## School Awards \$10,612 Contract To Local Firm

Cross Plains Independent School District Board of Trustees awarded a \$10,612.26 contract to Bowden Lumber Company of Cross Plains in special session Wednesday night of last week.

Gerald Bowden, owner and operator of the local building firm, submitted the low bid for supply and installation of approximately 100 aluminum frame double window units. The metal frame windows, about

200 of them, will be placed in both the high school and elementary school buildings.

A state agency recently suggested that several of the old window frames be repaired, but according to Superintendent Paul L. Whitton, "We thought it would be more economical to replace all of them."

Bowden said yesterday that removal of the old units would begin first of next week. He estimated that the project would take six weeks to complete.

A Baird girl and a Cross Plains boy have been chosen to represent Callahan County at a crime prevention seminar in Austin next month, sponsored by Attorney General Waggoner Carr. Outstanding young people from all sections of Texas will attend.

Local delegates will be Miss Barbara Henry of Baird and Charles V. McCowen of Cross Plains.

McCowen, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy McCowen, will be a senior in Cross Plains High School in September. He is an officer in both the marching band and the stage band and is regarded one of the top musicians on the local campus. He is rated an exceptional student.

Miss Henry, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Henry, is a member of the Beta Honor Society in Baird High School, an officer in the Future Homemakers, member of the Baird Bear Band and the school stage band and was twice chosen secretary of her high school class. She is 17 and will be a senior at Baird this fall.

"We are honored to be represented by two such outstanding young people," said James Snyder of Baird yesterday, who has handled arrangements for this county's representation at the Austin conference for the past several years.

# Judge Ponders Ruling In Tri-County Line Dispute

Final decision on the boundary dispute between Callahan and Taylor counties and Coleman County is expected to be delayed at least a month according to County Attorney James Paul Shanks.

The contest over the southern border of Callahan and Taylor counties and Coleman County's north line was heard by 52nd District Judge Truman Roberts in Hamilton Friday morning. It was, however, a shortened version of the programmed trial because Judge Roberts' schedule called for him to be in Hillsboro later that day for another case. Arguments began shortly after 9 a.m. and lasted until shortly before noon.

### Written Final Arguments

At the close of testimony Friday Judge Roberts directed attorneys representing each side to submit final arguments in writing. Hal Woodward, Coleman lawyer who represented the plaintiff, volunteered his brief in a week, which is Friday, July 16. Shanks and Jim Jeffrey, Taylor County Attorney, will have until July 23 to file their rebuttal with Judge Roberts. His ruling is then expected to be handed down in two or three weeks.

The land in controversy, along the mutual dividing line of 20.5 miles of Callahan-Coleman and about five miles of Taylor-Coleman, ranges in width from 850 feet to about 400 feet. The apparent overlap was discovered by Clyde Independent School District when it levied tax against all land in its district which terminates at the county line. It was then discovered that some of the same land was also being taxed in a Coleman County district.

Although the taxation value of the land in question would be less than \$100 according to Shanks, settlement is badly needed because of possible later complications in abstracts of the property there and county jurisdiction in the area.

### Only 2 Witnesses

During the trial just two witnesses were called. Plaintiff's witness was R. L. Barnett, county surveyor of Coleman County, and Shanks called only Albert Lovell, Callahan County Tax Assessor-Collector. All detailed evidence and

facts were not brought out in the abbreviated trial. Shanks said and only portions of various exhibits by the plaintiff and defense were read in the proceedings he said after the trial. Much of the factual information within certified copies of field notes of several surveys, which was made a part of record, was not brought out in trial.

### Taylor Wants Out

Taylor County representative Jeffrey asked that his county be released from the suit on the grounds that an established line already exists between the two counties, Taylor and Coleman. Judge Roberts refused Jeffrey's request.

No evidence of a mutually accepted line between Callahan and Coleman has been found. Commissioners Court of either county has not accepted surveys of the other county.

### Barnett Testifies

Woodward's questioning of Barnett and partial reading of field notes of three surveys established that the mutual border of Callahan and Coleman was established as being due west of the northwest corner of Comanche County. Three of the surveys according to Barnett, under questioning by Woodward, placed the same reading at the northwest corner of Brown County and northeast corner of Coleman as 9 degrees, 30 minutes East. A fourth survey, by a Callahan surveyor, placed the point at 9 degrees, 26 minutes. This projected line varied to 9 degrees, 12 minutes according to Woodward. Woodward asked Barnett to explain the difference.

"There is no explanation for the variation shooting from the stars," Barnett said. In speaking of the differing Callahan survey, Barnett stated that he could have been shooting from the sun or have been mistaken. Woodward asked Barnett, "He (Callahan Surveyor) was not at the same point as the other three?" Barnett replied, "Probably not."

In cross examination, Shanks asked Barnett if a survey by J. T. Evans in 1884, one of three introduced by Woodward, was started at the vital point of the northwest corner of Comanche. Barnett answered, "Evans did not."

Shanks queried, "Did Haley (Callahan survey made in 1898) start at northwest corner of Comanche?" Barnett, "Yes." When asked to explain the difference Barnett said, "One has to be wrong."

Shanks said, "Haley started at original points and went in the general direction." Barnett replied, "Yes," and added, "Haley lines ran in a general westerly direction; a little more south."

It was also pointed out during the proceedings that acreage assessments in sections along the boundary are in question.

### Acreage Differs

Example was given by Shanks of two sections, 99 and 100.

Callahan survey listed 202 acres in each section, but Coleman claimed 545 in 99 and 550 in 100. A book of records in use at the General Land Office at Austin revealed that 202 acres of the two sections were in Callahan and 438 in Coleman.

Lovell testified that there were three different sets of figures in use along this line. He stated, "Coleman, Callahan and the General Land Office do not agree," in speaking of acreage rendered in the two counties.

Superintendent of Schools in Clyde Ferrell Newton and County Judge Byron Richardson of Baird were present at the trial as well as Shanks and Lovell. Several Coleman County officials also were present.
