

272 Hear Omar Burleson Laud Soil Saving Efforts

With hay spread over the soggy soil to offer visitors feet the same protection as the 12 retention dams offer the soil on the Jim Ned, Upper Pecan Bayou and Turkey Creek water sheds, Appreciation Tour Day at Cross Plains got off to a rainy but enthusiastic start.

Exactly 272 visitors from five Soil Conservation Districts gathered in the Callahan County Junior Livestock Show Barn one mile north of Cross Plains

to greet each other and visiting dignitaries. They exchanged soil conservation news and looked over the huge display of topography maps and pictures which spread across the east wall of the barn. Red, white and blue streamers formed a patriotic backdrop for the day's activities.

Festivities were opened with a prayer by the Rev. Roger Butler, pastor of Cross Plains' First Baptist Church. Jack Scott of Cross Plains introduced Callahan County Judge Byron Richardson as "the man who has done more than any other in highlighting soil conservation achievements."

Richardson recognized leaders from the area. He gave special recognition to Mrs. Charlie Coats, wife of the late Charlie Coats who is called the "father" of the soil conservation work in this area.

Visitors were then loaded into two school buses and taken on a tour of the ninth flood control dam site located on the Oliver Worthy land just north of Cross Plains.

Guests returned to the Livestock Show Barn for catered barbecue dinner.

The invocation was by Paul Whittton who termed those gathered for the Appreciation

Tour "men of God and of the soil."

Before lunch, E. J. Hughes, area conservationist of Brownwood, told the group of the development of the soil conservation program, and pointed out that from 1923 to 1942 there were 72 floods on the Turkey Creek watershed covered by the flood control plan. Twenty-nine of the floods were major ones, he said. "Only those who have seen the destruction and soil erosion caused by floods can fully appreciate the flood control work being done here," he said.

Hughes emphasized the local level work of the soil conservation program.

Senator David Ratliff of the 24th Senatorial District of Texas added his own words of praise for the people engaged in the soil conservation projects. He said that he was acutely aware of the soil conservation work and the great need for it. "It is a very, very necessary program," he said, "and should be continued and expanded." He pointed out that it will become more important in the years ahead. "One thing man has not discovered how to make is land," he said, "and with the population explosion, the need to conserve

the land is of prime importance."

Mrs. Omar (Ruth) Burleson was introduced and spoke briefly, thanking the women of Cross Plains for their hospitality and for the coffee hosted by women of this area at Odom's Cafe that morning.

Omar Burleson, Congressman from this area and principal speaker of the day, said "Thank God for the land." He also emphasized the earth's population explosion and the coming need for more sources of food. The day of the surplus food supply will be gone by 1972, he said. The U. S. will be seeking more food sources right along with other nations.

He said that once fertile lands that now lay in waste were the result of people not concerned with what they had. They failed, he said, but we believe with projects like the one celebrated today, we in America will not fail.

Burleson said that it was easier to find sympathy for water projects in Congress than in previous years, because water is becoming a problem. But, he pointed out, it is hard to tell the agriculture story to those who do not know what it is. More money for soil conservation projects is needed.

Lakewood Recreational Project Gets FHA Okay

Bids will be opened and contracts let on the Lakewood Recreational Center at 4 p.m. Saturday, Dec. 4.

R. D. (Bob) Needham of Cross Plains, president of the board of directors for the project, said that actual construction should begin a few days after contract awarding, and advertising for bids was to begin this week.

"We figure to have most of the proposed facilities finished by Spring if too many working days are not lost to bad weather," he stated.

Official notification of final approval of the \$112,000 loan was received Thursday by directors from the Farmers Home Administration in Washington. D. C. Congressman Omar Burleson wired local directors Wednesday afternoon of the approval, but official notification was delayed a day.

It will include a nine-hole, irrigated golf course, swimming pool, picnic and camping sites, fishing facilities and related accommodations.

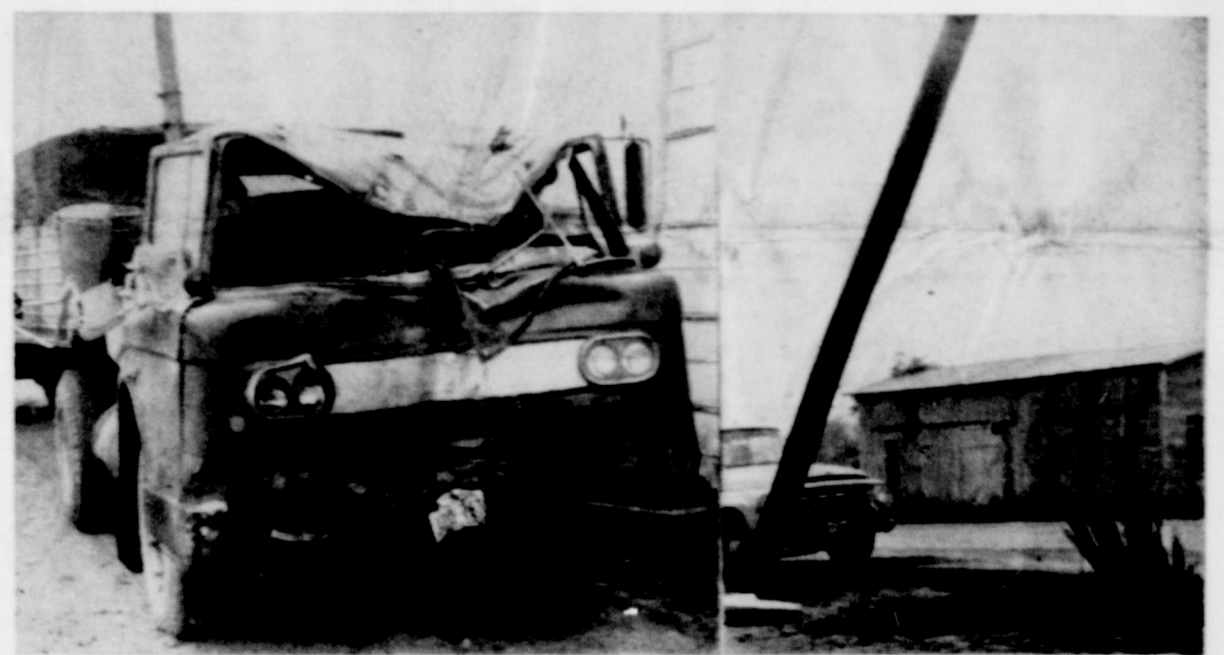
Some 239 prospective members paid in good faith deposits of \$20 each to establish a public confidence basis for the loan application.

Damage Totals \$4,130 From Three Traffic Mishaps Here

Three traffic accidents occurred in the Cross Plains area last Saturday morning within two and one-half hours.

Two of the crashes happened at the junction of State Highways 36 and 279-205 in the townsite and one about six miles West of town.

Damage from the trio of accidents was estimated at \$4,130 to vehicles alone by Cross Plains Highway Patrolman Bill Vineyard, investigating officer.

Most serious of the three occurred at 8:10 a.m. when a 1960 Mack truck smashed into electric poles, highway road and stop signs on both sides of Main Street joining Highway 36 and then into a car.

Just one injury resulted from the three smashups, and that was to a two-year-old girl, Tammie Ann Wood, passenger in the Mack truck driven by her father, David Lawrence Wood, age 26, of Dublin. She was treated by a local physician and released. Stitches were required to close wounds received when she was apparently thrown from the vehicle.

According to Vineyard, Wood apparently came upon the stop light at the intersection unexpectedly from the east in the early morning dense fog. He added that Wood swerved right into the utility pole and signs to avoid a 1962 Pontiac driven

by Elbert Ray Callis of Houston which was stopped at the blinker. The truck then traveled across Main Street ramming into another group of signs before sliding back onto 36 and striking the second car halted for the light on the west side. The automobile was driven by James Ray McDonald of Abilene.

Damage to the truck was set at \$3,500 and McDonald's car had \$500 damages.

Second Mishap

Approximately an hour and forty minutes later another accident occurred at the same site while investigation and repairs were being made on the first wreck.

Mrs. Della Banks Barton, driver of a 1960 Studebaker, approached the intersection on the Brownwood highway and turned left onto State 36. As she made the corner, turning far to the left, she collided with the front of a 1962 Chevrolet pickup driven by Carroll C. Westerman of Pioneer. According to Vineyard Mrs. Barton possibly either froze at the car's steering wheel or stepped on the accelerator instead of the brakes after collision with Westerman. Her car then turned into Koenig's Humble Station clipping an empty boat trailer behind A. J. McCuin's car parked in the station drive.

The Studebaker then jumped a curb as it went between two parked cars, crossed H. A. Young's front yard and Highway 279, onto property of Cross Plains Machine Co., and finally stopped in a city alley about 150 yards from first impact.

No one was injured in the freak accident, but damage was listed at \$600.

Minor Wreck Starter

First of the three accidents was the most minor. A 1963 Oldsmobile sustained \$30 damage when it hit a large buck deer on Highway 36 six miles west of Cross Plains. The accident happened at 7:25 a.m. The auto was driven by Robert Hunter Shipley, field engineer for West Texas Utilities, of Abilene.

No Estimate

State Highway Department maintenance officials said no estimate of damage to road sign and the stop light, which crashed to the ground, had been made. It was expected that the traffic light or a similar device would be replaced within a few days. An electric pole first struck by the truck was broken off about 18 inches above the ground.

Vineyard and Deputy Sheriff Howard Cox complimented and extended appreciation to unknown helpers who directed traffic around the wreck scene.

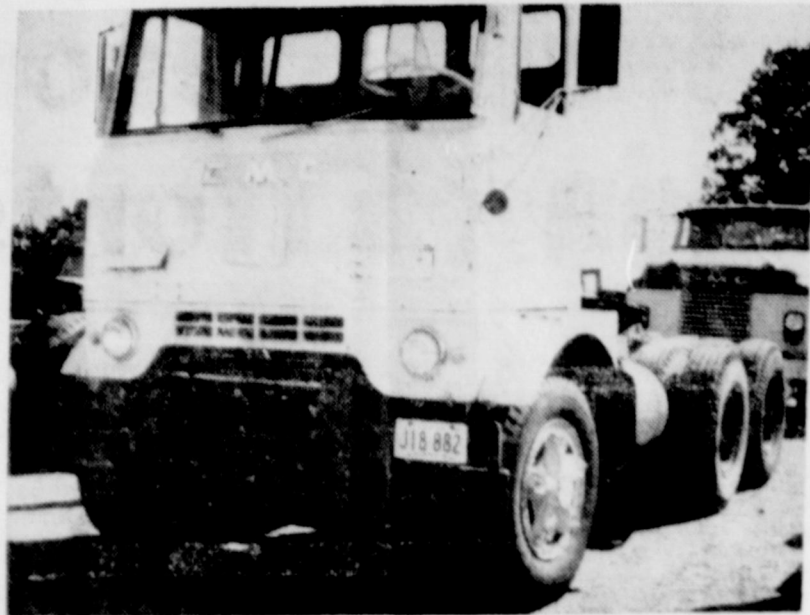
