Insurance Rates Lift 5 Per Cent

Readjustment of key rates, to become effective April 1, will raise insurance costs for Cross Plains property owners by five per cent.

The State Board of Fire Insurance rates Texas cities and towns annually according to fire records, giving credits or discounts as rewards for good records and debits or surcharges as penalties for bad fire records. New rate schedules are established each April 1.

The new schedule calls for property owners at Cross Plains and Clyde to pay five per cent more. Rates at Baird and Rising Star will be five per cent lower.

Captain David B. Gray, home after 10 months in the Viet Nam conflict, made a memorable acquaintance in Cross Plains Sunday afternoon. It was that of his five-month-old son, David Hokie, whom he'd never seen.

The army flier, husband of the former Miss Sandra Kilgore, arrived at Dallas Saturday. Returning with him was Captain Jerry Reed of Athens, who embarked for Viet Nam with him early last year.

Captain Gray will be on leave until April 11, when he is to report to Fort Benning, Ga., for advanced infantry training. Later he will be assigned at Fort Ord., Calif. Mrs. Gray and Hokie will accompany him to his new station.

\$25,000 Loss Strikes Tomato Greenhouse

An estimate of \$25,000 has been set on the loss sustained at Westernman-Vaughn greenhouses, north of Pioneer last week.

High winds ripped holes in the polyethylene covering over one of the greenhouses, permitting the 14 degree temperature to completely destroy a maturing tomato crop in one house and do 20 per cent damage in another. Wayne Westernman, manager and partner in the operation, estimated that 100,000 pounds of tomatoes were lost.

Hot air was being circulated in the two greenhouses but when the top of one was destroyed the cold air invaded both structures.

SNOW

Snow, which began falling in Cross Plains shortly before 7 p.m. Tuesday night completely covered the ground in less than an hour.

The snow was the second of the current winter but the first heavy enough to wrap the ground and rooftops in robes of whiteness.

Reports from Burkett, Cross Cut, Atwell, Rowden and Cottonwood indicated the snow was about as heavy in those localities as here.

6 Men Seek 3 Council Posts

County's Cattle Herds Being Given Tests For Brucellosis

A renewed effort to keep Callahan County cattle herds free of brucellosis is now underway.

Jim Ellis, Texas Animal Health Commission representative, is here to check all herds which had reactors to the disease three years ago. In addition he is required to blood test at least 20 per cent of the herds which were found negative at that time.

Ellis asked yesterday that livestock owners who would

like to have their cattle checked to get in touch with him through County Agent Pat C. Garner, or to address him directly at general delivery, Clyde, Tex.

Callahan County is currently classified as "Modified, Certified Brucellosis Free," a designation which permits movement of local cattle anywhere without the necessity of blood testing. To maintain this classification the work now being conducted by Ellis is obligatory.

Cottonwood Is Community Which Knew Colorful Past

Cottonwood was once principal trading place for people of the Cross Plains vicinity, having been plotted as a city in 1884. Cross Plains was at the time little more than a sparsely settled road crossing with only a semblance of commerce.

Most complete description of Cottonwood in the 80's is to be found in an old newspaper clipping taken from the "Cottonwood Prodigal" published in 1888. At that time the town had 14 business establishments, two commodious churches, secondary schools, an institution of higher learning, a sprinkling of fraternal organizations and visible growing pains.

The old newspaper reported as follows:

"Cottonwood is situated in Callahan County, Texas, one of the finest agricultural belts in the state. Cotton in this section is almost of indigenous growth.

"Oats and all fruits grow extra well in this section of the county. It is well situated at such an altitude above sea level that sickness caused from malaria is almost unknown.

"Cottonwood is 21 miles from the county seat of Baird, which is one of the freight stations of the T&P Railway, with excellent banking facilities and numerous mercantile establishments in all lines. It is 21 miles from Cisco in Eastland County,

which has two railroads, and is 12 miles from Putnam, the nearest railroad and express office. It has daily mail back from Putnam.

"The soil is Black Jack and Post Oak sandy land, and the fertility of the soil is regarded as being equal, if not superior, to any in the country. Water is of the purest quality and is readily found a short distance below the surface in Cottonwood in inexhaustible quantity, none of the wells having yet failed to produce a bountiful supply. Water can be found anywhere from 12 to 25 feet deep.

"Cottonwood has been known since the first settlement of Texas to all the old rangers,

cattlemen and Indians because of its famous springs, the Van Dorn and Chisholm Trails both being close to the town. Cottonwood was platted as a town in 1884 since which time the surrounding country has settled up until there is not much land that is not fenced, but land can be bought at prices ranging from \$5 to \$15 per acre.

"There are in Cottonwood two commodious churches, belonging to the Methodist and Baptist denominations. The Church of Christ and Presbyterian denominations have many members here also, however, as yet they have built no permanent structures.

"There are two public free schools with efficient teachers, and one polytechnic school presided over by Dr. Yonley.

"There are two cotton gins, one hardware concern, one confectionary, one millinery establishment, one barber shop, two blacksmith and wagon repair shops, four physicians and one newspaper.

"There is no religious or political intolerance among our people.

"To those who are renting lands in other parts of Texas, Cottonwood offers unparalleled inducements to them whereby with economy they can secure homes of their own in a shorter time than is possible elsewhere."

George Hutchins Mobil bowling team postponed Cross Plains Mixed League naming a champion for at least another week last Thursday night.

The Mobil quintet defeated the league leading Cross Plains Truck Stop five 3-1 last week, and in doing so prevented the latter from virtually wrapping up the loop crown. Truck Stop saw two games shaved from their lead leaving the leaders with a four and one-half tilt advantage over second place Mobil with 12 games remaining.

D. C. Lee Gulf kept its mathematical chances of a title alive with a 4-0 blanking of Johnston Truck & Supply. The Gulf team trails by eleven and one-half games in third place.

Rounding out action Thursday, Mayes Flower Shop kept hopes alive for a first division finish with a 4-0 thumping of hapless Sisters Cafe.

Raymond Franke fueled Mobil to victory with the first high individual series and top two individual games. He compiled a 560 three game total for an average of 186. His 203 and 201 were the best two games of the night. Gulf's Bill Porter posted third high game with a 181. Truck Stop's Wayne Graves was runner-up to Franke in series competition with a 514 ag-

gregate for an average of 171. Bill Mayes, Mayes Flowers, was third with a 502 total for an average of 167.

Teamwise Truck Stop copped top honors with a 2,223 pin series. Mobil's handicap lifted the squad to victory although trailing the leaders by six pins in series competition. Mayes Flowers was third with 2,070 pins.

Mobil claimed team game diadem with a 777 effort followed by Truck Stop's 766 and 739.

Truck Stop could possibly snare the crown with a 4-0 victory Thursday, tonight, when it meets Sisters, although Gulf would have to defeat Mobil by the same score. Mayes Flowers takes on Johnston Truck in a second division battle.

B. C. Chrisman Representing County At Historical Session

B. C. Chrisman of Baird, chairman of Callahan County Historical Survey Committee, will participate in the 1965 State-wide County Chairman's Meeting on March 16 in Austin.

Highlight of the session is a discussion and planning of the second year for RAMPS, according to information received from the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, sponsor of the meeting.

RAMPS is the accelerated, five-pointed program of Recordation, Appreciation, Marking, Preservation and Surveys of Texas history. It was begun, kept going and is now being enlarged through the cooperation of the county, regional and state historical survey groups.

Twenty-one projects pertaining to RAMPS are slated for completion during a five-year period, announces the TSHSC, a state agency with headquarters in Austin.

Mr. Chrisman will meet with other county chairmen for a discussion of plans and problems in having successful RAMPS projects in Callahan County.

The state-wide goal of placing 1,600 markers a year was reached the first year of RAMPS — and went over, with more than 1,300 markers erected in 1964.

To this date, there are three Official Texas Historical Medallions erected in Callahan County.

The marking portion of RAMPS is receiving major emphasis this year. Markers placed are to commemorate houses, sites, landmarks and individuals over the state, explained the state survey committee president, John Ben Shepperd of Odessa. County survey commit-

tees and the state organization will also stress publication of the proper tourist information on the markers, he added.

One of the featured events of the one-day county chairman's meeting on March 16 is a luncheon to which Mr. Chrisman has been asked to invite this district's state legislators.

Mr. Chrisman long has been one of the county's most prominent figures in local history preservation and study. He was appointed recently for a two-year term by County Judge Byron Richardson.

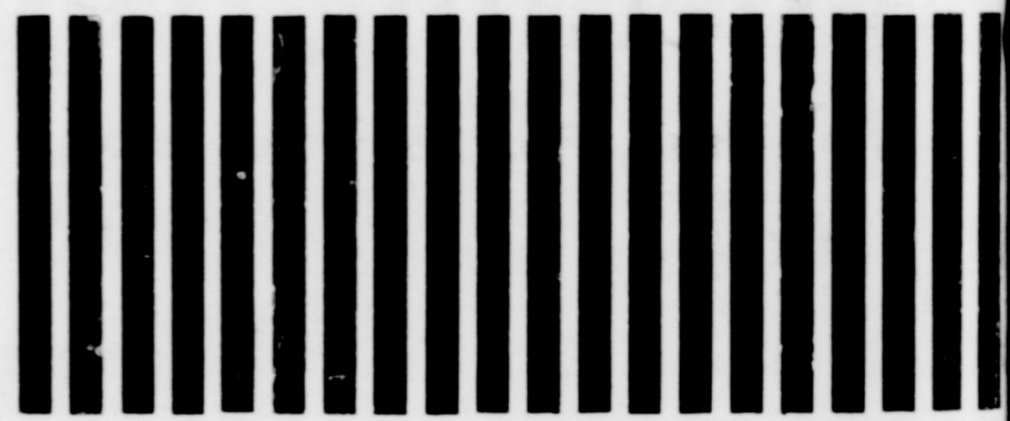

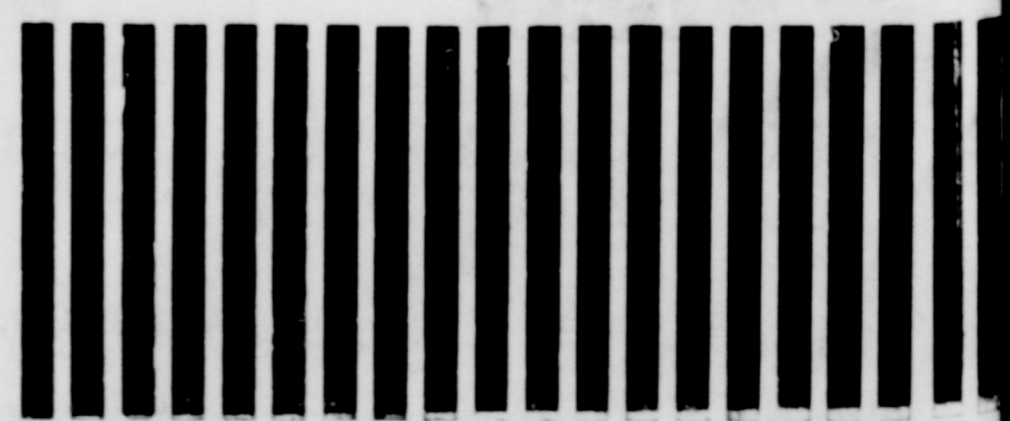

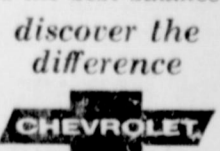

County Business Dips 10 Per Cent Since '58

Callahan County's 104 retail establishments had \$6.2 million in sales in 1963, a decrease of 10 per cent from 1958, the U. S. Bureau of the Census has just reported after tabulating data gathered from all firms in the 1963 census of business. The last previous business census conducted by the census bureau, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, was in 1958.

Retail trade in the county meant jobs (exclusive of proprietors) for 224 men and women and a yearly payroll of \$561,000. In volume of business the

county's food stores had a sales of \$1.6 million, a decrease of 13 per cent from 1958. In other retail business, the county's eating and drinking places had sales of \$388,000, and gasoline service stations had sales of \$878,000.

For the state as a whole, the census bureau reported 96,406 retail establishments with sales up 18 per cent from 1958.

Census reports to be issued during the next few months will give state and county figures on wholesale and service trades, manufacturing and mineral industries.

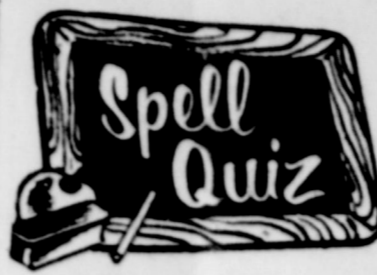
