Judge Rules For Coleman In Boundary Line Dispute

A verdict was handed down in 52nd District Court at Comanche Monday afternoon favoring Coleman County's claim in a boundary line dispute with Callahan and Taylor Counties.

Judge Truman Roberts, who rendered the decision, did not elaborate on the significant legal points involved in his finding. He simply announced in favor of the Evans survey line, one made for Coleman County.

Members of Callahan and Taylor County Commissioners Courts were present in the Comanche courtroom for the decision, and after a conference by County Attorneys James Paul Shanks of Baird and James Jeffries of Abilene tentative notice of appeal was given. The case is expected to be referred to the Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

The acreage disputed by Coleman with Callahan and Taylor Counties involves a strip of only a few hundred feet along the mutual boundaries.

Coleman County was represented in the litigation by State Highway Commissioner Hal Woodward, who maintains a private law practice in Coleman.

Large Profit Shown By County Hospital

Operating statement for Callahan County Hospital reveals that the month of September was one of the most profitable in history of the institution. Whereas the hospital has often run at a loss, the September accounting showed a 30-day net profit of \$3,270.07.

"Three physicians presently practicing at the hospital caused a substantial increase in receipts," said Sterling Odom of Cross Plains, a member of the institution's board of directors. "Too, there has been rigid economy practices by staff members which seem to have improved efficiency and created profits in the balance sheet.

Income during September totaled \$9,352.45 and came from: room charges \$4,254, services and supplies \$1,132.15, drugs and medicines \$1,638.60, x-ray \$1,365 and laboratory \$962.50.

Expenses totaled \$6,028.38, the major item of which was salaries \$3,529.69.

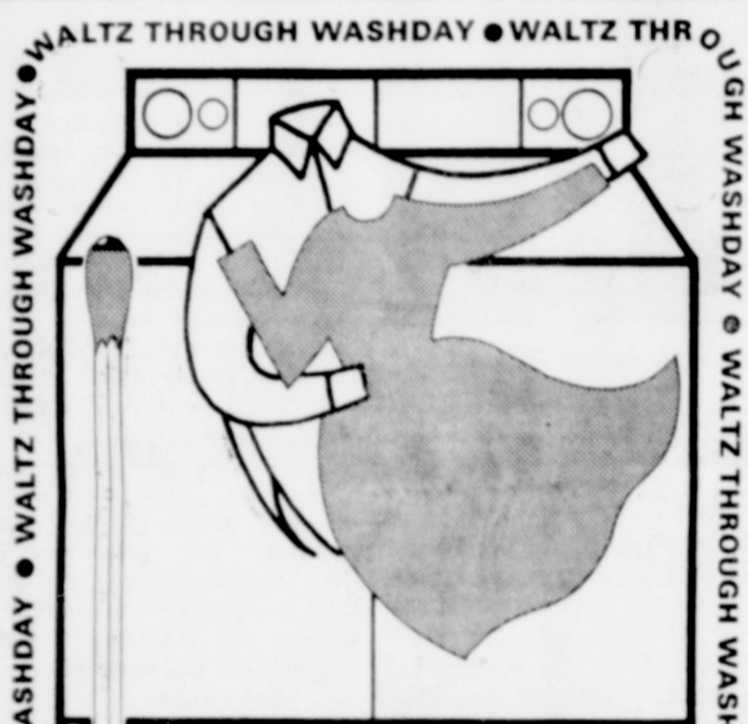

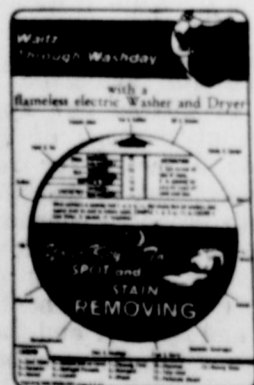

Baird High School Bears felt the inevitable wrath of Cross Plains Buffaloes Saturday night 27-8 at a homecoming conflict of the traditional rivals in Buffalo Stadium.

Cross Plains received the opening kickoff but gave up the offensive after a single first down when a 15 yard penalty left the Buffs shy of necessary yardage.

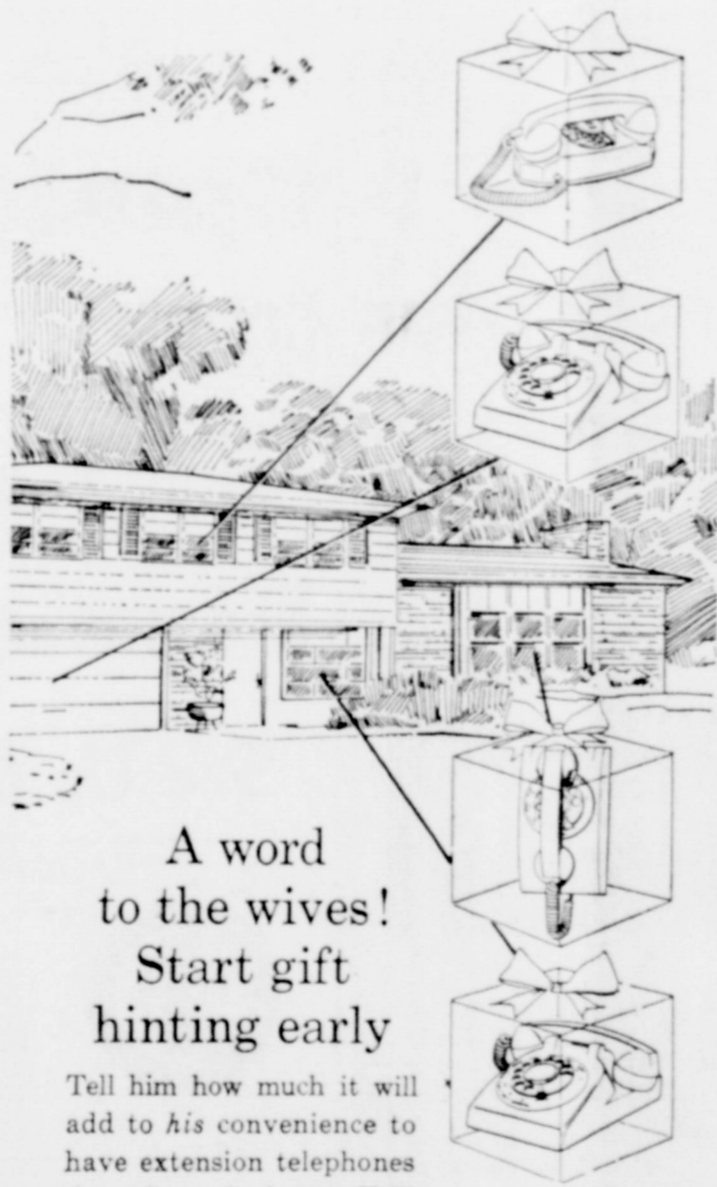

Cross Cut's Farm Road Up For Bid

Contract for a Farm-to-Market Road from Cross Cut to the May-Pioneer Farm Road will be awarded by the State Highway Commission Wednesday, Nov. 10.
