unless there is a quickening in the pace of poll tax purchases, less than 1,000 Callahan County Citizens may be equipped with the voting requirement when the courthouse closes Friday night.

Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell reported at 4 p.m. Monday that purchases of poll taxes to that time numbered 788 as compared with 1,263 to the same time a year ago. Last year's total reached 2,218.

Ordinarily Jan. 31 is the deadline for poll tax paying, however, that date falls on Sunday this year and since the day before is a Saturday, when the courthouse is also closed, Friday, Jan. 29, will be the last day for over-the-counter purchases.

It is pointed out, however, that application blanks mailed

and postmarked prior to Feb. 1 will be honored. For the convenience of poll tax payers who may wish to buy poll tax receipts by mail, a convenient blank is published in today's edition of the Review. Blanks are also available at Callahan County banks.

## Current Plans Set FM Road To Oplin

Present plans call for a Farm-to-market road to be built the latter part of this year from Oplin, on the west side of Callahan County, to State Highway 283, nine miles east. Destination of the new FM road will ultimately be the city of Cross Plains.

A work plan will then be implemented calling for construction on the segment beginning just outside the Cross Plains city limits and going westward.

Callahan County will strike a blow for international good will the first week end in February.

One hundred visitors from Peru, most of whom are exchange students, are coming to Baird for a three-day visit upon invitation of Mrs. W. P. (Nick) Brightwell and Mrs. A. E. (Colonel) Dyer, who toured the South American country last year.

The Peruvians, most of whom are English-speaking, will be quartered in Callahan County homes and given an insight to life in Texas. They will arrive in Baird about mid-afternoon Feb. 5, coming from San Antonio by bus and private automobiles.

After brief welcoming ceremonies at the Callahan County seat the group will be given a tour of Baird public schools and then be assigned to homes.

A dinner will honor the guests, beginning at 5:30 that evening in Baird school cafeteria. That will be followed by attendance at a basketball game between Baird and Albany, a type of sport which many of the visitors had expressed a desire to witness.

Activities the following day will begin with a cattle roundup at the Dyer ranch, followed by a barbecue there. A tea

feating the visitors is scheduled in the afternoon. Saturday night's entertainment will include a square dance in the Baird school gymnasium.

Plans call for the visitors to attend religious services Sunday morning, before returning to San Antonio.

Mrs. Dyer and Mrs. Brightwell said during a brief visit at the Review office Monday that it is their hope that friendship between the U. S. and countries of South America will be strengthened by efforts such as they are currently undertaking, one for which so many Callahan Countians are offering their help.

## Truck Stop Breaks Marks; Margin Cut

Despite Cross Plains Truck Stop's Wayne Graves establishing a new individual high game record, and a record near record performance by the Truck Stop team, George Hutchins Mobil whittled a game off the former's lead in Cross Plains Mixed League standings.

Wayne Graves posted a 238 game in his third 10 frames Thursday night to eclipse Mobil's Raymond Franke who formerly held the honor with a 237. The Truck Stop quintet aggregated 2,333 pins in the series, six short of their record 2,339, and they totaled 848 pins for a high team game standard.

Although Truck Stop defeated Johnston Truck & Supply 3-1 with their fine effort, Mobile, in second place, gained a full game on the first placers with a 4-0 blanking of Sisters Cafe. In other action Mayes Flower Shop and D. C. Lee Gulf battled to a 2-2 draw.

Graves' 238 was, of course, the high individual game which was followed by Johnston's Charles Waggoner with a 193 and Truck Stop's Wilburn Weiss with a 188.

Graves also grabbed the high individual series diadem Thursday with a 559 total, an average of 186. Gulf's Benny Glover was second with a 501 aggregate, an average of 167, and Mobil's Raymond Franke was third with a 496 series, an average of 165.

Teamwise Truck Stop's 2,333 was tops in series competition. Following were Mobil with 2,217 and Gulf with 2,166.

Truck Stop's 848 team game was high and their 769 was third. Mobil's 797 was second. Mobil formerly owned the team game banner with an 829.

Thursday night will find Truck Stop taking on Mayes Flower Shop, Mobil battling with Johnston Truck, and Gulf tangling with Sisters.

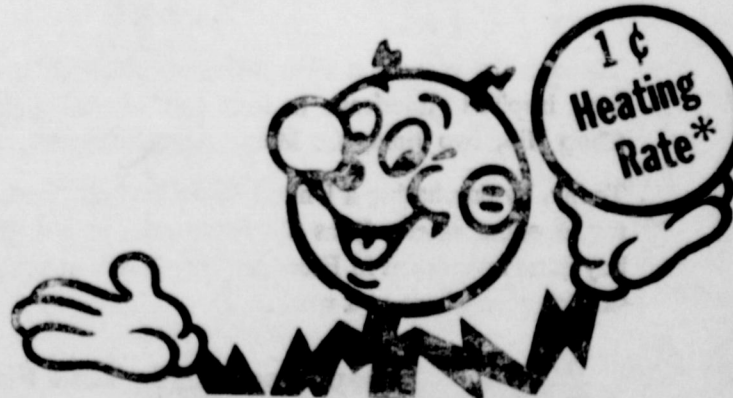

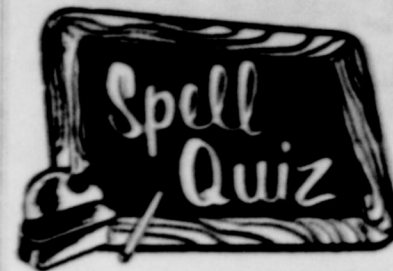
