Record Crowd Expected For School Homecoming

What is expected to be one of the gayest week ends in the long history of Cross Plains is just ahead.

Saturday is date of homecoming for all former students of local schools and reports reaching here the past few days indicate this year's reunion will break records. It will be the

first homecoming since 1956. Ted Souder, president of the Ex-Students Association, reports unprecedented interest. Numerous telephone calls to the local newspaper office have been coming in this week from former students seeking present addresses of old classmates. Mrs. Dixie Respass Ott called

from Midland Monday and said: "scores are coming from far West Texas."

The reunion program will be kicked off with a coffee and registration Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the school cafeteria. Home towners working on this function are Mrs. Chester Glover, Mrs. Herman Har-

ris and Mrs. Juanita Mayes. A formal program is slated at 2 p.m. in the cafeteria with Mrs. Lewis Richardson, Mrs. C. C. Westerman, Mrs. O. B. Edmondson, Mrs. Doyle Cowan and Mrs. Tommie Hinkle in charge of arrangements. Souder will preside at this gathering, at which time a slate of officers is expected to be elected and a date chosen for the next reunion.

From 3 to 4 p.m. there will be gatherings of individual groups such as Buffalo bandsmen, various classes and organizations. Former bandsmen will be honored at a reception in the band hall. Souder will announce Saturday afternoon the place of assembly for other groups.

Serving will begin at 5 p.m. at a pancake supper in the school cafeteria, being sponsored by the PTA.

Highlight of the day will be a football game between Cross Plains and Baird, beginning at 7:30. Former students are to be seated together in a special section of the stands.

Halftime ceremonies at the game will include the coronation of a homecoming queen with each of the four high school classes supporting a candidate for the honor. Chief laurel of the day will be the designation of a coming-home queen, the regal lady being a former student here or of one of the schools merged into the Cross Plains system.

Final activity of the day will be a reception after the football game in the American Legion building. It is planned to get underway around 10 p.m. The committee planning this function is composed of: Mrs. L. D. Koenig, Mrs. Eulus Parker, Mrs. James D. Bufs To Clash With Baird In Homecoming Saturday

Saturday night Cross Plains Buffaloes will meet Baird High School Bears here in the 1965 season homecoming contest — the first full-scale ex-students reunion here since 1956.

The Bears, coached by Vernon Townsend and Ed Cotton, carded a 9-1 season won-lost record in winning the 10-A District championship last year. That team, however, was virtually wiped out by graduation and this year's Bear contingent has yet to win a game.

The Bears returned nine of 24 lettermen from last year,

but all but one of the group were reserves on the 1964 team. Steve Stanley, 5-10, 155-pound senior leads the Baird backfield this year. He won an all-district berth in 1964 from a halfback position.

Other lettermen are guards Dickie Harris 145 pounds and Bobby Sims 165; centers Tommy Bearden 165 and Donald Barron 135; tackle Robert Griggs 150; quarterback Kenney Townsend 130; and end Benny Brame 130.

J. D. Faircloth, starter in the Bear backfield, was sidelined for the season when he sustained a broken leg during Baird's opener this year.

Bears list lack of size, speed and experience as their greatest weaknesses.

Game time Saturday night is 7:30 p.m. and school officials expect one of the largest crowds of the season to be on hand.

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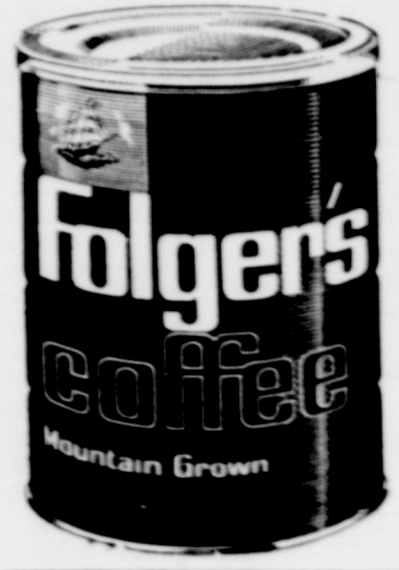

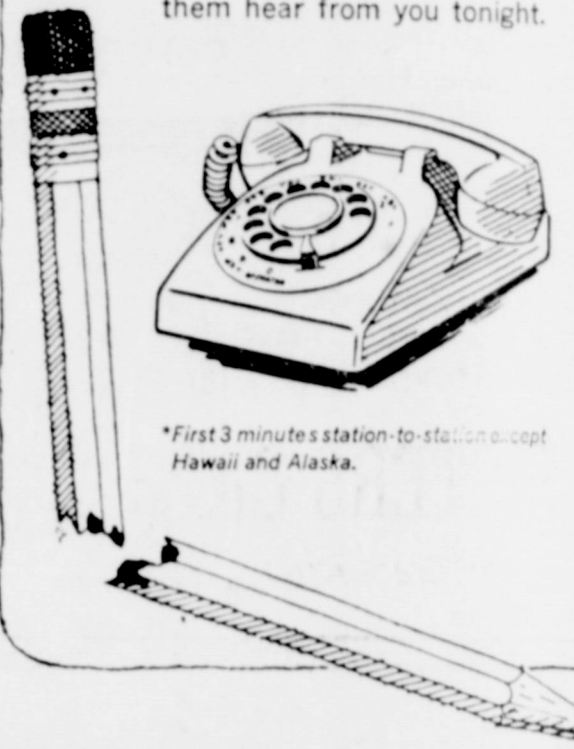

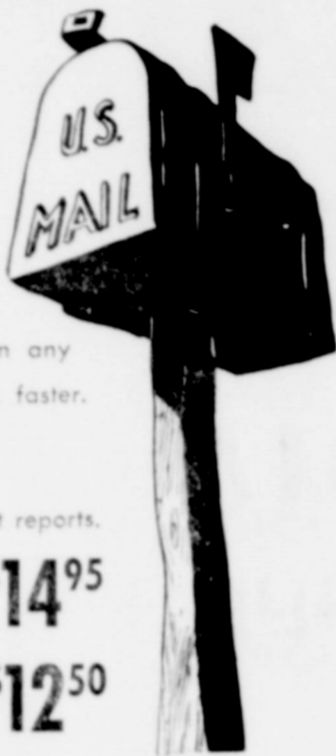
