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Omar Burleson To Speak At SCS Observance Here

The world has only an average of six inches of top soil to feed and clothe its inhabitants. In appreciation of those people who are helping to conserve this vital top soil through conservation projects, Cross Plains plans to host an Appreciation Tour, Byron Richardson, Callahan County Judge, told the members of the planning committee Friday when they met in Odom's Cafe in Cross Plains to finalize plans.

Richardson and A. J. Young of Coleman were in charge of the meeting. Twenty-four members were present, and represented the Turkey Creek Central Colorado, Middle Clear Fork, Brown-Mills, Upper Leon and Lower Clear Fork Soil Conservation Districts, the city of Clyde, the Brown, Mills, Callahan, Coleman and Taylor Commissioners Counts and the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce.

Congressman Omar Burleson, regarded as a long-time friend of the soil, will be principal speaker at the Tuesday meeting. More than 300 people from a number of nearby cities are expected to be present. Catered luncheon will be served.

The appreciation tour will be an all-day affair, beginning

at 10 in the morning Nov. 9 at the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn one mile north of Cross Plains on State Highway 204.

Guests will be welcomed by J. B. McCord, Chairman of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District which is the parent district. A report of progress on the Jim Ned, Upper Pecan Bayou and Turkey Creek watershed projects and a tour of the sites of the floodwater retarding structures is planned for the morning. Guests will be returned to the Show Barn for lunch and in the afternoon hear an appreciation response by Judge Richardson, and an address by a visiting dignitary. Jack Scott will make the introductions.

Invitations to attend the Appreciation Tour have been issued to a number of VIP's including Governor John Connally and Congressman Omar Burleson, and to all interested persons in the Central Colorado, Brown-Mills, Lower Clear Fork, Middle Clear Fork and Upper Leon Soil Conservation Districts.

Building of the 12 floodwater dams on the three watersheds has been cited by the National Soil Conservation Service as an outstanding example of cooperative effort. Land for the sites was acquired from some 50 landowners without the necessity for a single condemnation suit. Ten of the floodwater dams are located in Callahan County and two in Brown County. Money to build the dams was provided by the Soil Conservation Service and local taxation.

A joint inspection of fenced areas, spillways and structures is made annually by representatives from the participating districts to assure proper maintenance.

"We are proud of the people who have pioneered our soil conservation program," Judge Richardson said, "and we want to show our appreciation to these far-sighted, dedicated men who have given of their time, effort and means to make the program possible."

The public is invited to attend.

Tuesday's Election Results

Callahan County voters sanctioned first eight of the 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution in balloting Tuesday. Propositions 9 and 10 were rejected.

Individual amendments were tallied as follows, for and against, respectively: 1. 431-293; 2. 568-178; 3. 640-116; 4. 429-340; 5. 498-247; 6. 564-195; 7. 425-317; 8. 548-192; 9. 338-415; 10. 292-432.

Cross Plains voters turned out in larger than expected numbers to ballot on 10 proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution Tuesday. Mrs. W. F. (Bill) Kilgore, election judge, reported that 151 ballots were counted. Local residents approved seven, numbers 2 through 8, opposed 9 and 10 and had a tie vote, 65-65, on number 1.

Cottonwood with 16 votes polled, favored all 10 amendments.

Atwell voters, 10 strong, favored amendments 2, 4 and 8, rejected numbers 1, 3, 5, 6 and 7, and deadlocked on 9 and 10.

Rowden tallied 15 votes and favored four changes, num-

bers 2, 3, 6 and 7, defeated five, numbers 1, 4, 5, 8 and 9, reached no decision on 10.

Dudley counted 16 ballots favoring five, 2, 3, 4, 7 and 8, opposing five.

Denton Valley with a total vote of 9 favored all but two amendments, numbers 4 and 9.

Admiral, with 11 polls, okayed only four amendments, numbers 2, 3, 7 and 8.

Oplin reported 21 ballots with all propositions being approved except numbers 1, 9 and 10.

Putnam vetoed three proposed changes and counted 70 votes. Failing were numbers 4, 9 and 10.

Baird, the largest box in the county with 245 total vote, marked approval on all amendments except number 10.

Clyde rejected only the last two suggested constitutional changes and reported 195 ballots.

Eula registered 40 votes and voiced opposition to only numbers 9 and 10.

Absentee voters, only four, okayed all but number 8 which was 2-2.

NASA Spacemobile Sets Session At Local School

National Aeronautics and Space Administration Spacemobile will be on Cross Plains High School campus Thursday of next week, Nov. 11, according to Superintendent Paul L. Whitton.

"We have been working for over a year to have the NASA Spacemobile visit Cross Plains," Whitton said yesterday.

He continued that these demonstration units travel throughout the United States and foreign countries providing an introduction to space science and to our nation's space activities. Whitton stated, "Demonstrations as well as classroom teaching will highlight the day's program." Those who are to be here are Richard Rice and William Elkins, both professional science educators who are authoritatively informed on space sciences and programs of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Some of the subject material to be covered in the one-day visit includes a discussion of the proposed manned flight to the moon, explanation into the mechanics of flights of Projects Gemini and Apollo and biological problems of man in space.

A history of rocketry will precede explanations and demonstrations with accurately scaled models, of principles of orbits, weather and communication satellites now circling

Earth and other NASA projects and plans for the future.

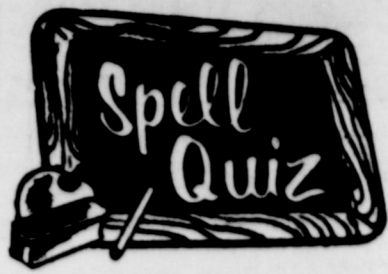
