Support Prices Listed New Wheat Crops

County price support for wheat stored in the county has been established at \$1.25 per bushel. The support rate to be paid by producers is not based on the county rate in which the wheat is produced but on the rate in which the wheat is stored. Since most Callahan wheat is normally stored in neighboring counties, the following rates are quoted:

Brown County \$1.34
Coleman County \$1.31
Taylor County \$1.27

The charge for storing wheat will be approximately one cent per bushel per month, depending on the length of time that the commodity is stored.

Producers who have signed an agreement to participate in the 1965 wheat program will be eligible for loans and those over-planting will sell on the open market. Also, those participating in the 1965 wheat program will receive certificate payments in addition to the amount they receive from the sale of their wheat. Participating producers may either sell on the open market, or place their wheat in a loan, whichever method is most advantageous.

Jan Bowman Picked CPHS Homemaker Of Tomorrow

Jan Bowman, 1965 graduate of Cross Plains High School and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Rector, Jr., of the Pioneer community, recently won the 1965 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow award in Cross Plains High School.

She earned the honor by scoring highest in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls late last year, and is now eligible for state and national honors.

Test papers of all school Homemakers of Tomorrow in the state are currently being judged and the state's highest ranking contestant will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., and runner-up will receive a \$500 educational grant.

The state winner and a school adviser will participate in a week-long tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D. C., and New York City American Homemaker of To-

morrow as the feature. First place winner, judged on original test score, interviews and with the naming of the All-observations during the tour, will receive a \$5,000 scholarship.

City To Fix Streets, Spray For Skeeters

Unusually heavy and frequent rainfall has held up work on two projects planned by the City of Cross Plains.

According to Mayor Protempore Gerald Bowden, recent rains have halted city employees from patching of paved city streets and spraying for mosquitoes.

A heavy infestation of mosquitoes has plagued the city since approximately eight inches of rain fell here the past few weeks. "Numerous pools of water standing throughout the city and the lush growth of grass and weeds have made

ideal breeding places for the insect," Bowden said.

"We understand the urgency of eliminating the pest," Bowden stated Monday, "but spraying would be a waste of money and do no good if it rained soon afterward." Bowden pointed out that the insecticide has been purchased and is currently stored in the City Hall. He also said that equipment was ready to go, and with the coming of fair weather, spraying would begin.

Citizens' Help Asked

Bowden added, however, that the city would need help from

its residents. "Individuals will have to cut tall grass and weeds and spray around their respective homes if maximum relief from the mosquito is to be obtained," the interim mayor said.

Street Patching Planned

Bowden added that inclement weather had also prevented workmen from repairing paved streets within the township. "As soon as the ground dries sufficiently repairs will begin," he said.

A ready-mixed, asphalt-like material was to have been purchased for the scheduled project, according to Bowden. "Roads which were originally black-topped here in the middle 1950's have had very little repair done on them since, and work is long over due," he explained.

4 Local Men Selected On Anti-Poverty Board

Four Cross Plains men have been named to a 16-member directorate of the Callahan County chapter of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc.

The five-county organization was formulated about two months ago to aid in President Lyndon Johnson's anti-poverty program. The corporation embraces Callahan, Coleman, Runnels, McCullough and Concho counties.

Cross Plains residents on the county board are Freddy Tatom, Chester Glover, Edwin Baum and O. B. Edmondson.

Baird representatives are the Rev. Richard Lewis, Albert Lovell, Norman Fisher, Tee Baulch, L. C. Cash and J. Rupert Jackson. Cash and Jackson are county representatives to the organization's board of directors. Cash heads the committee to select a site for headquarters of the non-profit organization, and Jackson is a member of the budget committee.

Clyde residents named to the board are Dan South, Doug Swope, Bill Shelton and James Alexander. Also selected as board members were Hilton Tarrant of Eula and Fred Cook of Putnam.

Primary function of the corporation is to serve as a vehicle in aiding non-profit groups in the five-county area in planning and developing projects for public benefit. Among possible avenues for which help can be obtained are vocational training, adult education and pre-school classes.

A meeting was slated for the county representatives in Coleman for Thursday night.

Huge Cattle Deal Closed Last Week

Raymond DeBusk, Cross Plains livestock buyer, and Jim Nail, Albany rancher, have closed one of the largest cattle deals reported here in recent years.

DeBusk entered into a contract last week to purchase more than 1,500 head of calves and yearlings from the Nail Ranch. Delivery will be at intervals between now and Sept. 10. When completed the deal will run between \$150,000 and \$175,000.

DeBusk has bought the Nail calves for the last five years, purchasing them for the account of Weil Land & Cattle Company of Lexington, Ky.

"I've been buying cattle 37 years," DeBusk said, "but the deal with Jim Nail is the largest in which I've ever been involved with a single seller."

Month Just Past Was Third Wettest Here For 15 Years

Month of May which has its history Monday left its imprint on weather records. Only

two months in the past 16 years have brought more moisture to the Cross Plains area. By coincidence, both the wetter months

were also named May, one was in 1957 and the other in 1963.

The recent May unloaded a total of 7.87 inches of rainfall. That of 1957 brought 9.50 to become an all-time record-breaker, and May of 1963 aggregated 8.24 inches.

Total rainfall received in 1965 stands at 13.39 inches, according to records maintained by S. F. Bond, official observer here for the United State Weather Bureau. This is said to be around three inches more than normal for this period of the year.

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Geologist Comments On Plants Once Being in Area

Eubank, Cross Plains and petroleum engineers the following in comment upon re-

cent publication of an article in the Review that camels and elephants are believed to have found Pecan Bayou a favorite watering place during the Ice Age.

He commented as follows:

"The ancestral camels seem to have developed on the American Continent in the middle or late Eocene (an early geological age) and to have flourished here until the Pliocene (later than Eocene but also an early geological age), when previously having sent a branch to South America to evolve into llamas and vicunas, and another into the old West, which became the present-day camels. The latter died out in their primitive home. This happened twice in North America, the last in 1907.

"The mastadons were closely related to elephants and are most conveniently distinguished by their teeth. At 910 Main Street there is a foot bone of a Callahan County elephant, which I collected.

"It is possible that Pecan Bayou did not exist in the geological era of the elephants and camels, in the sense that the Gulf of Mexico has been a low area a long time geologically; hence has been collecting sediments since ancient times."




