Cross Cut's Farm Road Up For Bid

Contract for a Farm-to-Market Road from Cross Cut to the May-Pioneer Farm Road will be awarded by the State Highway Commission Wednesday, Nov. 10.

The road will be built to farm-to-market specifications. Most such roads include grading, structures and surfacing. Estimate of the cost was not available.

Letting of another contract for work in Brown County was also on the agenda. It is for widening and improving the Jim Ned Creek bridge at Lake Brownwood on State Highway 279, the Cross Plains to Brownwood road.

Other than widening to 44 feet, steel piers will be replaced by concrete ones and a new section built. Cost is estimated at \$450,000, and is expected to take 225 working days to complete.






