2 Callahan Juries Make It Rough For Dope Haulers

Two Callahan County petit juries agreed with prosecuting attorneys Thursday of last week in 42nd District Court at Baird by handing down two of the longest prison terms for possessing narcotics in this area in many years.

The sentences, which total 75 years, were given two Birmingham, Ala., men arrested on the west side of Callahan County April 24 by two highway patrolmen.

Weldon Ray Waters, 23, was convicted and sentenced to 35 years in prison and Thomas Wesley Murry, 45, was given a 40-year term.

District Attorney Bradley Miles and Callahan County Attorney James Paul Shanks, prosecutors, asked for lengthy prison terms for the pair to deter narcotics traffic in this area.

A joint trial was sought by Miles and Shanks, but court-appointed defense attorney, Gaston Swofford, objected and received separate trials for the pair. Waters was tried first. The jury deliberated about two hours before reaching the 35 year verdict, and while Waters' fate was being decided, Murry faced the second jury. The latter jury returned in about 55

Brush Control Acreage Hits New 5-Year High

Callahan County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service has announced that requests for brush control on a cost sharing basis have reached a five-year high during 1965.

ASC office manager, J. C. Earp, and county agent, Pat Garner, have contributed the marked increase in Callahan countians' interest in controlling undergrowth on their farms and ranches to a brush control tour and formulation of a program to direct attention to the need, both of which were completed earlier this year.

Currently 13,677 acres have applications pending for cost-sharing brush control programs, and 6,274 acres have already been signed up. The 19,951 acres outstrips the for-

mer high of 15,201 set in 1963.

According to Earp 1964 acreage showed a sharp decrease, primarily due to a required statement by the participant. It stated, he says, "If the farmer or rancher did not agree in writing to defer grazing the acreage controlled for a period of not less than three consecutive months, his cost share assistance would be reduced by 25 per cent."

The conservation offices have set a goal of 30,000 acres per year within the county to be enrolled in brush control. They pointed out at least that amount was needed to gain over the rate of natural regrowth.

Earp and Garner extended an invitation to all local land owners to talk with them about any conservation problem.

Cadet Thompson, who recently completed his junior year at the academy, was chosen for the special duty on the basis of his teaching and leadership abilities. He and other specially trained cadet instructors will teach subjects to prepare new cadets for their four years at the academy.

Cadet Thompson, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Thompson of this city, will receive a B.S. degree and his commission as a second lieutenant in the Air Force upon graduation from the academy next June.

Old Menu Shows Low Food Costs

Dr. E. L. Knox provides a reproduction of a "Bill of Fare" from Delmonico's Restaurant in New York, published in the period before the Civil War, in 1834. And the food prices are unbelievable — yes, most interesting, compared with 1965 prices. Following are some of the listed items on the bill of fare.

Tea or coffee 1c
Soup 2c
Pies 4c
Half pies 2c
Corn beef and cabbage . 2c
Fried fish 4c
Beef steak 4c
Pork chops 4c
Roast mutton 5c
Ham and eggs 19c
Roast chicken 10c

And, believe it or not, a regular dinner was only 12c. But back in those days an excellent wage was \$6.00 per week. Now the average weekly pay check is \$85.00 — and that change was made in 130 years. If the same ratio continues for the next hundred years the weekly wage will be near \$1,000 (based on the excellent wage scale of 1934 when the above prices were available.)

The above figures are food for thought. It gives cause to wonder just what will be in the mill in the next 100 years.

Towns Like Cross Plains Send Away Their Finest Resources

By Jim Gilmore

Cross Plains is a lot like any other rural Texas community. It has one particularly pressing problem — that of staying as big as it is.

Today, Cross Plains' population is about 1100. School rolls list almost 500 students, leaving around 600 adults in the community.

In a larger city, students graduate every year and take up jobs and residences, become citizens of their home town.

Not so in small places. High schoolers in towns like Cross Plains graduate and leave, and most of them never come back.

In the last 10 years 322 youngsters have received Cross Plains High School diplomas, and of that number only 53 now live in the central Texas town. That's the way it's been for years, and there's no change in sight.

Why do they go? One reason is to look for opportunity.

Quite a few Cross Plains High graduates leave to continue their education, enrolling in colleges and universities throughout the state. Seventy-

eight youngsters from the last 10 senior classes out of a total of 322 students, have accumulated at least a few credit hours and about 25 per cent (consistent with the national figure) have received degrees.

It's not surprising that college trained people who have invested four years and several thousand dollars in an education don't relocate en masse at Cross Plains. What would they do?

Eliminate the school teachers and a few ministers and you find only a few persons here in possession of the sheepskin.

Jobs in this Callahan County town requiring college preparation are few. And where they do exist, the low wage scale is a big factor.

In larger cities, salaries are constantly boosted by industries, eager to attract the best labor possible. Only in these areas can most college trained people use their education to best advantage.

Pay rates concern the blue collar worker, too. Unemployment and today's cost of living are ever present problems. Al-

most any high school graduate can earn a living in small towns, but in the larger areas, khaki-clad providers bring home paychecks to rival those of rural executives.

And then there's the breed who leave simply because they want to dive into the proverbial stream of life and swim like crazy, and they reason the water's deepest in bigger places.

Of the 53 who stayed in Cross Plains, some are engaged in agriculture, others in business, and many report having doubts about their future.

Why do they stay?

"Well, now ..."

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"This Amendment shall be-

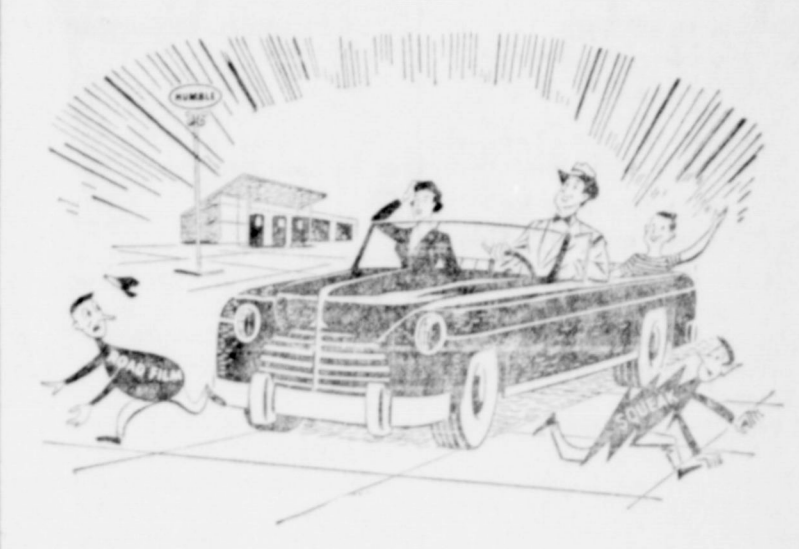
